Representative Hanohano, and Members of the Committee.

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) thanks the legislature for their interest in wanting to publicize the killing or wounding of Law Enforcement Officers and promoting the creation of an early warning system referred to as a Blue Alert to assist in expediting the apprehension of these types of criminals.

The Department of Public Safety truly appreciates the intent behind this resolution, but because each department and law enforcement entity in the state, be it local, county, state or federal, already have their own internal public relations means at their disposal, they are each the only ones fully in

charge of the situations that arise, and are in charge of getting the word out to the media and to all other law enforcement agencies. Putting one department in charge of something like this would likely slow down the response, not speed it up, and would only serve to add confusion to an already serious situation. This is a small state, and unlike other large states who might employ such a program, word spreads at light speed in Hawaii.

Again, while appreciating the thought behind the resolution in trying to aid in a situation as serious as the killing or wounding of a law enforcement officer, each department and agency already have plans in place to react and to get the word out.
