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- 1 Department's Position: The Department of Health respectfully opposes this resolution as written.
- 2 Fiscal Implications: Undetermined, but additional staff and resources will be required to develop and
- 3 implement the voucher program.
- 4 Purpose and Justification: This bill urges the Department of Health to develop a voucher system for
- 5 used tire collection to address illegal dumping. The resolution also mentions that some tire collection
- 6 services are illegally dumping used tires instead of sending the used tires to recycling facilities.
- 7 DOH generally supports recycling and appreciates the intent of this measure to curb illegal
- 8 dumping of tires. We note that existing law allows for customers who purchase new tires to take back
- 9 their used tires to tire retailers, who are required to accept used tires from customers at the point of sale
- in a quantity at least equal to the number of new tires purchased. State law also allows tire retailers to
- add a disposal fee for the used tire to the final price of a new tire purchased. This fee is typically
- charged. To address the illegal dumping of tires, we encourage tire retailers and wholesalers to work
- with and require tire collectors to submit receipts showing that the used tires went to recycling facilities.

1	State law also does not limit the amount of the tire disposal fee so retailers and wholesalers may adjust
2	them according to local conditions like the price of fuel and transportation costs.
3	A voucher system will require a statutory change. The used tire disposal fees are currently
4	collected not by the Department but by tire retailers. To administer the proposed voucher system, the
5	Department needs authority to collect these disposal fees from retailers, and to pay tire collectors who
6	send tires to recycling facilities. This requires changes to State law.
7	We have practical concerns. The proposed voucher system adds review and enforcement by the
8	Department in an otherwise private business arrangement. This requires more resources for the
9	Department and results in greater delays in payment to tire collectors.
