

House Education & Senate Education & Housing Committees Informational Briefing on the Status of the Early Learning System in Hawaii Wednesday, February 17, 2010 4:00pm-5:00pm

Hawaii Association for the Education of Young Children (HAEYC) is promoting, supporting and expanding high quality programs and services for Hawaii's young children (0-8), their families, and professionals which assists in building the Early Learning System in Hawaii. These programs and services (the Leadership Symposium and State Early Childhood Conference, the Quality Care Program, Hawaii Early Childhood Accreditation Program, Alignment of National and Regional Quality Standards and Assessment and participation in Hawaii Careers with Young Children) promote quality improvement through standards for programs, children, and professionals.

Quality Care Program (DHS)

The DHS Quality Care Program for Center-Based Child Care Providers is a partnership with COF, PATCH, HCC and HAEYC-The DHS Quality Care Program was designed to recognize and reward quality in preschools and child care center. Incentives up to \$100 per month for each enrolled child who receives a child care subsidy from the Department of Human Services. Three ways to qualify: Maintain NAEYC or NECPA accreditation or Meet the Hawaii Preschool Content Standards for four year olds and Meet Professional Development Standards. HAEYC is responsible for the verifications visits and review panel and Honolulu Community College provides the technical assistance and training. Approximately 70 NAEYC & NECPA accredited centers participated and 68 additional centers met at least 20% of the HPCS.

Quality Standards/Assessments (ELC/DHS)

HAEYC supported the work of the Early Learning Council though the Quality subcommittee by providing an alignment of quality assessments with standards. The following 9 standards encompass the standard listed in Act 259.

Fundamental Principles


- Emphasize collaboration and partnerships of resources that currently exist.
- Recruitment into center-based programs is a priority. (20% of programs surveyed said biggest challenge to increasing capacity is lack of qualified staff)
- If we want people to attain a certain level of education and qualifications we need to provide the support and motivation they need to reach that level.
