Subject: S.B. 1060 Relating to Fireworks

I am Kenneth G. Silva, Chair of the State Fire Council (SFC) and Fire Chief of the Honolulu Fire Department (HFD). The SFC and the HFD support S.B. 1060, which proposes to increase fireworks permit and import license fees.

Fireworks permit and import license fees have not increased for nine years, even though the cost of services provided by fire, police, and emergency medical personnel continues to increase. During New Year's celebrations, the Honolulu Police Department responded to 1,566 fireworks-related incidents in 2007-2008 and 1,361 incidents in 2008-2009. Statewide, fire departments responded to 37 and 33 fireworks-related incidents for the same period, and fireworks injuries totaled 105 for 2007-2008 and 79 for 2008-2009. In addition, the counties bear the cost and responsibility of cleaning the streets and parks that are littered with fireworks debris. Along with the fire departments' responsibility to ensure the public's safety, the number of fireworks display permits and proper accounting of the pyrotechnic inventory items have increased.

The SFC and the HFD request your committee's support on the passage of S.B. 1060.

I am Robert F. Westerman, member of the State Fire Council and Fire Chief of the Kauai Fire Department (KFD). The SFC and KFD support S.B. 1060, which proposes to increase fireworks permit fees and the import license fee.

Fireworks permit and license fees have not increased for nine years, although the cost born by the counties in emergency services provided by police, fire and ambulance services continues to grow. Police responded to 1,566 and 1,361 fireworks related calls for 2007/2008 and 2008/2009 New Year's periods. Fire departments responded to 37 and 33 statewide fireworks related calls for the same New Year's period. Statewide fireworks injuries totaled 105 for 2007/2008 and 79 for the 2008/2009 period. In addition, the counties bear the cost and responsibility for cleanup for our streets and parks that are littered with fireworks debris. The number of fireworks display permits has increased and with them an increasing responsibility by fire departments to ensure the safety of the public and proper accounting of the pyrotechnic inventory items.

The SFC and the KFD request your committee's support on the passage of S.B. 1060.

Chairs & Committee Members:

We oppose any increase in firework permit fees for firecrackers. If anything, the existing permit fees should be directed to each county fire department as are the license fees. This can be done by adding the following sentence to 132D-10 of the law, while not increasing the permit fees as the measure dictates. Otherwise the permit fees will continue to go to the general fund of each county.

"The permit fees shall be used solely by each county fire department to pay for the salary of an auditor of fireworks and articles pyrotechnic records and all expenses incurred to fulfill the duties required, including the inspection of inventory and storage facilities, maintenance of required records, and the training of the auditor."

RE: TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF THE INTENT OF SB 1060 RELATING TO FIREWORKS

Chair Espero, Vice Chair Bunda and Committee Members:

The American Lung Association in Hawaii is pleased that this measure seeks to increase the fees for fireworks. However with over 154,000 people in Hawaii, or nearly 13 percent of our population suffering from some type of lung disease, that is made worse by exposure to the particulate smoke from fireworks, we believe a ban on consumer fireworks would do far more to protect our collective health. Assuring the cleanest air for everyone in Hawaii is important, especially with the recent increase in volcanic activity which compounds the to the danger of fireworks.

Hawaii has the second highest rate in the nation for childhood asthma and many adults, especially the elderly, suffer from chronic lung disease including emphysema and COPD (Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease). Even people who do not have lung problems often report eye, throat and lung irritation on New Year's Eve.

With so many people experiencing breathing problems directly related to fireworks, the American Lung Association in Hawaii strongly supports any measure that will help clear the air. Every year the American Lung Association publishes the State of the Air report for the nation and each state. Hawaii, with its generally clean air, receives high marks with the exception of a "D" for short-term air pollution as a result of one night – New Year's Eve.

It is time to act responsibly and stop this willful disregard for the health or our fellow citizens, especially those who might be unable to speak for themselves – our children and the elderly. Specific action to ban fireworks is what is called.

OPPOSITION TO SB1060

We are opposed to SB1060 which will increase the Consumer Firecracker Permit fees from \$25 to \$35.

One can surmise the intent of this bill: increase revenue for the respective County's general fund and eliminate firecracker use by making the firecracker fees unaffordable to the average Hawaii consumer. There are several concerns in light with this train of thought.

<u>CULTURAL ELEMENT</u>: Firecrackers and the New Year's celebration go hand in hand. Culturally, the belief is that the igniting of firecrackers at midnight will ward off bad luck and will call attention of the gods to bring in good luck for the upcoming year.

For those of Chinese ancestry, the ritual of firecrackers and the New Year is paramount to Chinese heritage. In addition to traditional New Year's, Chinese New Year is celebrated with just as much fan fare in Chinatown. Firecrackers are the catalytic element to this celebration.

<u>CREATION OF HOMEMADE FACSIMILES</u>: By making such a commodity unaffordable, it will encourage "creative manufacturing" of existing legal fireworks to simulate the effects of firecracker. Herein lays one of the greatest reasons for fireworks related injuries—homemade fireworks.

ENCOURAGE THE PURCHASE OF ILLEGAL FIRECRACKERS: Increasing the fees will make the purchase of illegal firecrackers (those sizes larger than the 5,000 unit count) more appealing. Why pay the additional fee for something "ordinary" like the legal 5,000 count firecracker, when a more exciting longer firecracker is available?

In summation, increasing the Consumer Firecracker Fee will have short term benefits--increase of revenue. But will reap long-term problems---additional and possibly major bodily injuries
due to the "creative manufacturing" of firecracker facsimiles and the encouragement to purchase
illegal firecrackers. Therefore, we are opposed to SB1060.
