Aloha Chair Tsuji, Vice Chair Wooley, and Members of the Committee,

I began Kula o Mala our community school garden behind the Salvation Army building in Honoka'a in September 2007. Since then, more than 145 youth, 15 handicapped adults, 35 community members have accessed the garden.

7th and 8th grade students from the Honoka'a Intermediate exploratory class, and the 6th grade Special Education science class come two times a week for science, math, and language arts integrated lessons. They love the hands-on opportunity the garden provides. The teachers bring their students to our garden because they are unable to have a garden in their school.

The YWCA Hamakua Youth Center participants work in the garden as part of their Makahiki training, and have started a Hawaiian Cultural garden with many varieties of ki, canoe plants, and other medicinals.

The handicapped adult participants from the Brantley Center Honoka'a come to garden with the keiki from the Hawaii Sustainable Education Initiative (a private school in Honoka'a) once a week. The Salvation Army Family Intervention Services Ke Kama Pono program at-risk youth also garden once a week, and use the produce at their group home.

All the groups using Kula o Mala including the students from Honoka'a Intermediate and the Hamakua Schoolhouse have committed to growing food for the Salvation Army Food Pantry. We hope to donate at least 40 pounds a week.

Countless parents and community members have thanked me for this project. Their children love the garden, and the produce they bring home benefit the families physically, nutritionally, and financially. Many students have begun their own small gardens in their homes.

By promoting a local food economy we are:

- 1. reconnecting ourselves with the aina,
- 2. empowering ourselves to produce our own nutritional needs, and
- 3. supporting a sustainable island economy.

My recommendation is for Ways and Means to fund this program. The long-term benefits to our agricultural economy will be significant, as the DOE is a secure contractor. Considering our current economy and uncertainty for the future, this program could grow our agricultural economy unlike any program on the horizon. I urge passage and funding for SB 1179, SD2.
