A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO REDUCED IGNITION PROPENSITY CIGARETTES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 132C-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending its title and subsection (a) to read as 3 follows: 4 "[+]\$132C-4[+] Certification; marking[-]; revolving fund. 5 Each manufacturer shall submit to the state fire council 6 written certification attesting that each cigarette has been 7 tested in accordance with, and has met the performance standard 8 required under section 132C-3. The description of each 9 cigarette listed in the certification shall include: 10 (1)The brand or trade name on the package; 11 (2)Style, such as light or ultra light; 12 (3) Length in millimeters; Circumference in millimeters; 13 (4)14 (5) Flavor, such as menthol, if applicable; 15 Filter or nonfilter; (6) 16 $(7)^{-}$ Package description, such as a soft pack or box; 17 (8)The mark approved pursuant to subsection (b);

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1	(9)	The name, address, and telephone number of the
2		laboratory, if different than the manufacturer that
3		conducted the test; and
4	(10)	The date that the testing occurred.
5	Each	cigarette certified under this subsection shall be
6	recertifie	ed every three years. For each cigarette listed in a
7	certificat	ion, a manufacturer shall pay to the state fire
8	council a	\$375 fee. The fees shall be deposited into a special
9	revolving	fund hereby created within the state treasury and to
10	be adminis	tered by the state fire council. Moneys from the
11	special re	volving fund shall be expended only for the purposes
12	of hiring	personnel to administer the reduced ignition
13	propensity	cigarette program and to cover any costs associated
14	with the p	rogram, including processing, testing, inspections,
15	and enforc	ement. The state fire council is authorized to

RELATING TO REDUCED IGNITION PROPENSITY CIGARETTES

Senate Bill No. 1255 delays the implementation of the reduced ignition propensity cigarettes law to September 30, 2010, and creates a revolving fund to receive \$375 fee every three years from the manufacturer for certification testing and authorizes the State Fire Council to expend the funds to cover the personnel and program costs.

We appreciate the intent of this bill. As a matter of general policy, this department does not support the creation of any special or revolving fund which does not meet the requirements of Sections 37-52.3 and 37-53.4 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. Special or revolving funds should: 1) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries of the program; 2) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 3) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. Although the State Fire Council is authorized to annually adjust the certification fee, it is difficult to determine whether the fund will be self-sustaining.

I am Kenneth G. Silva, Chair of the State Fire Council (SFC) and Fire Chief of the Honolulu Fire Department (HFD). The SFC and the HFD support S.B. 1255, which proposes to extend the RIPC compliance date from September 30, 2009, to September 30, 2010, to establish a special revolving fund with cigarette certification fees to be administered by the SFC.

The special revolving fund shall be expended only for costs associated with the RIPC program and hiring of personnel to administer and accomplish the following:

- Adopt administrative rules for program implementation, and establish compliance inspections, approved forms, and enforcement procedures and guidelines.
- Receive, verify, and approve certifications for approximately 1,100 different cigarette brands from manufacturers.

- Compile a list of the approved brands, verify state tax compliance with the State Department of the Attorney General, and post it on a state website.
- Review and approve, as needed, alternative test methods or fire standard compliance markings submitted by a manufacturer.
- Submit the compliance testing to an accredited laboratory to verify that all performance standards have been met, if needed.

The SFC's staff consists of one part-time employee funded by the State Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, to which the SFC is administratively attached. That employee is already tasked with other council duties, including application and administration of training grants, adoption of the state fire code, and coordination of meetings, travel, and other daily duties.

The SFC and the HFD urge your committee's support on the passage of S.B. 1255 to administer this important program, which will reduce the number of fires caused by cigarettes in our state.

I am Robert F. Westerman, member of the State Fire Council (SFC) and Fire Chief of the Kauai Fire Department (KFD). The SFC and the KFD support S.B. 1255, which proposes to extend the RIPC compliance date from September 30, 2009, to September 30, 2010, to establish a special revolving fund from the program fees to be administered by the SFC. The extension is needed for the SFC to hire staff personnel to accomplish the following:

- 1. Adopt administrative rules for program implementation; establish compliance inspections, approved forms and enforcement procedures and guidelines.
- 2. Receive, verify and approve certifications for approximately 1,100 different brands of cigarettes from the manufacturers.
- 3. Compile a list of all the approved brands, verify the state tax compliance with the attorney general's office, and post it on a state website.

Review and approve, as needed, any alternative test methods or fire standard compliance markings submitted by a manufacturer.

Submit the compliance testing to an accredited lab to verify that all performance standards have been met, if needed.

The special revolving fund is needed to allow the SFC to use the certification fees from the cigarette manufacturers to hire staff personnel and cover the cost of processing, testing, and any oversight activities required by the program. The SFC currently has one part-time staff employee funded by the state, who is already tasked with other council duties, including application/administration of training grants, state fire code adoption process, coordination of council meetings and travel and other daily council duties.

The SFC and the KFD urge your committee's support on the passage of S.B. 1255 to administer this important program which will reduce the number of fires caused by cigarettes in our state.
