SUBJECT: SB 1679 SD1 – RELATING TO THE EMERGENCY AND BUDGET RESERVE FUND

The position and views expressed in this testimony do not represent nor reflect the position and views of the Departments of Health (DOH) and Human Services.

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities (DD) **STRONGLY SUPPORTS SB 1679 SD1.** The purpose of the bill is to appropriate moneys from the emergency and budget reserve fund of the State of Hawaii to maintain the levels of programs determined to be essential to education, public health, and public welfare.

With respect to page 2, lines 14-16, the Council brings to your attention the shortfall projected for DD services in the current fiscal year. The amount stated as the projected shortfall is \$5.4 million. That amount included \$5 million for the Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Medicaid Waiver Program and \$400,000 for the Partnerships in Community Living (PICL) Program. DOH, DD Division's budget (HTH 501) for FY 2009 includes the elimination of the PICL Program and a reduction in services for individuals with DD/Mental Retardation (MR) in the HCBS Medicaid Waiver Program. In addition, DD Division is experiencing a shortfall of \$267,420 for crisis services network for the current fiscal year.

Standing Committee Report No. 416 provides a list of critical safety net programs with appropriation amount requests for each program. Attached is information about the DOH Respite Program, HCBS Medicaid Waiver Program, and DOH PICL Program to explain the appropriation amounts.

- A. \$500,000 for the DOH Respite Program
- B. \$7 million for the HCBS Medicaid Waiver Program
- C. \$500,000 for the PICL Program

The Council is hopeful that the Economic Recovery and Reinvestment Act will provide Hawaii with some level of fiscal recovery. Hawaii will benefit from the proposed enhanced Federal Medical Assistance Percentage. The increase in Federal reimbursements will result in a decrease in the State's share and would allow for State funds to be redirected to other priority areas not matched by Federal funds. This may include the DOH PICL and Respite Programs.

We appreciate your consideration of the appropriation amounts in the Committee Report and recognize that SB 1679 SD1 is a work in progress. We will continue to work with the Legislature on this measure throughout the session.

Thank you for the opportunity to present our testimony in strong support of SB 1679 SD1.

Department of Health (DOH) Respite Program

The DOH Respite Program's budget has been administered under the Health Resources Administration (HRA). The budget has taken its share of reductions of \$375,872 during the past 18 years resulting in \$624,128 for the program. Below is the breakdown of the budget and its reductions.

During the past year, the budget was affected by the four percent legislative reduction (\$30,732), transfer of funds to cover the payroll shortage for HRA (\$16,165), and adjustment for personal services (\$4,419). Those reductions left the program with \$572,812, until the Governor's proposed adjustments to the Executive Budget Request for FY 2010 and FY 2011 included the deletion of \$412,024 for respite services. The total reduction in the respite budget is \$463,340. Current budget for respite services is \$160,788. That amount divided by each of the six program areas means \$26,798 for each target group. Information about the DOH Respite Program and impact of the reduction in the budget is included in the attached FACT SHEET.

FACT SHEET

Department of Health (DOH) Respite Program

What is Respite?

- Respite provides temporary relief for a family, which helps to preserve the family unit by
 decreasing the individual and family stresses associated with caregiving so that families
 can continue to care for their loved ones. It is beneficial not only for the family caregiver,
 but also for the child or adult with special needs. It allows the family to engage in daily
 activities, decrease a feeling of isolation, increase the ability to cope with daily caregiving responsibilities, and maintain stability during crisis situations.
- Respite provides substitute support for a child or adult with special needs in order to
 provide a period of relief or rest for the family caregiver. Respite can allow time for the
 family caregiver to address personal needs, other business, or an unexpected
 emergency.
- Respite is an important part of the continuum of services for families who care for an
 individual with special needs. This support for families prevents burnout of the caregiver
 and reduces the possibility for out-of-home placement.

Who Receives Respite?

Families caring for a family member who is:

- An infant or toddler three years of age or younger with a developmental delay
- A child or adult up to age 21 with a serious or terminal illness
- A child with a serious emotional disturbance
- A child or an adult with a developmental disability
- · An adult with a serious mental illness

Who Provides Respite?

Currently, the Respite Program affords respite to the families of clients from six program areas of four divisions of DOH, per the intent of Act 324, SLH 1990. Each of these six program areas split the respite funds equally (approximately \$104,000 per program area - before budget reductions). In addition, the programs work together and have transferred funds between programs to cover shortfalls experienced by one or more of the other programs.

- Family Health Services Division Early Intervention Section (EIS) Provides respite support to families in two program areas medically fragile children or youth up to age 21 and infants and toddlers with developmental delays three years of age or younger.
- Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division (CAMHD) Provides respite support to families for children with a serious emotional disturbance.
- Developmental Disabilities Division (DDD) Provides respite support to families in two program areas – respite is available to families of individuals (children and adults) with developmental disabilities and/or mental retardation (DD/MR) who are <u>not</u> in the DD/MR Home and Community-Based Medicaid Waiver Program.
- Adult Mental Health Division (AMHD) Provides respite services via a single, statewide provider, Mental Health Kokua. A respite housing pilot was initiated that will present a valuable resource to families and providers in the community and a formal contract modification was completed. Due to the recent budget reduction of \$25 million

to the AMHD budget, the contract with Mental Health Kokua was terminated effective January 15, 2009. Respite funds were being used to supplement funds provided through the AMHD operating budget (approximately 25 percent of the total contract expenditures).

What is Extent of the Budget Reduction?

The respite program budget sustained a discretionary reduction for FY 09 of approximately \$51,316. The Governor's recommendation in the executive budget for the FB 2009-2011 further reduces the amount for respite by \$412,024, resulting in a total appropriation of \$160,788 to be shared among the six program areas.

What is the Impact of a Budget Reduction?

Overall, the budget reduction would have an adverse impact on the provision of respite for families and individuals with special needs. As respite is reduced, families will become more "at risk" for out-of-home placement, foster care, and possibly higher levels of care. In addition, it is more cost effective to provide respite funds to families than to pay for foster care or out-of-home placement if families are unable to care for their loved ones at home.

Family Health Services Division – Early Intervention Section (EIS) –

- A determination will need to be made as to whether to reduce the number of families served or reduce the respite hours per month.
- o The waitlist for respite services is expected to increase.
- Reduction in Federal grant funding general funds from the respite appropriation have been used as a "match" required to leverage the Federal Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention Grant.

Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division (CAMHD) –

 Possible increases in out-of-home placements and higher levels of care, such as therapeutic foster care, community-based residential care, or hospital-based residential care, which are much more restrictive and costly.

• .Developmental Disabilities Division (DDD) -

- Allotments for respite services of children and adults would decrease, with a more significant reduction of respite allotment for Neighbor Islands.
- Anticipates that it will be receiving more requests for respite services that will exceed their annual portion, particularly from families who do not qualify for Medicaid, are not eligible for the DD/MR Medicaid Waiver Program respite services, or have had a reduction in respite services under the waiver program.

- Adult Mental Health Division (AMHD) -
 - AMHD Respite services contract with Mental Health Kokua was terminated effective January 15, 2009. All consumers with open authorizations for respite as of January 1, 2009 were transitioned to AMHD Peer Coaching services that provide similar support for consumers and respite for caregivers delivered by a peer.

Department of Health (DOH), Developmental Disabilities (DD) Division Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Medicaid Waiver Program for Individuals with Developmental Disabilities/Mental Retardation (DD/MR)

- Provides individuals with DD/MR support and services that will enable them to live as independently as possible in the least restrictive environment. Services include:
 - Adult Dav Health
 - Personal Assistance
 - Respite
 - Habilitation
 - Habilitation-Supported Employment
 - Skilled Nursing
 - Specialized Services
 - Personal Emergency Response
 - Non-Medical Transportation
 - Specialized Medical Equipment
 - Environmental Accessibility Adaptations
- An individual must be eligible for Medicaid and require Intermediate Care Facility for the Mentally Retarded (ICF/MR) level of care.
- For FY 2008, 2,532 individuals were served, and \$107,145,000 was expended.
- DD Division will need about \$7 million more for FY 2010 in order to add 125 people into the waiver and continue level of services for those currently in the waiver.
- The budget remains at \$71million for FY 2010 and 2011.
- A letter from DOH, DD Division was mailed to over 2,500 participants in the HCBS Medicaid Waiver Program to inform them of a reduction in services for individuals with DD/MR.
- Based on the State's economic conditions, DD Division "must reduce all participant services by 15% in order to sustain our system of supports and maintain services."
- To do that, DD Division asked participants to tell the Division where the individual could make the reductions.
- Individuals were asked to complete a Budget Reduction Worksheet that contained their monthly target budget for February to June 2009 and a list of services.
- The reduction in services began on February 1, 2009.
- Services that are affected include:
 - 1. All levels of Personal Assistance Habilitation (including Chore).
 - 2. Adult Day Health,
 - 3. Consumer Directed (including Chore),
 - 4. Skilled Nursing, and
 - 5. Respite.
- The reduction in services will impact individuals in receiving necessary personal assistance and other services to live independently in the community.
- Over 2,000 participants have completed and returned their budget reduction worksheets.
- DD Division has sent out Notice of Action letters to those participants that included information on their right to appeal the decision of DD Division.
- Over 250 participants have filed an informal appeal with DD Division. Informal hearings have been scheduled beginning January 30, 2009.

Department of Health (DOH) Partnerships in Community Living (PICL) Program

- Prior to the proposed elimination of the program, PICL's budget was \$1.4 million.
- A mandatory reduction of \$1.2 million was made in August 2008.
- Remaining \$200,000 was eliminated in the Governor's proposed budget for FY 2010 and FY 2011.
- Contracts with providers were terminated in December 2008.
- In accordance with Hawaii Revised Statutes, Section 333F-2(e), "...Only those
 individuals eligible for community services but not eligible for Medicaid waiver
 services or other federally reimbursed programs or for whom such services are
 not appropriate or not available based on their individual service plan shall
 receive services and supports with one hundred percent state funds."
- All participants, however, must first apply for Medicaid and the Developmental Disabilities/Mental Retardation (DD/MR) Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Medicaid Waiver Program prior to the receipt of any DD Division-funded services.
- The intent of PICL was to be a flexible source of funding to allow individuals to self-direct their supports to live in the community.
- For individuals with DD who are ineligible for Medicaid or any other federally-reimbursed services, PICL is their only source of support.
- Individuals receive services in the following cases:
 - 1. Pending determination for Medicaid waiver services;
 - 2. Medicaid eligible, but the Medicaid waiver or other program does not cover the service or item; or
 - 1. Ineligible for Medicaid or any other federally reimbursed services, but eligible to receive community services.
- Services include, but are not limited to:

Adaptive equipment

Adult community activities

Companionship

Clothing

Cleaning, kitchen, bathroom household supplies

Day program costs not covered by Medicaid waiver

Dental

Emergency supplies

Emergency placement supports

Legal services

Personal care items

Specialized youth program

Transportation

Technology supports

• Funding was limited (\$2,000 per referral), and referrals were on a first-come, first-served basis.

For FY 2008, there were 1,404 referrals with \$1,153,519 expended.

Support of SB 1679, Relating to the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund

Dear Senator Mercado Kim and Members of the Committee:

The County of Kaua'i Agency on Elderly Affairs is in full support of SB 1679, which would appropriate funding for Hawai'i's Healthy Aging Partnership (HAP) and the development of the Aging and Disability Resource Centers. Both initiatives support the Administration on Aging's (AoA) Choices for Independence, which empowers older adults to improve their health through evidence-based, disease prevention programs and provides the opportunity for them to gain knowledge through the ADRC about choices and options for long-term care.

Evidence-based programs/HAP

It is important for us to continue to support Hawai'i's aging network's capacity in evidence-based programming and effectively embed two of the programs currently being implemented, Ke Ola Pono, the Chronic Disease Self-Management Program (CDSMP) and EnhanceFitness, a physical activity program for older adults. This bill includes support for HAP to continue its development statewide.

For over five years, the KAEA has been a part of the Healthy Aging initiative. Since 2007, the KAEA and its local partnership have been working together to provide the EnhanceFitness program, which has now expanded to six sites here on Kaua'i. We have witnessed the impact on the lives of our seniors who participate at these one hour classes offered 3 times a week. The seniors have enjoyed the classes, seeing the benefits of increased strength, endurance, and balance and the opportunity for socialization in this group exercise program. Performance measures have also shown significant improvement in their lower body strength and agility, an important aspect to fall prevention.

More recently, we also began implementation of the Chronic Disease Self-Management Program, in partnership with the Kaua'i District Health Office. Through this program, older adults with chronic illnesses are empowered to do goal setting and action planning with a 6-week series of classes, learning about topics to help them to better manage their health.

Healthy aging is about empowering our elders to make healthier choices for their future. The evidence is overwhelming that older adults who make healthier choices live longer and better

lives and benefit from reduced healthcare costs by making behavioral changes that will reduce their risk of disease, disability and injury.

Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC)

We are currently in the development stage in preparation for Kaua'i's ADRC. Older adults, persons with special needs, and caregivers of older adults and grandparents raising grandchildren would be provided access to information on an array of resources in one central place. The ADRC would support them in learning about programs and services in our community and at the statewide level. An appropriation would support the AEA, other counties, and our State Executive Office on Aging in our continued coordination and implementation, which includes management information system products, consultation, maintenance, and technical support. In addition, consumer education and outreach would be included to reach our target population through media and print.

With your support, we can move forward in making systemic changes at the statewide and community levels for our older adults and families. We appreciate your consideration and support of SB 1679.

Hawaii's Healthy Start program is regarded as foundational to our early learning system. The hospital screenings as well as the home visits are critical to the prevention of child abuse and neglect for Hawaii's families. Goodwill Industries of Hawaii, Inc. ("Goodwill") submits this testimony in support of Senate Bill 1679. Goodwill receives funding from the Department of Health-Developmental Disabilities Division ("DOH-DDD") via a DHS Medicaid Waiver Contract to operate Adult Day Health and Personal Assistance/Habilitation programs for individuals with significant developmental disabilities on Oahu and in East Hawaii (Hilo). Participants in Goodwill's programs and their families are Medicaid Waiver recipients who have limited socioeconomic resources. Waiver programs are essential for the public health, safety, welfare and education of individuals with developmental disabilities.

The projected budget shortfall for developmental disabilities services in the current fiscal year resulted in DOH-DDD mandating that individuals in Medicaid Waiver programs reduce services by 15% or greater, depending on the individual or families' utilization rates, effective February 1, 2009. Individuals and families were forced to immediately reduce critical services and necessary programs, such as those operated by Goodwill. In some cases, families are choosing between taking a shift at their jobs or caring for their dependent disabled family member creating more difficult economic circumstances for families.

In addition, since services have been reduced, Goodwill has also felt the effects resulting in our need to cut back our staff who provide direct service hours in our Waiver programs, and experienced employees have been laid off.

Goodwill is in strong support of Senate Bill 1679. The emergency and budget reserve fund of \$7,000,000 should be used to maintain the previous level of Medicaid Waiver programs which are essential for the health, safety, welfare and education of individuals with developmental disabilities. The DOH-DDD's mandated budget reductions should be reversed as soon as possible.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony supporting Senate Bill 1679, SD1.

We are the agency mandated by federal law and designated by Executive Order to protect and advocate for the human, civil and legal rights of Hawaii's estimated 180,000 people with disabilities.

We strongly support this bill and are delighted to see the legislature acknowledge that despite our economic difficulties at the moment, we cannot as a society allow the needlest and weakest amongst us to fall through a safety net of basic, necessary services. In recent months, our office has been extensively involved with clients affected by recent budget cuts. We represent many individuals with mental illness who have been affected by cuts in the AMHD Budget. Currently, we are in the midst of representing many families who are affected by the cuts experienced at the Developmental Disabilities Division.

We are particularly concerned that in this area, the problems facing the DD Division have been somewhat self inflicted by the Administration. For the past several years, they have been budgeting year to year with a heightened dependence on emergency appropriations. Last year, the Division requested a larger base budget than they were permitted to seek from the legislature by the Governor. At that time, they were told that if they ran short of funds, they should simply seek another emergency appropriation. However, this year, the Governor

has instructed them they cannot seek that emergency appropriation. That is why they are in the fiscal predicament they face and must cut services.

This example illustrates the importance of securing a solid, accurately planned out, base budget. Recognizing that general funds will be stretched thin to support a variety of necessary and worthwhile efforts, we support this bill and the legislature's desire to use the emergency budget and reserve fund. We believe that the circumstances facing the state justify the use of these funds for these purposes.

We are also pleased to see funds included for respite care. Caregiver burnout is a well recognized phenomenon in these cases. This is where respite care proves to be invaluable as it provides an opportunity for the caregiver to either perform other essential chores or simply avail themselves of a brief time out so they can rejuvenate themselves. This money is extremely well spent from a quality of life and economic perspective. For those reasons, we support this bill.

Healthy Start, Hawaii's nationally recognized and evidence-based child abuse prevention program is first cut 29% in FY 09 and then eliminated from the Governor's proposed budget for FY 10, FY 11. 4,000 families at risk of child abuse will have no alternative program if Healthy Start is gone. 200 employees in nonprofit organizations all over the state will lose their jobs costing an estimated \$2.5 million in unemployment costs.

Adults struggling with mental illness had their services reduced from 3 hours a week to 3 hours a month in a major budget cut from the Adult Mental Health Division. Many employees were laid off by the organizations that received these funding cuts.

A 15% cut to services to the developmentally disabled was announced for February 1, 2009.

How much further can we erode the services to these at risk populations before we are facing tragedies due to child abuse, suicides, or other serious problems?

Child & Family Service supports SB 1679 because it seeks to protect and/or restore services in key areas of education, human services, and health. This is an excellent use of Rainy Day Funds so that the most vulnerable in our community can continue to receive services that will help them stay safe and maintain or improve their overall functioning. The use of these funds will reduce the risk of more serious problems occurring due to programs closing or shrinking. Don't we owe it to our community to protect our keiki, ohana, the mentally ill and disabled, and our kupuna?

I urge you to support SB 1679 and keep enough services in place during these difficult economic times. Mahalo for the opportunity to provide comments today.

Hawaii Waiver Providers Association (HWPA) Position Statement on Recent Budget Reductions

WHO WE ARE

HWPA is a statewide association comprised of 19 service providers affording leadership to collaborate and shape the service system to meet the needs of people with developmental disabilities. Founded in 2001, HWPA's mission is to provide the necessary resources to develop, strengthen, and attain the highest standards of excellence for the developmental disabilities community.

SYNOPSIS OF SITUATION

Approximately 2,500 individuals statewide with significant disabilities and limited socioeconomic resources were impacted by the recent mandated budget reductions set forth by the State of Hawaii Department of Health-Developmental Disabilities Division ("DOH-DDD"). The specific reductions have affected the Developmentally Disabled/Mental Retardation ("DD/MR") Medicaid Waiver recipients reducing services for people with disabilities of 15% or greater, depending on the individual or families' utilization rates, effective February 1, 2009.

CONCERNS AND POTENTIAL IMPACT

The primary goal of the DD/MR Waiver is to promote community inclusion in the least restrictive environment and to prevent institutionalization. The Hawaii Waiver Provider Association (HWPA) is deeply concerned that the budget reductions will reverse the intended goal the Waiver was intended to promote and presents the following concerns and potential impact the service reductions will have.

Lack of Timely Notification

The entire stakeholder community of all participants, families and provider representatives did not receive proper notice and sufficient time to respond, plan and prepare for the reductions. The abbreviated timeline only allowed legal guardians a maximum of ten (10) days to analyze the letter and make the important decision about which services must be immediately reduced. Primary care providers are being forced to make decisions about their own work schedules in order to care for family members. This work schedule reduction will pose undue economic hardship on Medicaid dependent families with limited socioeconomic resources.

Insufficient Notice of the Appeal Process

Individuals and families were not adequately notified and informed of the right and process to appeal the DOH's decision to reduce Medicaid services by 15%.

Lack of Assessment to Determine Risk of Safety and Health Issues

There was an inadequate assessment of safety and health needs to determine the individual health and safety impact of reductions for each service recipient to include identification of alternate resources. This has left recipients without service for a minimum of 1-2 full days a week potentially totaling 15-20 hours per week. There is the potential for care providers to select an unqualified person to support the recipient, further comprising the individual's health and safety.

Individual Plans Being Revised to Meet State Needs

Individual service plans, which are required by the Federal government, are being revised to reflect what the State can afford and not what individuals actually need on a daily basis. Legal guardians and primary care providers unable to retain support may be faced with alternate residential placements for their family members in long-term care facilities, which this program is specifically designed to prevent.

Crucial Services Provided by Agencies Are Compromised

Agencies providing crucial services are reporting actual losses of up to 40%. Operationally agencies will have one week to analyze the impact after receiving final confirmation of each individual's revised service budgets. Provider agencies will need to immediately reduce staff and the availability of services. Service providers will not be able to sustain the loss of business resulting in the closure of provider agencies and ultimately a weaker community infrastructure for persons with severe disabilities.

RECOMMENDATION

In the unlikely event future reductions may be necessary, the DOH must ensure that all participants, families and provider representatives receive adequate notice with complete information and sufficient time to respond, plan and prepare for the reductions.

Immediately ensure that all individuals and families receive notification and complete information of their rights and of the process to appeal DOH's decision to reduce services.

Develop a comprehensive risk assessment and response plan to address all potential health and safety issues that will arise from mandated service reductions.

Develop and establish the Individual Budgeting process to include sound assessments procedures. Follow the methodical and fair process that was implemented for the age thirteen (13) and under recipients.

DOH-DDD must analyze the process in which these significant reductions were implemented and determine best practices and procedures. DOH-DDD should start fiscal year July 2009 with specific solutions in place.

Determine other potential budget reduction possibilities within the DOH to include internal administrative functions that do not directly compromise the health and safety of Hawaii's citizens with developmental disabilities.

Secure the necessary funds to meet the critical needs of vulnerable populations. Strongly advocate for an increase in the FMAP (Federal matching funds) to reestablish safety net services for individuals with developmental disabilities.

For over seven years, KKV Elderly Services Program has been a vital resource for Kalihi seniors.

Kokua Kalihi Valley has been one of the Kupuna Care Service providers for the past 8 years. Kupuna Care Services provides case management, care giver support and respite care, health maintenance, individual and family counseling, transportation services, and easy access to dental and medical services to frail residents who are 60-years-old or older and their families. I strongly support all Senate bills relating to maintaining (preferably increasing) funding for the administration, coordination, and delivery of Kupuna Care services.

The funding for KUPUNA CARE is critical to help seniors avoid premature institutional placement. Continuing to live in one's own home with adequate support and regular opportunities for participation in meaningful activities, as a member of the community, has been clearly shown to give seniors a greater sense of control over their lives, resulting in healthier seniors and a higher quality of life. The improvement in physical and mental function and reduction in the need for special care, following such simple interventions has since been repeatedly demonstrated in studies across the nation

Working with over five hundred (500) participants in the KKV Elderly Services Program for the past 8 years, I see clear evidence of the improved quality of life for our elders and the savings in health care costs when people have ready access to useful information and activities. Members of the Ways and Means Committee have an open invitation to visit our program and meet the participants first hand.

Thank you for your work in continuing the support for this very important legislation. I can say with complete assurance, our community will greatly appreciate and benefit from the services these funds can provide. The need is great.


Chair Kim and members of the Senate Ways and Means Committees, I am Debbie Shimizu, Executive Director of the National Association of Social Workers (NASW), Hawaii Chapter. NASW is the largest professional organization for social workers in Hawaii. We are testifying in **SUPPORT of SB 1679 SD1.**

During the past decade, the state has been slowly handing over its responsibility of providing direct services to individuals and families to the private, nonprofit sector through purchase of service contracts. The Governor in her state of the state address was proud of the many achievements the state has made working with its' community partnerships. However, now when the state is in a fiscal crisis, the state is cutting funds to those contracts. This will ultimately result in dismantling many of the programs that the state was proud of.

The Center on Budget and Policy Priorities (CBPP) is a policy organization that works on federal and state fiscal policy and public programs that affect low- and moderate-income families and individuals. In a report in February 2008, CBPP cautioned states from implementing across the board cuts to address its fiscal crisis. Instead CBPP fiscal advisors recommended that policy makers be more careful about cutting programs that affect low-income residents. They encouraged the use of rainy day funds to minimize the need to cut programs that are designed to assist state's residents the most during economic downturns.

Now is not the time to be cutting services that help vulnerable populations. I urge your favorable consideration of SB 1679 SD1.

SECOH (Special Education Center of Hawaii), is a private, nonprofit organization with a mission to provide services and supports to people with developmental disabilities, or acquired disabilities due to aging or head injuries.

We strongly SUPPORT S.B. 1679 SD1, Relating to The Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund, which provides appropriations for various "safety net" services including the State of Hawaii Department of Health-Developmental Disabilities Division (DOH-DDD) Developmentally Disabled/Mental Retardation (DD/MR) Medicaid Waiver Service program, the DOH Respite program and the DOH Partnerships in Community Living (PICL) program. These programs were recently eliminated or reduced leaving people with severe intellectual and physical disabilities and their families to fend for themselves as they watch the programs designed to protect them destroy them.

The elimination or reduction in services has left the majority of our customers without adult day care services 1-2 days per week and without personal assistance services for up to 20 hours per week. Family members and primary care providers have had to reduce their own work schedules or hire privately to care for their family members causing them economic hardship in already economically challenging times. Consequently many of our family members and primary care providers albeit devastating are considering out-of-home residential placement of their loved ones into long-term care facilities, which this program was designed to prevent.

Hawaii's citizens with developmental disabilities due to no fault of their own are an extremely intellectually, physically, and economically vulnerable population. These programs are vital to the survival and inclusion of people with developmental disabilities in our society. Our disability service sector has worked tirelessly for the last twenty years to build the DD/MR home and community based waiver program so we could close the state institution Waimano Training School and Hospital and support people with disabilities to have meaningful lives in an inclusive society. We must not put the lives of these people in jeopardy of institutionalization again. We have made too much progress to throw it all way.

An appropriation to restore these programs and services at previously prescribed levels will ensure basic health and safety protections and allow us to continue our fight in support of full and meaningful lives for people with developmental disabilities. I respectfully request and encourage your committee to PASS Support of Senate Bill 1679 SD1 Relating to the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund.

Many in our community are suffering due to job loss, the mortgage crisis and the general economic downturn which is affecting not only people with limited resources but also those of the middle class. Experience and studies show increases in domestic violence and child abuse in times of economic crisis.

In previous hearings of the Senate Health and Human Services Committee, many of us have testified as to the need for the Healthy Start and Enhanced Healthy Start programs related to the safety and well being of high risk infants. We has also testified as to the effectiveness and cost benefit of the Healthy Start program, as well as the fact that Enhanced Healthy Start does not replace the functions of Healthy Start..

These funds will be sorely needed as part of the effort to maintain these services for the highest risk families. The service providers are in the process of developing a more streamlined assessment process and services that will actually intervene with only the highest risk families, those with scores of 40 and over on the Family Stress Checklist, who according to the validation study on the Checklist have a 50% likelihood of becoming a child welfare case.

Thank you very much for your serious consideration of allocating these funds to the Healthy Start and Enhanced Healthy Start programs, as well as to other needed services.

Individual Testimony of Audrey Suga-Nakagawa

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of S.B. # 1679 – "Relating to the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund" which provides temporary supplemental funding for Hawaii's safety net programs especially for vulnerable populations such as children, the elderly, and disabled persons. One of the safety net programs included in this bill is the Aging and Disability Resource (also refer as ADRC) Project, listed under SECTION 10. This bill supports the ADRC Project development and coordination that are currently underway.

The ADRC is part of a national effort to establish a single-entry, one-stop service that help people make informed decisions about long term services and options. In a collaborative effort under the U.S. Health and Human Services, the Administration on Aging (AoA) and the Centers of Medicare and Medicaid Services had awarded 47 states and territories throughout the U.S including Hawaii. State grantees received \$800,000 for a three year period to start up the ADRC sites in its respective communities.

The goal of the ADRC program is to empower individuals to make informed choices and streamline access to long term support which includes in-home care, community based programs and institutional services such as nursing homes and other programs that are designed to help the elderly and individuals with disabilities including the younger adult population. In many communities, long term support services are administered by multiple agencies, and have complex, fragmented, and often duplicative intake, assessment, and eligibility functions. It is often difficult and confusing for consumers to access information and navigate the long term care system. A single, coordinated system of information and access for all persons seeking long term care support minimizes this confusion, enhances individual choice and supports informed decision making. The ADRC reduces duplication in paperwork and streamlines the process to find and apply for needed services in a timely manner.

There are two pilot sites on the islands of Hawaii and Oahu. The Executive Office on Aging (EOA), which is administratively attached to the Department of Health, serves as

My name is Ellen Ching and for the past 25 years, I have served as the Executive Director of The Arc of Kauai. The Arc of Kauai is a private non-profit organization that was formed by parents in 1961. Our primary mission is to secure for all people with developmental disabilities the opportunity to realize their goals and to choose where and how they learn, live, work and play. To this end, The Arc of Kauai develops implements and maintains a variety of programs and services for approximately 191 individuals.

I am writing this letter in strong support of SB 1679, SD1.

This bill will restore funding for the Department of Health's Respite Program, the Partnerships in Community Living (PICL) Program and the DD/MR Waiver Program.

The budget cuts have resulted in the termination of the PICL Program and the loss of \$395,505.00 in services to children and adults on Kauai. The budget reductions to the DD/MR Waiver Program at a minimum will result in the loss of approximately \$162,850.64 in services. The full impact of the loss of DD/MR services is still unknown as families are appealing the budget cuts and service reductions.

The real tragedy however is human suffering and the burden this puts on our families...a single elderly mom with two adults with developmental disabilities that was counting on the PICL funds to provide services to her son for eight weeks while she is in Honolulu with her daughter who needs treatment for breast cancer. She was also counting on MR/DD services for her daughter whose prognosis is about another 4 years.

A mother suddenly dies on December 24, 2008 and leaves behind a grieving family that includes an ailing husband and a daughter with developmental disabilities. Her other daughter, moves her sister with a developmental disability into her home but she doesn't even know her sister's social security number or the numerous things involved in caring for her sister. On January 2nd, a letter is received telling her she must make a decision to cut her sister's services which will result in the loss of one day of service by January 12th. She and her husband work and cannot take care of her during the week. On January 3rd, they buried their mom.

While we are fully aware that budget cuts are necessary, we do not believe that the process in which families were asked to make these cuts was fair or equitable throughout the MR/DD Waiver Program. Without clear or full information, most of the families felt intimidated and reduced their services. We hope that should we be faced with a similar situation, a rate reduction will be instituted so that families can continue to support their loved ones with developmental disabilities.

This adult receives Medicaid Waiver services to attend Adult Day Health program daily and now they are being told that services must be reduced. This family wants to keep their sister with them but is having difficulty make things work. Because they are working and must continue to work to support themselves and now their sister they don't know where to turn if she cannot attend a day program on a daily basis.

Another frantic call came from a single mother who is working. He son utilizes services so she can work. They have no family here on Kauai that can help them and they are frantic. She must continue to work and her son is not able to stay by himself as he is not aware of dangers around him.

An elderly mother called to say that her son must have a program to go to daily. He wants to go to an Adult Day Health program to learn new things and be with his friends and this budget reduction will not allow him to do this. This mother reports that her son is angry and does not understand why he cannot do this and it is difficult for her.

I have also been invoked in the Partnership in Community Living program that has assisted consumers and their families. As this contract was at first reduced then terminated, families were in a quandary. The assistance they received from this PICL program helped keep their

family members healthy and safe. Some medical needs are being met on Oahu and extra assistance is needed to transport them there, a computer is needed to assist with communication, medication for someone who does not qualify for Medicaid services are needed, dental care must be up kept and families don't know how to obtain these services without funding.

Many other calls have been received and I don't know what to tell them. Everyone has been looking for other resources to help them but in these economic times there are none. They want to keep their families intact, healthy, and safe but don't know how to do this.



Senate Bill No. 1679, S.D. 1, appropriates funds from the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund for Fiscal Year 2010 and Fiscal Year 2011 to the Departments of Health, Human Services, and Education to maintain levels of programs determined to be essential to education, public health and public welfare and for grants to private agencies.

We are opposed to this bill. Rather than using the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund to supplement general funds, in light of the critical budget shortfall facing the State, we believe it is more appropriate to use the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund to replace general funds. Accordingly, in Senate Bill No. 882, we have proposed to use \$60 million from the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund to replace general funds that are currently appropriated for the health care payments program in Fiscal Year 2009. In addition, in Senate Bill No. 883, we have proposed to use another \$15 million from the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund to replace general fund appropriations for the health care payments program in Fiscal Year 2010. This will leave the Emergency and Budget Reserve Fund with projected balances of \$6.2 million, \$3.5 million and \$15.7 million in Fiscal Years 2009, 2010 and 2011, respectively.

The Arc in Hawaii strongly supports SB 1679 SD 1.

SB 1679 SD 1 would, among other important purposes, restore recent reductions in Medicaid waiver payments to a large number of persons with developmental disabilities.

These reductions have left many of the people that we serve without vital services that they have come to rely upon. In a typical case, our clients have lost one out of their five regular days of Adult Day Health services.

This has denied them of meaningful habilitation services and daily activities for a full day. In addition, finding alternate care for these persons on the service day that has been eliminated has caused a strain on the working families who must now care for these individuals on one work day per week.

The curtailment of service has adversely affected the health and safety of many of our clients.

The Arc in Hawaii serves over 170 persons with developmental disabilities, many on a 7-day 24-hour basis, more than 90 of whom receive Medicaid waiver service.
