## SB 2032 - SUPPORT

Aloha Chair Chun Oakland and Committee Members:

The Hawai'i Alliance for Community Based Economic Development (HACBED) is submitting testimony in support of SB 2032 which establishes an economic opportunity poverty reduction task force.

We thank you for proposing the creation of a task force that would: 1) assess current state policies and practices, along with evidence-based solutions utilized in other states, that promote economic opportunity and poverty reduction; and 2) develop a plan to expand economic opportunities in Hawaii to reduce the number of families in poverty.

As families and communities struggle to get through these hard economic times, a joint legislative task force that seeks strategies to reduce poverty in Hawai'i, with a goal of reducing poverty by at least 50 percent by 2020, is very much needed to help families reach self sufficiency and move out of poverty.

Across the nation, asset building has proven to help families move out of poverty. Asset building strategies help families advance economic opportunities for themselves, save and build assets so they are able to reach self sufficiency and not fall back into poverty. Assets are important for three reasons:

- 1. To have financial security against difficult times

At the end of 2009, the State Asset Building Task Force completed its final report on strategies that can help families move out of poverty and build assets.
