TESTIMONY TO THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION

Senate Bill 2105, Senate Draft 2 - Relating to Parking for Disabled Persons

The Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) strongly supports Senate Bill 2105, Senate Draft 2 which amends Section 291, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to improve the administration of the parking program for persons with disabilities. DCAB is the State agency responsible for the overall coordination and administration of this federally required program. DCAB is also responsible for promulgating administrative rules, Hawaii Administrative Rules Title 11, Chapter 219, to implement the program. This bill is a companion to House Bill 2574 passed earlier by this Committee.

Although the counties have issued the permits on behalf of the State, the proposed amendment in the bill more accurately reflects the legal requirements of the federal law while still providing the State with the flexibility needed through agreements with the counties similar to drivers licenses, motor vehicle registration fees, etc. Federal law, P.L. 100-641, the Uniform System for Handicapped Parking (1991) establishes the State as the entity responsible for the program. Thus, the permit (placard or license plate) is a State permit and the federal requirements are imposed on the State, not the counties. Section 2 of the bill allows DCAB to enter into an agreement with the counties to issue placards on behalf of DCAB/State with financial arrangements contingent upon funding.

The bill also removes the reimbursement rate to the counties from the statute and places it into administrative rules. As public policy, the rates should not be in the statute. The bill also permits the counties to retain any transaction fees collected, an amount they currently remit to the State general fund. This will simplify accounting.

Finally, the bill also extends the life of the placard from four to six years. This will, in the long run, be a cost saving measure that will not compromise the integrity of the certification process. It will also make it more convenient for the customer with a disability to have the placard remain current for a longer period of time.

We strongly urge your passage of this bill.

SUBJECT: SB 2105 SD2 – RELATING TO PARKING FOR DISABLED PERSONS

The position and views expressed in this testimony do not represent nor reflect the position and views of the Department of Health.

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities **SUPPORTS THE INTENT OF SB 2105 SD2**. The purpose of this bill is to designate the Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) as the issuing agency responsible for removable windshield placards, temporary removable windshield placards, special license plates, and identification cards. The bill also deletes the Counties as the issuing agency and increases qualifying disability from four to six years.

Designating DCAB as the issuing agency would result in an increase in overall administrative efficiency in implementing the parking program and elimination of unnecessary duplication between DCAB and the Counties. Extending the life of the placard from four to six years would be a cost savings to the State and not negatively affect the integrity of the program.

Support for SB 2105, SD2 - Relating to Parking for Disabled Persons

Dear Transportation Committee,

I am an individual with a disability who uses a power wheelchair. I have a van that deploys a ramp from the passenger side of the vehicle. I need to park my van in a parking space reserved for persons with disabilities that provides an adjacent access aisle. Because I have a parking placard, I am able to use such parking spaces. Thus, SB 2105, SD2, Relating to Parking for Disabled Persons, is of significant interest to me.

I am writing to express strong support for SB 2105, SD2. The bill amends the existing statute by defining "issuing agency" to mean the Disability and Communication Access Board, an agency of the State of Hawaii. This designation is appropriate because it comports with 23 CFR 1235, which makes each state responsible for establishing a uniform system of parking for persons with disabilities, including the issuance of disabled parking placards.

In addition, the bill extends the certification of disability from four (4) years to six (6) years. This modest change will reduce the burden of obtaining recertification of eligibility for individuals with permanent conditions such as myself. If an individual's eligibility status changes or the individual passes away while the placard is still valid, the administrative rules (§ 11-219-8, HAR) provides a mechanism for recovery of the placard. Importantly, under this amendment, the State's cost would decrease because the number of renewal placards issued per year would correlatively decrease.

Therefore, for the reasons above, I urge the committee to support this bill. Thank you for considering my testimony. Please contact me by mail, e-mail, or phone if you have any questions. Mahalo nui.

My name is Anthony Lenzer. I have a neurological problem which makes walking for any distance difficult. For several years, I have had a disability placard, and it has been a Godsend. I live in Kailua, and have to drive to town frequently for medical appointments, meetings, etc., including those at the Capitol. Having the placard enables me to park at or near these sites.

The provision in SB 2105 extending the time period for which the placard is valid from four to six years is definitely desirable from the point of view of the recipient. It means that he or she needs to apply less frequently, which also means less waiting in line at the issuing office. It should also save the State money, which is critical at this time.

Therefore I urge you to support SB 2105, SD 2, and thank you for the opportunity to submit this testimony.
