TESTIMONY ON SB 2139, SD2 to the COMMITTEE ON ECONOMIC REVITALIZATION.BUSINESS, & MILITARY AFFAIRS

March 11, 2010

Good morning Chair Angus L.K. McKelvey, Vice-Chair Isaac W. Choy, and members of the House Committee on Economic Revitalization, Business, & Military Affairs.

I am Mark Moses, Director of the Office of Veterans Services (OVS). I appreciate this opportunity to strongly support SB 2139 SD2, which requires the director of the office of veterans' services to act on behalf of deceased veterans found to be indigent at the time of death and without surviving immediate family members to ensure the burial or cremation and interment of the veteran's remains in a state veterans cemetery

This issue has come to our attention and we believe it must be addressed. As veterans' age and the number of World War II, Korean War, Vietnam War and those who participated in the Global War on Terrorism spend their final days alone their remains are discovered in their residence or elsewhere. In some cases there are family members who are willing to sign documents allowing for either cremation or burial, however, our experience has been that there is a significant number of veterans without family who require assistance from OVS to make their final arrangements. There is no need for funding, as the veterans' cemetery will receive reimbursement from the Federal Government.

We ask the committee amend line 15 to read "cremation and interment or inurnment." Inurnment is appropriate for cremated remains.

Our goal is to assure that each veteran who is entitled to military honors and placement in a veteran's cemetery receives these appropriate services.

Thank you for allowing me to present the Veterans' perspective on this issue. I will respond to any questions.
