TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL 2163 A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RELATING TO THE PRACTICE OF NURSING

Senator Ige and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Public Safety cannot support Senate Bill 2163 as it pertains to Advance Practice Registered Nurses having the authority to dispense controlled substances. Page 5, lines 12-18 of Senate Bill 2163 proposes to add the following language to section 457 Hawaii Revised Statutes "The scope of an advanced practice registered nurse includes but is not limited to advanced assessment and the diagnosis, prescription, selection, administration, and dispensation of therapeutic measures including over the counter drugs, legend drugs, and controlled substances within the advanced practice registered nurse's role and specialty-appropriate education and certification." The addition of this paragraph as written would authorize Advanced Practice Registered Nurses to have the ability to independently open a medical office or clinic and

have the authority to prescribe, administer, **order**, **maintain and dispense** controlled substances to their patients.

Section 329-1 defines the term "Dispense" in relation to a practitioner to mean to deliver a controlled substance to an ultimate user or research subject by packaging, labeling, or compounding necessary to prepare the substance for that delivery. A controlled substance is dispensed when:

(2) It is compounded, prepared, labeled and packaged for delivery to the ultimate user by a practitioner acting in the usual course of his professional practice;

The Department feels that Advanced Practice Registered Nurses with prescriptive Authority should not be authorized to independently maintain a supply of controlled substances for the intent to dispense controlled substances directly to patients.

The Department recommends an amendment of Chapter 329, Hawaii Revised Statutes, Section 329-1 definition for "Advanced Practice Registered Nurse with Prescriptive Authority." The amendment would read as follows:

"Advanced Practice Registered Nurse with Prescriptive Authority," means a person licensed under section 457-8.6, who is registered under this chapter to administer, or prescribe a controlled substance under the authority and supervision of a physician registered under section 329-33. Under this section Advanced Practice Registered Nurses with Prescriptive Authority are not

authorized to request, receive, or sign for professional controlled substance samples."

The Department also feels that Advanced Practice Registered Nurses like Physician Assistants should not be authorized to recommend the medical use of marijuana. The Department recommends that section 329-121 definitions also be amended to read as follows:

"Physician" means a person who is licensed under chapter 453 and is licensed with authority to prescribe drugs and registered under section 329-32 and possesses a valid Federal Controlled Substance registration. "Physician" does not include physician's assistant or advanced practice registered nurse with prescriptive authority as described in section 453-5.3 and 457-8.6."

### TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL NO. 2163, RELATING TO THE PRACTICE OF NURSING.

TO THE HONORABLE DAVID Y. IGE, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

My name is Kathy Yokouchi and I am the Executive Officer of the Board of Nursing ("Board"). On behalf of the Board, I thank you for the opportunity to present testimony in support of Senate Bill No. 2163 and to request an amendment to the bill based on the Board's concern.

This bill defines the practice of nursing; directs the Board to adopt certain provisions of the National Council of State Boards of Nursing ("NCSBN") Model Nursing Practice Act ("MNPA") and Model Nursing Administrative Rules ("MNAR"); delineates the scope of practice for registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, and advanced practice registered nurses; and repeals Hawaii Administrative Rules relating to prescriptive authority for advanced practice registered nurses.

The Board is in support of Senate Bill No. 2163 because:

- Section 457-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes contains only two paragraphs on the practice of nursing as a registered nurse and a practical nurse;
- The demand from the health care community for further clarification of registered and practical nursing scope of practice has grown over the years;
- The guidelines for advanced practice regist ered nurses practice are consistent
   with Session Laws of Hawaii 2009, Act 169 (Sections 457-8.5 and 457-9);

- The purpose of the MNPA and MNAR is to provide uniform national guidelines
  relating to nursing practice for all state boards of nursing in the United States and
  its territories. Consumers benefit when nurses provide uniform nursing care;
- The MNPA and MNAR were approved by the Delegate Assembly of the NCSBN in 2006. The boards of nursing of the fifty states and the U.S. territories form the Delegate Assembly of the NCSBN;
- All amendments to the MNPA and MNAR require the approval of the Delegate Assembly.
- The adoption of the MNPA and MNAR does not give the NC SBN any legal authority in the State, over the Board, the nurse licensees, entity or person of the State;
- The Board worked with the Department of Health, Department of Human Services; the Hawaii Association of Professional Nurses; the Hawaii Long Term Care Association; Healthcare Association of Hawaii; the schools of nursing under the University of Hawaii system; Hawaii Pacific University; and the University of Phoenix; and stakeholders in the health care community before deciding to adopt the MNPA and MNAR. All stakeholders reviewed and commented on how the adoption of MNPA and MNAR would impact their areas;
- General consensus to adopt the M NPA and MNAR was formed among the stakeholders; and
- As the NCSBN amends the MNPA and the MNAR, the Board will study all
  changes in the context of Hawaii's nursing laws. If the Board determines that
  any of the changes conflict with existing state statutes, regulations, or
  constitutional law or are inappropriate to Hawaii, the Board will list these

exceptions in the Board's policy book and make them available to the public until it is able to incorporate the exceptions into its rules.

However, the Board does not support APRNs' dispensing of drugs and respectfully requests that Section 2, page 5 (lines 14-18) be amended to read as follows:

"...assessment and the diagnosis, prescription, selection <u>and</u> administration [, and <u>dispensation</u>] of therapeutic measures including over the counter drugs, legend drugs, and controlled substances within the advanced practice registered nurse's role and specialty-appropriate education and certification."

For these reasons, the Board of Nursing strongly supports passage of Senate Bill No. 2163 with the proposed amendment. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Members of the Committee:

I am an Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) living in Hawaii and practicing at a federal facility in Oahu. Working at a federal facility allows me to use a nursing license from any of the 50 states and some territories. I continue to maintain licenses in the other states (California and Arizona) despite being a full-time resident of the great state of Hawaii because of the limitations imposed on advanced practice nurses, specifically in regard to prescriptive privileges.

Restrictions placed on APRNs hinder the care I can provide to Hawaii residents, and I'm certain many of my colleagues would agree. For example, providing a widely-used opioid drug such as hydrocodone, which in most instances is compounded with acetaminophen, also known as Tylenol(R), requires a prescription from our physician colleagues, who are frequently busy with patients and must be interrupted for a signature.

We are busy, our patients are busy, and this type of hurdle merely makes for longer wait times without significantly impacting public safety. The practice of APRNs should be on par with our physician assistant colleagues, who have no such barriers. My training and practice on the Mainland has included narcotic drugs and other controlled substances, which is a barrier to care our patients in Hawaii do not need.

I urge approval of Senate Bill 2163.

In particular, it enhances the ability of RNs to provide health care services and as usual they will continue to do so in a system of care that directly addresses the needs of patients, including individuals, families, and groups throughout our "health" state. The impact of this will likely be readily experienced in our most rural areas, including where I hail from, the Big Island, which while having the highest rates of chronic health and mental health problems in Hawaii also has insufficient numbers of providers.

In addition, many physicians I know that have signed such an agreement are well over 50 miles away from the site of care; this suggests that many feel it is just a formality needed to allow the NP to do what they have been educated.

Please do away with this needless agreement.

Good afternoon Senator Ige and members of the Senate Committee on Health. My name is Nancy McGuckin and I thank you for this opportunity to testify on S.B. 2163.

The bill as proposed adds six (6) sections to Chapter 457, Nurses. New language includes:

### Defining the Practice of nursing

Utilizing the National Council of State Board of Nursing (NCSBN) Model Nurse Practice Act.

# <u>Utilizing the NCSBN Model Nursing Practice Act and Model Nursing Administrative</u> Rules

With provision that if the Board finds any rule or provision inappropriate, the board is not compelled to use such.

### Re-defining registered nurse

Utilizing NCSBN model language

### Re-defining licensed practice nurse

Utilizing NCSBN model language

### Re-defining advanced practice registered nurse

Utilizing NCSBN model language

### Adding in new language on delegation

Utilizing NCSBN model language

The other definitions in Chapter 457 under 457-2 are not deleted – so within this bill we have at least two definitions of an LPN, two definitions of an APRN.

### Additionally:

- 1. A new broad definition of delegation of nursing tasks that rely on NCSBN policy documents. There is currently rules that cover approximately 6 pages related to delegation of nursing tasks in the community.
- 2. Elimination of APRN certification bodies and their specific scope of practice requirements for licensure under the Hawaii Board.
- 3. The bill also includes NCSBN model "definitions" to be added to Board administrative rules, unless otherwise objected to by the Board.
- 4. Administrative Rules, 16-89-10 relating to collegial working relationship would be repealed.

While I appreciate the work of the Board on behalf of consumers and consumer safety, I find this bill as currently written to be duplicative, confusing at times, and providing for an over reliance on the NCSBN for direction.

The last time that the Hawaii Nurse Practice Act, Chapter, 457, was amended to such a great degree, including adding definitions of RN, LPN, delegation, etc. was more than 20 years ago. At that time the proposed language changes were discussed at great length by the entire nursing community. The proposed language before you is as significant or more so in the reliance on a national non-profit entity that defines nursing.

I am also confused as to the timing of this bill. Administrative rules are currently being worked on which implement Act 169 which was passed by the Legislature last year. These rules eliminate the collegial relationship as the Legislature directed and also adds language on delegation of nursing tasks in the same manner as proposed in this bill. The new administrative rules add in "collaboration" into the APRN and MD relationship as it relates to controlled substances which was, to my understanding, not the intent of the Legislature – the intent was to expand access to services, not curtail them unnecessarily.

I believe the bill causes confusion, not clarity, into the role and definition of nurses and nursing. I respectfully request the bill be held and that the interested parties gather together over the interim and develop language that nursing in Hawaii can agree upon.
