Dear Esteemed Members of the House Committee on Water, Land, and Ocean Resources,

I am writing this letter in strong support of the bill SB 2169 that seeks to ban shark finning. As a certified ecologist (Ecological Society of America) and assistant professor of ecosystem management it is critical to use our limited natural reources as wisely as possible. Unfortunately, shark finning is an extremely wasteful form of harvesting and is causing marked impacts on shark populations. The repercussions of these impacts are not fully known, but at a minimum are likely to have noticeable impacts on the rest of the marine ecosystem. The state of Hawaii desperately needs to manage its marine resources and banning shark finning would be a very strong first step in reducing our wasteful exploitation of this species.

In consideration of SENATE BILL 2169, SENATE DRAFT 2, HOUSE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO SHARK FINS

Senate Bill 2169, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 1 would prohibit the harvest, possession, sale or distribution of a shark or shark parts unless landed whole and harvested under a commercial marine license or a non-commercial permit issued by the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department), and would place additional restrictions on possession or sale under the authorities of the Hawaii Food, Drug and Cosmetics Act. The Department supports some aspects of this revised measure, but continues to oppose others.

In particular, the Department opposes requiring a permit to fish for sharks in state waters, because it would be practically unenforceable given that this fishery spans both state and federal waters, and that sharks may be caught without a permit in the latter. As a result, unless a Conservation and Resources Officer of the Department actually witnesses a catch in State waters, they will have no evidence that someone with a shark in a boat did not catch it in federal waters. Accordingly, we recommend eliminating the provisions that prohibit fishing and landing whole shark in State waters and that require a permit for such activity.

Specifically, the Department proposes amendments to this measure as follows in relation to the above concerns:

1. Amend subsection (a)(2) on lines 9-12 of page 3 to read: "The shark was harvested in federal waters beyond three nautical miles of any shore of the state, or on the high seas."

- 2. Eliminate subsection (a)(4) on lines 1-4 of page 4, referencing a subsection (b) pertaining to state permits.
- 3. Eliminate subsection (b) on lines 4-20 of page 4, pertaining to state permits.

The Department also continues to oppose repeal of Section 188-40.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, dealing with the prohibition of finning as proposed in this measure. The Department notes that retention of these existing provisions, coupled with the proposed prohibitions for the possession of sale of fins or any portion thereof on land, will greatly strengthen current law in regard to finning.
