Ho'ola Lahui Hawai'i strongly supports this measure which appropriates funds to restore basic dental services for adults covered by Med-QUEST.

Ho'ola Lahui Hawai'i believes that the restoration of this program will not increase the costs spent on dental care. It is basically a cost shift from emergency services to preventive and restorative care. In other words our billing to the Department of Human Services for emergency visits is not that much less than what we were billing previously for preventive and restorative care—the service has shifted from a preventive/restorative to an emergency visit. As the committee is aware this is not in the best interests of the health of our patients. Primary dental care must not be denied to those who have no means of affording the care.

Medicaid patients were left without coverage except for emergency extractions and infections on August 10, 2009. This was a devastating blow to those most in need of dental care here on Kaua'i. While many of our patients were converted to our sliding fee scale they are still unable to afford to pay even a fraction of the cost of their care due to limited incomes. Many of those patients postponed coming to us for care and are now coming as emergency patients.

It is imperative that this benefit be restored to those most in need of care. We understand the gravity of the budget deficit. We also understand first hand that cost shifting will not assist in meeting the needs of the budget deficit. As you know the current federal match for Medicaid is greater in the current year due to ARRA funding. Please ensure that we take full advantage of that matching fund.
