Department's Position: The Department of Health opposes this bill.

Fiscal Implications: Establishes a Product Stewardship Special Fund to be administered by the

- 3 Office of Environmental Quality Control (OEQC). Producers of architectural paint would pay a \$10,000
- 4 fee to the OEOC upon submission and approval of a management plan and then \$10,000 annually
- 5 thereafter. Or, the OEQC may establish an alternative fee schedule that does not exceed .05% of the
- 6 average stewardship program costs.
- 7 Purpose and Justification: The purpose of this bill is to require producers of architectural paint sold in
- 8 Hawaii to establish a pilot program to provide and manage end-of-product-life options for paint. The
- 9 program should establish options for post-consumer architectural paint, including reduction, reuse,
- recycling, energy recovery, and disposal. The bill provides for oversight of the program by OEQC.
 - DOH feels that imposing fees on the paint industry and general public is inappropriate at this time of economic difficulty.
- Furthermore, OEQC has not been a regulating agency or managed a fee system historically.

RELATING TO ARCHITECTURAL PAINT

Senate Bill No. 2275 establishes a pilot program to require producers of architectural paint sold in the State to establish or join a stewardship organization to implement an Architectural Paint Stewardship Program that provides for the collection, transportation, and processing of post-consumer architectural paint. Provides for oversight by the Office of Environmental Quality Control. Establishes the Product Stewardship Fund to offset administrative costs.

As a matter of general policy, this department does not support the creation of any special or revolving fund which does not meet the requirements of Sections 37-52.3 and 37-53.4 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. Special or revolving funds should: 1) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries of the program; 2) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 3) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. It is difficult to determine whether the fund will be self-sustaining.

1	Department's Position:	The Office of Environmental Quality Control (OEQC) opposes
2	SB2275.	
3	Fiscal Implications: This bill imposes an annual \$10,000 fee on architectural paint	
4	manufacturers to finance an architectural paint stewardship program under OEQC.	
5	Purpose and Justification:	SB2275 amends Chapter 342-I, HRS, and establishes an
6	architectural paint steward program to properly manage post-consumer architectural paint. The	
7	bill further requires the participation of architectural producers, distributors, and retailers,	
8	establishes an annual \$10,000 fee for participation, and charges the director of OEQC to	
9	implement the stewardship program.	
10	OEQC's statutory responsibilities under various provisions of Chapter 343 is to	
11	administer and process environmental assessments and environmental impact statements.	
12	OEQC strongly feels that the administration of an architectural paint stewardship program should	
13	be assigned to another agency with statutory responsibility that is more aligned with the	
14	proposed action and better equipped with staff and personnel to administer the proposed

Relating to Architectural Paint

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on S.B. No. 2275. The Office of Information Practices ("OIP") takes no position on the substance of this bill, which is to create a stewardship program, but recommends deletion of the bill's provision that apparently seeks to make data in reports from stewardship organizations confidential.

Specifically, subsection (b) of proposed new section 342I-G of this bill (pages 10 to 11) provides that the data in a report "shall not be subject to disclosure under chapter 92." The bill's reference to chapter 92 is incorrect because disclosure of government records is governed by chapter 92F, HRS, which is the Uniform Information Practices Act (Modified) ("UIPA"), and not chapter 92.

Under this proposed subsection (b), certain data in a report would be confidential even if ordinarily public disclosure would be properly required under the UIPA. For example, the report is required to include "samples of educational materials provided to consumers" which is information that is already made public.

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Notably, the UIPA, in section 92F-13, HRS, already provides exemptions from public disclosure that are applicable to information in government records that consists of trade secrets and confidential business information. As drafted, subsection (b) would make confidential any data in a report, regardless of whether it would actually fall within an exception to disclosure under the UIPA.

Therefore, OIP recommends that subsection (b) of the proposed new section 342I-G in the bill be deleted.
