In consideration of SB 2276
RELATING TO INTOXICATING LIQUOR

The Hawaii Public Housing Authority (HPHA) <u>supports</u> S.B. 2276, which prohibits possession of open liquor containers in common areas of public housing projects. This bill would improve the ability of HPHA to control disruptive activity within our communities by having police cite or arrest people in possession of open containers of liquor.

Disruptive behavior fueled by drinking, mainly on the part of non-residents and visitors, is a problem in some housing projects. Currently the police are unable to arrest someone holding a container of liquor unless the police observe the person putting the container to their mouth, or unless a witness is willing to testify. In meetings with residents and police this enhancement of the current law prohibiting consumption in public areas was requested in order to improve the atmosphere and maintain order for residents.
