# Testimony of Chiyome Leinaala Fukino, M.D. Director of Health February 2, 2010

#### 3:30 p.m.

Department's Position: The department respectfully opposes this measure. Given current fiscal 1 difficulties, it would not be prudent to enact the measure now. 2 **Fiscal Implications:** As yet unquantified resources would be needed to adopt and enforce rules. 3 4 Purpose and Justification: The bill proposes the following: Amend Chapter 342F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to prohibit the operation of leaf blowers except 5 between 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on any day except Sunday or a federal holiday in or near a residential 6 zone. The bill also prohibits the operation of leaf blowers in certain areas and restricts the operation and 7 number of leaf blowers for a set duration at any given location. In addition, the bill specifies a 8 maximum decibel level of 70 dba for leaf blowers. 9 Amend Chapter 342H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to prohibit the operation of a leaf blower in such 10 a manner as to blow debris beyond the parcel boundaries that is being cleaned. 11 Although we generally favor a quieter environment, enforcement against leaf blowers would be 12

extremely difficult to implement due to their mobility, restricted days and times, and the lack of

- adequate manpower and funding. As far as dust and litter from leaf blowing operations, existing laws
- 2 and administrative rules exist to address suspected problems.
- 3 Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this measure.

#### Subject Senate Bill 2356 - Relating to Leaf Blowers

The Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) does not support Senate Bill 2356. This bill would prevent DPR from performing its duty in an efficient and cost effective manner. In the current economic climate, operational efficiency is critical.

The prohibition of gas powered leaf blowers would be costly, time consuming, and a less effective use of our labor and limited resources. Sweeping is currently limited to small work areas and projects. It is not practical to sweep a large area such as a park and its parking lots. Utilizing electric leaf blowers would not be a practical alternative to gas powered machines because of its limitations in regards to the availability of power.

In the course of the last ten years, the gas leaf blowers have made vast improvements in the reduction of noise pollution. Current machines on the market are available with operating levels as low as 65dB.

Our staff is trained in the use of all equipment that they operate. Equipment manufactures also provide manuals as to the proper use of their equipment. Our staff makes every effort to insure that the equipment being operated is being used in the correct fashion it was designed for. Providing further education on blower usage to our staff is far simpler than imposing a fine system that must be monitored and implemented by another governmental agency.

I'm Bishop, the owner of Bishop's Landscaping Maintenance. I've used gas powered leaf blowers in my business for years.

I'm testifying in support of Senate Bill 2356. This is hard for me to say, given that this bill directly impacts my "bottom line."

Over the years, I've gotten some complaints from the neighbors of my clients. Usually, people have been most concerned about the noise pollution, and also the smells and fumes that our leaf blowers produce. It was when a neighbor of mine started using a leaf blower on a regular basis for extended periods of time that I started to understand better why some people complain. We had to schedule our home activities around when the leaf blower was going to be used and that just didn't seem right. So now I understand how gas leaf blowers can definitely affect the quality of life for people.

I think this bill provides a reasonable compromise by allowing electric leaf blowers to still be legal. Electric leaf blowers are not as loud and don't produce the same air pollution that gas ones do. Additionally, the bill gives us in the industry until July 2011 to phase out our old gas models.

Dear Energy and Environment Committee:

I am testifying in support of Senate Bill 2356: Leaf Blower Control, because there are many in Hawaii that need relief from leaf blower noise and emission pollutions. This Bill is fair in that it will not put undue hardship on business people or non-residential areas.

Many residents leave home before 7:00 a.m., arrive home at or after 7:00 pm, after working long hours in often stressful employment, and are asking to enjoy peace and quiet in their homes and neighborhood. Surely, we deserve at least Sundays and Federal Holidays to rest from this kind of noise. The average blower measures 70-75 dB at 50 feet according to the EPA (EPA, Noise: A Health Problem, United States Environmental Protection Agency, Office of Noise Abatement and Control, August, 1978). The sound of these gas leaf blowers are much too loud no matter what decibel level they are. They should not be allowed. They harm the residents and the user. A blower measuring 70-75 dB at 50 feet can reach 90-100 dB at the operator's ear (WHO, 1980). While manufacturers claim that the average blower measures 70-75 dB at 50 feet, and claim this is the same noise level of a vacuum cleaner, how many of us would allow an uninvited vacuum cleaner into our homes for several hours per day? Also, the World Health Organization recommends general daytime outdoor levels of 55dBA or less but 45dBA to meet sleep criteria (World Health Organization, 1980, Environmental Health Criteria 12: Noise). Thus, even a 65 decibel leaf blower would be 100 times too loud to allow healthful sleep (which often takes place during daytime hours for night workers and others). According to the WHO, noise can impair sleep even when the sleeper is not awakened. Many residences include elderly, infants, and other employees who sleep during the day time hours and work evening shifts.

A lot more than noise is blowing into our residences. For example, we are subjected to dust containing rodent droppings; harmful C02, CO or carbon monoxide; NOx or nitrogen oxides, and hydrocarbons, HC from the motors. In addition, fine PM2.5 particles, which are man-made are occurring; they evade the body's defense systems and increase the number and severity of asthma attacks, cause or aggravate bronchitis or other lung disease and reduce our ability to fight infections (Air Resources Board, Status Report: 1995-1996). We are receiving bacteria and street dust, including lead and arsenic. The California ARB has conducted tests showing that a leaf blower creates 2.6 pounds of PM10 dust emissions per hour of use (California ARB, 1991). This dust contains all of the harmful substances.

My concern is that the health and safety of our citizens should be paramount in all that we do. We do not need to recreate the wheel. Other states and cities have already passed leaf blower laws.

I sincerely urge you to support SB 2356. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

SB 2356: Relating to Leaf Blowers

Chair Gabbord, Vice Chair English, and Members of the Committee

Thank you for hearing this important bill today. My name is Valere McFarland and I reside at Pualei Circle, in a condominium complex at the Diamond Head end of Waikiki. I am testifying as a private citizen. I support the intent SB 2356 and appreciate very much that you have taken the initiative to address this very important issue. While the bill has included ramifications for potential violators, I have some specific comments and suggested amendments in the following sections:

On page 1, Section 1 line 11: Recommend that you add the words: "but they also recommend 45dBA to meet sleep criteria" following "decibels or less." While the World Health Organization (WHO) recommends general daytime outdoor noise levels of fifty-five decibels or less, they also recommend 45dBA to meet sleep criteria (World Health Organization, 1980, Environmental Health Criteria 12: Noise). According to the WHO, noise can impair sleep even when the sleeper is not awakened. Our complex includes elderly and infants who sleep during the day time hours. My condo floor alone has six units – half of these are airline employees who work evening shifts or fly all night.

On page 2, Section 1 line 15: Recommend that you add the words: "Still more quiet, less expensive to operate and having less impact on the environment are the recently marketed battery powered leaf blowers." Federal law does not mandate that manufacturers of these machines label the dBA (decibals), but employees at the sales outlet for a brand of these types of weed blowers, Waipahu Lawn Equipment Sales, located at 97-150 LeoLeo Street, Waipahu, Hawaii reported that they are "quiet like a hair dryer." They are powerful enough to clean off sidewalks, patios and do all of the kinds of weed blowing activities normally done in close proximity to residences, including condominium projects. While these machines are not built to withstand use in an eight or ten hour work-day, they are optimal for residences and condo projects, who can supply them for landscapers to use once or twice per week for an hour.

On page 3, Section 1, (3) line 5: Recommend the words 'Hawai'i state' be inserted following 'federal.' The state of Hawaii observes fourteen state holidays, which include several federal holidays. Hawaii is unique among the states in the large number of 'state' holidays, because it observes days with meaning only to Hawaii. These days should be honored with the same kind of noise reduction that we intend for Sunday and the federal holidays. Thus, to avoid possible confusion, recommend the word 'state' be added.

On page 4, Section 2, (4) (c) line 15: Recommend 'Hawai'i state holidays' be included in restricted use days.

On page 3, Section 2 (a) (1) line 21: Recommend the distance be increased from 'ten feet' to 'fifty feet.' The average blower measures 70-75 dB at 50 feet according to the EPA (EPA, Noise: A Health Problem, United States Environmental Protection Agency, Office of Noise Abatement and Control, August, 1978). I suggest the distance of ten feet be expanded to no more than 50 feet. A lot more than noise is blowing into our units. For example, we are subjected to dust containing rodent droppings (yes); harmful CO2, CO or carbon monoxide; NOx or nitrogen oxides, and hydrocarbons, HC from the motors. In addition, fine PM2.5 particles, which are man-made are occurring: these do not occur in nature, they evade the body's defense systems — and increase the number and severity of asthma attacks, cause or aggravate bronchitis or other lung disease and reduce our ability to fight infections (Air Resources Board, Status Report: 1995-1996). We are receiving bacteria and street dust, including lead and arsenic. And all of this is coming from distances exceeding ten feet. If you were to visit Pualei Circle, you would find intolerable noise, dust, other debris and toxic fumes from distances of more than 50 feet.

We have had two and three leaf blowers operating simultaneously in the parking area and at the swimming pool area. The sound of three of these operating expands exponentially. This harms the residents and the user. Deafness is a social problem because it causes isolation. But in the case of Hawaii, it is also a civil rights issue because the individuals taking these low-paying jobs are most often those with the least education and the least ability to confront their employer should they have concerns. They are likely to be immigrants with limited English written or spoken abilities and lack the ability to read English language newspapers (the most common source of notice of harmful impacts or legislative initiatives).

On page 4, Section 2 (4), line 9: Recommend this be changed to "The maximum decibel level of 65 dba shall not be exceeded." A review of decibel levels for the five top rated <u>electric</u> weed blowers indicates they operated between 58 and 65 dBA. While this is much higher than the noise produced by a 'hair dryer' (as mentioned above with regard to the battery operated machine), it is doable and exponentially less than the 70 dBA in the current version of the bill. A blower measuring 70-75 dBA at 50 feet can reach 90-100 dB at the operator's ear (WHO, 1980). While manufacturers claim that the average blower measures 70-75 dB at 50 feet, and claim this is the same noise level of a vacuum cleaner, how many of us would allow an uninvited vacuum cleaner into our homes for several hours per day? According to the WHO, Regarding 342H, page 2: Leaf blower debris. (a). The California ARB has conducted tests showing that a leaf blower creates 2.6 pounds of PM10 dust emissions per hour of use (California ARB, 1991). This dust contains all of the harmful substances listed above. Who is going to enforce or monitor this section when the trade winds blow every afternoon?

Our concern for the health and welfare of our citizens, including those who cannot speak for themselves, should be paramount in all that we do. We do not need to recreate the wheel. Other states and cities have already done this for us.

In conclusion, I would like to compliment the committee on the hard work and thought that went into writing this bill. While I am for a total ban of leaf blowers and support using rakes and brooms to clean leaves and debris from sidewalks, I recognize that the work of becoming a more humane society begins with bills like this one.

I am in full support of SB 2356. My name is Linda Wong, member of Diamond Head, Kapahulu, and St. Louis Heights. The reasons I support SB 2356 follow:

Noise interferes with communication, sleep, and work. The U.S. EPA says noise degrades quality of life by impairing communication and social interaction; reducing the accuracy of work, particularly complex tasks; and creating stressful levels of frustration and aggravation that last even when the noise has ceased. Sacramento, CA's City code states, "Every person in the city is entitled to live in an environment free from excessive, unnecessary or offensive noise levels". The average blower measures 70-75 dB at 50 feet according to a manufacturer's lobbyist, thus louder at any closer distance. Leaf blowers are routinely used less than 50 feet from unconsenting pedestrians and neighboring homes that may be occupied by retirees, day sleepers, children, the ill or disabled. The World Health Organization recommends general daytime outdoor noise levels of 55 dBA or less, but 45 dBA to meet sleep criteria. (<a href="http://www.nonoise.org/quietnetlcqs/leatblow.htm">http://www.nonoise.org/quietnetlcqs/leatblow.htm</a> 3/24/2009). Thus, even a 65-decibel leaf blower would be 100 times too loud to allow healthful sleep (which often takes place during daytime hours for night workers and others). Noise can impair sleep even when the sleeper is not awakened.

In 1975, Carmel, CA <u>banned the blower</u>; in 1976, Beverly Hills, CA <u>banned blowers</u>, saying they are nuisance. In 1987, Belvedere, CA <u>banned gas-powered blowers</u>. In 1989 Indian Wells, CA <u>banned leaf blowers</u> and in 1990, Piedmont, CA <u>banned gas-powered blowers</u>. Claremont, CA <u>stopped using leaf blowers</u> in the

maintenance of city property, found no net increase in labor hours, and banned gas blowers before 1994. Sacramento passed noise and time restrictions by 1991. In 1991, Berkeley, CA <u>banned gas blowers</u>. Los Altos, CA <u>banned gas blowers</u> by popular vote. In 1993, Laguna Beach, <u>CA banned all leaf blowers</u>. Mill Valley, CA <u>banned gas blowers</u>. Los Angeles <u>banned gas-powered blowers</u>. Lawndale, CA <u>banned gas blowers</u>. Santa Barbara, CA banned on their November ballot. Palo Alto, Portola Valley, Sacramento, Menlo Park, and Sunnyvale banned blowers. Santa Barbara <u>banned gas leaf blowers</u>. Santa Monica CA banned all Leaf Blowers in Nov 8, 2006.

In summary, we are not trying to take leaf blowers away from large commercial areas, just residential areas where people deserve the quiet enjoyment of their homes and the outdated gas leaf blowers have no place. Please pass SB 2356. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.

SB 2356: Relating to Leaf Blowers

Chair Gabbord, Vice Chair English, and Members of the Committee

Thank you for hearing this important bill today. My name is James Beck. I am an owner of, and frequent visitor to my condominium unit at 3055 Pualei Circle. I am testifying as a private citizen. I support the intent of SB 2356. I have some specific comments and suggested amendments on the following sections:

On page 1, Section 1 line 11: I recommend that you add information that considers the needs of day-sleepers, such as medical professionals and airline employees who work night shifts. We are in a working class neighborhood, and our neighborhood includes these working folks, as well as elderly and infants who sleep during the day time hours.

On page 2, Section 1 line 15: Recommend that you include 'battery powered leaf blowers' as these are very quiet, putting forth dBA's in the range of a hair dryer. They are powerful enough to clean off sidewalks, patios and do all of the kinds of weed blowing activities normally done in close proximity to residences, including condominium projects. While these machines are not built to withstand use in an eight or ten hour work-day, they are optimal for residences and condo projects, who can supply them for landscapers to use once or twice per week for an hour.

On page 3, Section 1, (3) line 5: Recommend the words 'Hawai'i state' be inserted following 'federal.' The state of Hawaii observes fourteen state holidays, which include several federal holidays. Hawaii is unique among the states in the large number of 'state' holidays observed, because it observes days with meaning only to Hawaii. These days should be honored with the same kind of noise reduction that we intend for Sunday and the federal holidays. Thus, to avoid possible confusion, recommend the words 'Hawai'i state' be added.

On page 4, Section 2, (4) (c) line 15: Recommend 'Hawai'i state holidays' be included in restricted use days.

On page 3, Section 2 (a) (1) line 21: Recommend the distance be increased from 'ten feet' to 'fifty feet.' The average blower measures 70-75 dBA at 50 feet according to the EPA (EPA, Noise: A Health Problem, United States Environmental Protection Agency, Office of Noise Abatement and Control, August, 1978). I suggest the distance of ten feet be expanded to not less than 50 feet. A lot more than noise is blowing into our units. For example, we are subjected to dust containing rodent droppings; harmful CO2, or

carbon monoxide; NOx or nitrogen oxides, and hydrocarbons, and HC from the motors. The sound of three of these operating expands exponentially. This harms the residents and the user. Deafness is a social problem because it causes isolation. But in the case of Hawaii, it is also a civil rights issue because the individuals taking these low-paying jobs are most often those with the least education and the least ability to confront their employer should they have concerns. They are likely to be immigrants with limited English written or spoken abilities and lack the ability to read English language newspapers (the most common source of notice of harmful impacts or legislative initiatives).

On page 4, Section 2 (4), line 9: Recommend this be changed to "The maximum decibel level of 65 dba shall not be exceeded." A review of decibel levels for the five top rated <u>electric</u> weed blowers indicates they operated between 58 and 65 dBA.

Thank you for taking this testimony. My name is Darla J. Thomas and I reside at Pualei Circle, Honolulu. I am testifying as a private citizen. I totally support the intent of SB 2356. On many days I am forced to wear headsets (noise eliminators) from Bose due to the extremely loud leaf blowers on our circle. I also am suffering from headaches often due to the fumes and noise.

I am concerned that it be reduced/eliminated at all hours due to our area consisting of night workers who may be sleeping during the day, as well as elderly (such as my husband) who is suffering from heart problems.

Perhaps battery powered leaf blowers would be quieter. The dBA's are so loud that we cannot live a normal life at certain hours (often Sat.) due to the high level of noise.

I would also like Hawaii State Holidays covered by this bill, not just Federal Holidays. I work full time and it seems that every "holiday" for me means days of loud and disturbing noise causing a stressful day instead of an enjoyable one!

I would also like the distance be increased from 10 ft. to 50 ft. We are suffering on our circle due to dust, rodent droppings, harmful CO2, CO (carbon monoxide); NOx (nitrogen oxides, and hydrocarbons, HC from the motors.

Finally, please consider the max of decibel level of 65 dba shall not be exceeded.
