In consideration of SENATE BILL 2441, SENATE DRAFT 2 RELATING TO ENDANGERED SPECIES

Senate Bill 2441, Senate Draft 2 would establish the knowing or intentional taking of a Hawaiian monk seal as a class C felony with a fine of up to \$50,000. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) recognizes the need for better deterrence and stricter penalties for harassment or taking of Hawaiian monk seals, given recent incidents involving this endangered species. The Department supports this measure with a recommendation that the effective date be amended to "upon approval".

Dear Chair Karamatsu, Vice-Chair Ito and Committee members.

On behalf of our more than 49, 315 members and supporters in Hawaii, The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) supports SB 2441 SD 2 HD 1; to increase penalties for the intentional or knowing taking of an endangered monk seal.

Given Hawaii's rich and unique resources, it is imperative that we have strong laws to protect endangered animals and to serve as adequate deterrents for abusing and exploiting these treasured species.

Two recent high profile monk seal killings have demonstrated that Hawaii lacks such protective laws. Monk seals are critically endangered, the most threatened of all seal species, and it is estimated that fewer than 1200 of these animals are left in Hawaii. In one Kauai case, a man wantonly killed a pregnant monk seal with a .22-caliber rifle. Despite this egregious crime, he ultimately received only a \$25 fine and a 90 day jail sentence. Another monk seal was found shot at Kauai's Kaumakani Beach, but the criminal responsible has yet to be found. With such low possibilities for pairing a significant fine with jail time, the state fails to deter the individuals who might kill a protected animal, not fearing harsh and appropriate consequences. This bill provides a much-needed update to the penalties for taking endangered monk seals in Hawaii and it sends a strong message that this is a serious crime that will not be tolerated.

We thank you for the opportunity to comment on this measure and urge your support of SB2441.

Aloha. Conservation Council for Hawai'i supports SB 2441 SD 2, which establishes the intentional or knowing taking of an endangered monk seal a class C felony. We are deeply saddened by the recent intentional killings of endangered Hawaiian monk seals on Kaua'i and Moloka'i. These actions clearly indicate that the existing penalty for taking an endangered species under state law is insufficient to deter similar actions in the future.

We support the increased penalty and any other provisions that make the state law more consistent with the federal Endangered Species Act. We believe that all of Hawai'i's threatened and endangered species deserve the highest level of protection, and we urge you to include all threatened and endangered species in this the bill.

We also urge you to provide a private right of action to enforce conservation of aquatic life, wildlife, and land plants laws. Dear Chair Karamatsu, Vice Chair Ito, and Members of the Judiciary Committee:

Thank you very much for hearing SB2441.

My name is Keiko Bonk and I am here to ask you to approve SB2441. I am the coordinator of a consortium of conservation and cultural groups and individuals called the Save Our Seal Campaign. The Save Our Seal Campaign supports SB2441 that will up the penalty for harming or killing our Hawaiian monk seal. Passing SB2441 will send an urgently needed message to all Hawaii residents and visitors that it is a serious crime to intentionally kill our Hawaiian seal.

As you continue to work through this legislative session to determine what is essential to Hawaii, I urge you to think of Hawaii's wildlife as not only essential, but also irreplaceable treasures. Hawaii's unique location, our unique geography, unique flora and fauna drive our spirit and all Hawaii's economic engines. We must insure the best management practices of Hawaii's natural resources to secure a long-term quality life for Hawaii's people.

As elected leaders, you are stewards of our natural assets. We trust you will care for all of our wildlife and their habitat. Please become an advocate for the recovery of the Hawaiian monk seal and ask Hawaii's residents and visitors to be an integral part of saving our seal. Everyone who frequents the shorelines and ocean of Hawaii are responsible for this 13 million year old mammal, found nowhere else on earth.

Building a responsible culture is a first step towards caring for Hawaii's species. Bill 2441 will help to develop a culture that will better manage our natural resources and ecosystems. SB2441 is a good start to acknowledge the serious and complex environmental challenges we face ahead.

It is important to learn to pursue our long-term interests based on facts. For us in Hawaii, one of those unpleasant facts is that Hawaii has the dubious distinction of being "The Endangered Species Capital of the World." Hawaii's terrestrial and marine environment is still breath-takingly beautiful, but it is not healthy. In fact it is very, very sick. Pretending otherwise, and delaying dramatic and systematic intervention, will only insure that our environmental illness progresses from critical to terminal.

We know the world can probably survive without Hawaii's many unique species, but I am here to remind you that what threatens Hawaii's endemic species, threatens the very health and survival of the human species. For this reason we have chosen to focus on a campaign to assist in the recovery of the critically endangered Hawaiian Monk Seal, a species that shares many of our best characteristics and none of our worst. Perhaps if we can save the seal, it will inspire us to believe we can save ourselves.

The Hawaiian Monk Seal represents Hawaii's struggle to survive the challenges of a rapidly degrading global environment, a process of degradation that is of our own making. The Hawaiian Monk Seal is like Hawaii itself, unique and threatened. It is the only endemic marine mammal in Hawaii and one of the most critically endangered marine mammals in the world. It, like much of what makes Hawaii, Hawaii, is on the verge of extinction. Many of these threats are beyond our ability to control locally. The primary threats to the Hawaiian Monk Seal are climate change, overfishing, pollution, disease, human encroachment and marine debris. And yet, we in Hawaii are determined to show that the accelerating trend toward extinction of the Hawaiian Monk Seal can not just be slowed down, and it can be reversed.

Besides its intrinsic value, and its important role in the marine ecosystem of the Hawaiian archipelago, the Hawaiian Monk Seal has spiritual value as a reflection of Hawaii's soul. The Monk Seal's current endangered status is a reflection of who we have been, but its potential rescue is a reflection of who we can become; who we wish to become. We in Hawaii, at least most of us, are ready to go beyond blaming outsiders for our plight, and admit that we are part of the problem. We are also ready to change and sacrifice for a better future. But at the same time we are also cognizant of the fact that we cannot save our seal, anymore than we can save ourselves, without a lot of help from others. Locally, we have overfished, polluted our waters, and failed to implement policies that protect our shared environment from the more selfish side of our own human nature. We sat back and allowed hundreds of unique endemic species to go extinct on our watch. There is no excuse for what we have done, but I believe there is a genuine desire among most of us to reverse this trend and demonstrate our better nature.

To be blunt, it is time to stop talking about "sustainability" and whatever the latest buzzword is, and get down to living with the facts. We are doing a lousy job taking care of the environment that we need to survive, because we spend too much time catering to the short-term, reactive and selfish side of our own human nature. Fortunately, for the Monk Seal, us, and the rest of the planet, human nature is not one-dimensional. As a species, we have evolved the capacity to engage in complex, long-term reasoning based on facts and driven by compassion.

It is our hope that this kind of real fact-based reasoning, sustained by compassion for the Hawaiian Monk Seal, can act as a model not just for better marine policy, but also as a model for how to save ourselves from ourselves. Please uphold our endangered species protection laws and make it a high priority to protect our official state mammal, our *ilio-holo-i-kauaua*, dog running in rough waters.

Thank you for considering this bill for adoption by Hawaii's twenty-fifth legislature. I am writing to express my strong support for this bill.

The driving force behind SB 2441 is the tragic intentional killings of four (4) Hawaiian monk seals by gunshot on Kauai and Molokai since April 2009. SB 2441 SD 2 merely proposes that when a person acts intentionally to harm or kill a Hawaiian Monk Seal, designated the State Mammal by act of the 24th Hawaii State Legislature, that this crime should be classified under state law as a felony, not a misdemeanor, as currently provided.

As an attorney licensed to practice in the State of Hawaii, having been involved during the past six years analyzing and advocating state and federal law as concerns the Hawaiian monk seal, I have identified no jurisdictional conflicts or scienter pilikia with the proposed language at Section 2, g language that provides,

Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, any person who intentionally or knowingly takes a Hawaiian monk seal in violation of this chapter shall be guilty of a class C felony; provided that the maximum fine shall not be more than \$50,000.
