	opportunities available to all children who turn five-years-old during the
	calendar year. The Department continues to establish a two-tier
	kindergarten program to support the range of developmental abilities of all
	children and to ready them for school success.

Comments: Dear Chair Sakamoto, Vice Chair Kidani and members of the EDH committee:

I do not support this bill to make kindergarten attendance mandatory in Hawaii.

Please consider the following:

Families would no longer qualify for child care tax credits when their children are of kindergarten age.

Children who qualify for special education may need to be in preschool special education beyond the age of 4.

Families who plan to homeschool beginning at age 6/first grade would be forced to comply with state regulations and begin a year earlier. Families are our children's first teachers. They know what they are doing too.

Families who plan to send their child to a private school beginning 1st grade would abruptly have to change their children's existing program/lifestyle at kindergarten age.

We do not need more restrictions to limit parental choice. However I do suggest the state budget include funding for a pre-1st grade camp (such as mornings for 2 weeks prior to the first day of the new school year) at every school for students new to the school and all students who never attended a kindergarten. That's what my school did when I began first grade.
