The Workforce Development Council ("WDC") is not in support of any further draw-down of the Unemployment Trust Fund ("UI Trust Fund") due to the current economic and unemployment situation. Given the uncertainty of what effect the drawdown would have on the UI Trust Fund and subsequent employer taxes, the WDC cannot support the appropriation of further Reed Act funds from the UI Trust

However, the WDC supports the intent of S.B. 2549 SD1, and any effort, which would provide additional funding to the four county local workforce investment boards. Additional funding for programs that assist jobseekers and employers strengthen Hawaii's overall workforce development system. Aloha, Chair Rhoads and Committee Members:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of Senate Bill No. 2549 SD1 Relating to Employment Security, which appropriates Reed Act monies to Hawai'i County's Workforce Investment Board.

The County of Hawai'i Workforce Investment Board has supported the efforts of the unique and successful Going Home consortium, a prison-to-community reentry initiative; and has supported the Huian Internship program, a work-based learning experience that places students in meaningful and substantive internship experiences.  and would also establish a Youth Business and Innovation Center to advocate for
 entrepreneurship.



I am writing in support of SB2549. I am the program coordinator for a workforce related internship program for high school students. It supports career pathway exploration, fulfills requirements for the students' portfolios and some senior project needs, and shows students the workplace skills that are needed to be successful job candidates in the future. Dear House Labor Committee,

I am unable to be present to present testimony, and this is my letter of support.

I am June Shibuya, President of the Kurtistown 12-MILE KUMIAI ASSOCIATION, on the Big Island. This Kumiai was founded in the 1950s by first and second generation multi-ethnic immigrants living in sugar plantation camps, in the community of Kurtistown. I am writing this testimony in behalf of the Kurtistown 12-MILE KUMIAI ASSOCIATION, with a membership of 21 households plus their family members. *Kumiai* is a Japanese word that means "community" where all the folks in the neighborhoods meet, work together, and grow mutual understanding to improve quality of life. The 12-MILE MARKER indicated Kurtistown was 12 miles out of Hilo, which was considered far away, back then.

In behalf of our 12-Mile Kumiai Association, I am writing in <u>strong support</u> of SB2549, which appropriates Reed Act monies to the four county Workforce Investment Boards with direct positive impact for employment potential in our rural communities in Hawaii County. This bill would appropriate funds to improve employer outreach and services, labor pool expansion, capacity building and the operation of one-stop career centers within each county. Passing this bill will improve the quality of life of our citizens and community through workforce employment.

<u>Health Crisis Initiative</u>: Hawaii County has a severe shortage of health professionals and health facilities. It is NOT OK for our community citizens to think that only people with money can get health care because they must go to Honolulu for better health care and services. This is a terrible health disparity in rural community that impacts minority populations. Our kumiai members have stated how difficult it is to receive medical care on this island, and in a timely manner. Many of the members are not going in for basic screening tests because they cannot access services, providers are "not taking new patients," or the services are just not available on the island, and a whole list of other reasons. There have been major conferences regarding health crisis on our island. It is time that our Work Force Development works closer with the Hawaii Island Health Care Alliance (HIHA) and the business community to actively recruit needed health care professional and their services, and find out what incentives keep / retain high quality workers on our islands.

Going Home System for Hawaii County and Hawaii State: Assist Going Home Members and Committees establish a full range of supportive programs, occupational skills training, certification programs to prepare the incarcerated and formerly incarcerated for successful re-entry into the community and the workforce. For the special group of incarcerated and formerly incarcerated citizens who are ready to work because they understand the meaning and value of having occupational skills, they will be contributing member in our society. Going Home System will enhance their skills and add to the needed resources in our county and state.

We also need:

<u>Business-to-Business</u> in Support of S.T.E.M. and Green: Funds to be available to established business organizations for the use business/employee capacity building. A business service representative to coordinate needs of businesses; consult with HIWEDO to issue scholarships, etc. with focus on awareness and infusion of STEM and Green Practices.

<u>Business Incubator (Micro Biz Initiative)</u>: This Initiative will support a few startup businesses via technical support from our newly-established Business Resource Centers. Will work in tandem with the Small Business Development Center, HIWEDO and the major business organizations. The Business Resource Centers will serve as the principal site for this incubation.

<u>Economic and Workforce Development Connections</u>: A formalized entity will be formed to incorporate the emerging initiatives in Hawaii County. This includes supporting: health initiatives, energy conservation and "green" industry developments, astronomy, etc.

<u>Career Connections for Youth:</u> An "education to careers" pathway for all youth from 16 to 24 incorporating existing internship and mentoring initiatives at high schools and post-secondary education institutions. It also establishes a Youth Business Innovation Center where entrepreneurship is advocated.)

Our 12-Mile Kumiai Association in Kurtistown strongly supports Hawaii County's workforce initiatives through appropriation to provide long-term social and economic benefits. Therefore, I urge the committee to pass SB2549.
