Chair Oshiro, Vice Chair Lee and Members of the House Committee on Finance:

My name is C. Mike Kido, External Affairs of the Pacific Resource Partnership (PRP), a labor-management consortium representing over 240 signatory contractors and the Hawaii Carpenters Union.

PRP would like to comment on SB 2695, SD1, HD1 (Proposed) – Relating to Non-General Funds, which addresses the fiscal year 2009-2010 budget shortfall by transferring excess balances from certain special funds to the general funds.

PRP kindly request to preserve the \$15 million in special funds dedicated to the Cancer Research Center of Hawaii (CRCH). In our current economic crisis, state funding is more imperative than ever and we must not jeopardize any matching federal funding which is necessary for the construction of the new center. CRCH will help attract more researchers and physician and result in the generation of construction and other related jobs that are much needed in our State's economy.
