Our mission is to promote initiatives aimed at improving the overall health of Hawaii. We are also active participants in the legislative process. Before providing any testimony at a Legislative hearing, all HAHP member organizations must be in unanimous agreement of the statement or position.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on SB 2844, which would prohibit health plans from denying or limiting coverage for organ transplant services to members infected with HIV. We have concerns with the language in this measure and believe that it is unnecessary. We are not aware of any medical practice guideline or hospital provider or health plan in Hawaii that has ever attempted to limit the availability of medically necessary transplant services to a member infected with HIV. This bill addresses a problem that does not exist in Hawaii. Transplant patients, all transplant patients, must meet a minimum level of criteria to even be placed on the waiting list for the procedure.

Kaiser Permanente does not currently deny or limit coverage for organ or tissue transplants on the basis that the patient member is infected with the human immunodeficiency virus ("HIV"). Last year, Kaiser Permanente in fact transferred a solid organ to a mainland member recipient who was infected with HIV.

Kaiser Permanente continues to screen prospective transplant candidates under the exclusionary rules recognized in the Kaiser National Transplant Network Patient Selection and Transplant Criteria, which does not exclude HIV recipients.

Dear Chair Ige, Vice Chair Green and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Medical Service Association (HMSA) appreciates the opportunity to testify on SB 2844 which would prohibit health plans from denying or limiting coverage for transplant services based on a member's HIV status. HMSA has concerns with this measure and believes that it is unnecessary.

Health plan coverage for transplant services is based on medical necessity criteria. Any HMSA member seeking an organ transplant would be required to meet a certain level of criteria in order to be approved for the transplant. HMSA does not discriminate on the basis of an individuals' HIV status.

In addition to the fact that SB 2844 is not addressing a problem with organ transplants in Hawaii, we believe the language would seemingly remove a plan's ability to require a member meet the medical necessity criteria for all transplant patients. This could end up being extremely problematic as transplant criteria is extremely rigid and all potential transplant patients must meet the same level of criteria.

Due to the issues with the measure, we would respectfully request the Committee see fit to hold SB 2844. Thank you for the opportunity to testify today.
