TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL NO. 448 – RELATING TO DECEPTIVE TRADE PRACTICES.

TO THE HONORABLE ROSALYN H. BAKER, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

The Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (Department) appreciates the opportunity to testify with comments regarding Senate Bill No. 448, Relating to Deceptive Trade Practices. My name is Stephen Levins, and I am the Executive Director of the Office of Consumer Protection, representing the Department.

Senate Bill No. 448 seeks to amend section 481A-3 of the Hawaii Revised

Statutes, by adding a provision that would make it an unfair or deceptive trade practice
to advertise goods or services that are unlawful under any federal, state, or county law,

ordinance, rule, or regulation. Presumably, among the panoply of regulations that this amendment would encompass would be things such as advertising an 'escort' service that is a front for prostitution or advertising contraband, such as drug paraphernalia or fully automatic weapons.

The Department has concerns that as drafted the proposed amendment is too vague to be enforceable. It is unclear whether the provision applies to the act or the advertisement and it is also unclear as to whether it applies only to Hawaii laws or those of any jurisdiction in the United States. For instance, does it mean that a Hawaii business could be found liable for violating an administrative rule from a county in Kansas that prohibits targeting advertisements to a certain class of persons?

Consequently, unless this provision is clarified it would appear to present a myriad of enforcement difficulties, for the State of Hawaii, private litigants, and for the Courts.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 448. I will be happy to answer any questions that the Committee members may have.
