SB 747 SD2 RELATING TO WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Chair Takumi, Chair Rhoads, and Members of the House Committees on Education and Labor and Public Employment.

The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) would like to provide comments on this measure which addresses education and workforce development issues in the state. We also urge that its implementation not impact or replace the priorities set forth in the Executive Biennium Budget for Fiscal Years 2009-2010. DBEDT will only address the portion of the measure relating to data sharing. We will defer to DLIR on all other aspects of this measure.

Currently, the University of Hawaii, Department of Education, Department of Labor and Industrial Relations (DLIR), and DBEDT are working together to develop a Memorandum of Understanding to facilitate data sharing in support of tracking and performance measurement. This group of agencies will be submitting grant proposals for stimulus and other funds to pursue this effort. The group greatly appreciates the support for that effort that this bill provides.

The National Governors Association and other Federal agencies have advocated that states adopt policies that bring about better cooperation between workforce development, economic development and educational agencies. In particular, it has been recognized that better data and the ability to track the progress of students through the educational pipeline are critical to ensuring the effectiveness educational reform and the development of a skilled workforce in a century of increasing global competition. This level of cooperation must continue to be an important goal for Hawaii.

Finally, additional Federal stimulus funds moneys will be made available for states that make progress in several areas, one of which is to improve longitudinal data systems.

Comments regarding S.B. 747, SD 2, Relating to Workforce Development

I. OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

S.B. 747 proposes to implement the following initiatives recommended by the educational workforce working group that was established as a result of Act 283, Session Laws of Hawaii 2007:

- Establish and appropriate funds for a comprehensive database to track students from grades kindergarten to twelve and beyond as they move into the workforce;
- Establish and appropriate funds for a community-based exchange coordinator position and support staff in the Department of Education for administrative purposes only, and housed within a nonprofit organization in Hawaii;

- Appropriate funds for enhancement of the Department of Education volunteer website;
- Extend and appropriate funds for the educational workforce working group that is housed within the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations for administrative purposes only; and
- Establish and appropriate funds for the educational working group to review and recommend enhancements to the current Career and Technical Education website for dissemination of information regarding workforce development resources, initiatives, and programs.

II. CURRENT LAW

Act 283, Session Laws of 2007, established the educational workforce working group to identify and address various issues relating to workforce needs. The group submitted a report containing issues and recommendations to the legislature, which was the basis for this bill.

III. SENATE BILL

The Department opposes S.B. 747 SD2 for the following reasons:

- 1. The Department is currently involved in a project with the University of Hawaii, DEBDT and the DOE to apply for a federal grant to establish a comprehensive database to track students from kindergarten to the workforce. Given the current budget situation and fact that we are currently pursuing a grant, an appropriation from the State General Fund would not be appropriate at this time.
- With regard to the community based exchange coordinator position and support staff, these additional positions are not budgeted for in the Executive Biennium Budget 2009-2010. Given the current budget situation it would not be prudent to make these additional appropriations.
- 3. The Department opposes the creation of the workforce working group mentioned in this proposal, as the Workforce Development Council is already equipped to address educational workforce issues.

SB 747, SD 2 - RELATING TO WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Chairs Takumi and Rhoads, Vice Chairs Berg and Yamashita, and Members of the Committees:

As pointed out in SB 747, SD2, the educational workforce working group established by Act 238 SLH 2007, prepared and submitted a report to the legislature, which included numerous recommendations along with a significant number of detailed action steps. As participants in the process, we found the efforts of the group to be helpful in focusing attention on a number of complex issues that create barriers to the operation of a more efficient education to work pipeline.

The University and the Community Colleges would be happy to participate if the working group is extended for two additional years as called for in the bill.
