A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAWAII-GROWN PRODUCE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 5 §302A- Hawaii-grown fresh fruit and vegetable program.
- 6 (a) The Hawaii-grown fresh fruit and vegetable program is
- 7 established in the department of education. The purpose of the
- 8 program is to facilitate consumption of Hawaii-produced
- 9 nutritious snacks to improve student health and expand the
- 10 market for Hawaii-grown fresh fruit and vegetables.
- 11 (b) The program may increase the number of school children
- 12 with access to Hawaii-grown fresh fruits and vegetables and
- 13 shall be modeled after the United States Department of
- 14 Agriculture Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program, as described in
- 15 42 United States Code Section 1769(g). Schools receiving funds
- 16 under the federal Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program are not

- 6 to grow food in school gardens for consumption in their school
- 7 lunch and as part of the Hawaii-grown fresh fruit and vegetable
- 8 program; provided that all food from school gardens used for
- 9 consumption may be food safety certified by the department of
- 10 agriculture.
- 11 (b) School garden programs may include education for
- 12 students about organic and conventional growing methods.
- 13 (c) The department may adopt rules under chapter 91 to

- 15 SECTION 2. (a) The department of human services may
- 16 establish the farmers to food banks pilot program in cooperation
- 17 with the department of agriculture to contract with Hawaii
- 18 farmers to provide Hawaii-grown produce to low-income people
- 19 through designated food banks. The pilot program may operate in
- 20 select pilot site communities statewide.

- 1 (b) The department of human services shall select the
- 2 pilot communities that shall participate in the project. The
- 3 selection of pilot communities shall be based on:
- 4 (1) The percentage of the population in the community
- 5 suffering from hunger and food insecurity;
- 6 (2) The existence and success of the local food bank
- 7 program;
- **8** (3) The potential to engage and contract with local
- 9 farmers; and
- 10 (4) The capacity to leverage private sector funding and
- in-kind contributions.
- (c) Any funds appropriated by the legislature shall be
- 13 used by the pilot program to contract with Hawaii farmers to
- 14 provide fruits and vegetables for distribution to low-income
- 15 people through designated food banks.
- 16 (d) The department of human services shall report to the
- 17 legislature at least twenty days prior to the convening of the
- 18 2012 and 2013 regular sessions regarding the progress of the
- 19 pilot program.
- 20 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 22 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2011-2012 and the

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- 1 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 2 2012-2013 for the Hawaii-grown fresh fruit and vegetable program
- 3 established by this Act.
- 4 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 5 of education for the purposes of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2030.
