A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SUSTAINABILITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. During the 2005 special session, the
- 2 legislature adopted Act 8, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2005
- 3 (Act 8), to create the Hawaii 2050 task force to review the
- 4 Hawaii state plan and the State's planning process. The office
- 5 of the auditor was required to prepare and submit to the
- 6 legislature the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan. In enacting
- 7 Act 8, the legislature expressed its belief that government is
- 8 responsible for resolving daily and immediate issues and public
- 9 needs, while providing guidance to assure a sustainable future
- 10 and outlook.
- 11 The creation of the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan comes
- 12 as the State faces a growing number of pressing issues,
- 13 including the steady deterioration of public infrastructure, the
- 14 lack of affordable housing, a continued reliance on a service-
- 15 based economy, the vulnerability of Hawaii in a volatile global
- 16 energy market, possible interruptions in travel and to critical
- 17 food supplies, threats to fragile island ecosystems, ever-
- 18 increasing numbers of residents, and an increasing number of



- 1 visitors over the long-term. All of these issues raise
- 2 questions about the long-term limits of growth in the State and
- 3 motivate the need to begin planning and action to assure
- 4 Hawaii's future.
- 5 Clearly, a policy framework to establish sustainability as
- 6 a state priority and ensure a coordinated and coherent approach
- 7 to fulfilling the long-range vision for a sustainable Hawaii is
- 8 needed. The mission of the Hawaii 2050 task force and the
- 9 objectives of the Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan focus on the
- 10 revitalization of the State's long-term planning process to
- 11 better guide the future development of Hawaii. Addressing and
- 12 solving issues critical to Hawaii's way of life and natural
- 13 resources requires coordinated community efforts to produce
- 14 comprehensive, long-range planning policies and actions.
- 15 In 2008, the legislature adopted Act 225, Session Laws of
- 16 Hawaii 2008 (Act 225), asking the University of Hawaii at Manoa
- 17 college of social sciences public policy center to review the
- 18 Hawaii 2050 sustainability plan and provide a definitive
- 19 framework for policy makers including defined data, data
- 20 sources, and benchmarks for each of the major goals.
- 21 The purpose of this Act is to implement the recommendations
- 22 of the Hawaii 2050 update report, commissioned by Act 225, to

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- 1 establish sustainability as a State priority by adopting the
- 2 Hawaii 2050 sustainability definitions, quiding principles, and
- 3 goals.
- 4 SECTION 2. Chapter 226, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 5 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 6 to read as follows:
- 7 "PART . 2050 SUSTAINABILITY POLICY
- 8 §226- Findings and purpose. In 2005, the legislature
- 9 enacted Act 8, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2005, to create
- 10 the Hawaii 2050 task force to review the Hawaii state plan and
- 11 develop sustainability policies to address the vital needs of
- 12 the State through the year 2050. The office of the auditor was
- 13 required to prepare and submit to the legislature the Hawaii
- 14 2050 sustainability plan.
- 15 The task force developed a comprehensive sustainability
- 16 plan that included guiding principles and five major goals for
- 17 Hawaii 2050.
- 18 The purpose of this part is to set forth the Hawaii 2050
- 19 sustainability policy, which shall serve as a guide for the
- 20 future long-range sustainability planning of the State.

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1	§226-	- Definitions. As used in this part, the	
2	following	words and terms shall have the following meanings	
3	unless the	e context indicates another meaning or intent:	
4	"Ahupuaa" means a traditional native Hawaiian resource and		
5	behavioral management system that ensures respect for the air,		
6	land, water, and other scarce natural resources that make life		
7	sustainable from the mountains to the sea.		
8	"Kanaka maoli" means native Hawaiians.		
9	"Sust	cainability" means achieving the following:	
10	(1)	Respect of the culture, character, beauty, and history	
11		of the State's island communities;	
12	(2)	Striking a balance between economic, social,	
13		community, and environmental priorities; and	
14	(3)	Meeting the needs of the present without compromising	
15		the ability of future generations to meet their own	
16		needs.	
17	§226-	Sustainability; guiding principles. (a) Hawaii	
18	residents	desire a balance between economic, cultural, and	
19	environmen	ntal concerns and priorities. Thus, sustainability in	
20	Hawaii shall be established as the overall theme and guiding		
21	principle of sustainability policy:		

1	(1)	To balance economic, social, community, and
2		environmental priorities;
3	(2)	To respect and live within the natural resources and
4		limits of the State;
5	(3)	To achieve a diversified and dynamic economy;
6	(4)	To honor the host culture;
7	(5)	To make decisions based on meeting the needs of the
8		present without compromising the needs of future
9		generations;
10	(6)	To observe the principles of the ahupuaa system to
11		guide resource management decisions; and
12	(7)	To emphasize that everyone, including individuals,
13		families, communities, businesses, and government, has
14		the responsibility for achieving a sustainable Hawaii.
15	§226	- Sustainability goals. There are established
16	five majo	r goals that are designed to achieve a preferred future
17	by the year	ar 2050, which shall include the following:
18	(1)	A way of life in which living sustainably is a part of
19	•	daily practice in Hawaii;
20	(2)	A diversified and globally competitive economy that
21		will enable residents to live, work, and play
22		meaningfully in Hawaii;

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1	(3)	Responsible and respectful use, replenishment, and
2		preservation of the State's natural resources for
3		future generations;
4	(4)	A community that is strong, healthy, vibrant, and
5		nurturing, thus providing safety nets for those in
6		need; and
7	(5)	An environment where Kanaka maoli and island cultures
8		and values thrive and are perpetuated."
9	SECT	TON 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2011.
