H.B. NO. 1403

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PLANNING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that given Hawaii's 2 limited natural resources, the implementation of smart growth 3 principles, including the preservation of open space, is crucial to the sustainability of the islands. There are ten principles 4 5 of smart growth:

- Creating a range of housing opportunities and choices; 6 (1)
- 7 (2)Creating walkable neighborhoods;
- 8 (3)Encouraging community and stakeholder collaboration;
- Fostering distinctive, attractive communities with a 9 (4)10 strong sense of place;
- 11 (5) Making development decisions predictable, fair, and 12 • cost-effective;
- Mixing land uses;

- 14 (7)Preserving open space, farmland, natural beauty, and 15 critical environmental areas:
- 16 (8) Providing a variety of transportation choices;
- Strengthening and directing development toward 17 (9)
- 18 existing communities; and



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(10) Taking advantage of compact building design. 1 2 Smart growth principles are most successful when the State 3 makes systemic changes that are consistent with these principles 4 in community planning and development, as well as land 5 preservation. Several other states have implemented similar 6 programs successfully. For example, Maryland has implemented a 7 series of legislation promoting smart growth, and Florida has 8 implemented a greenways and trails program to provide more 9 recreational opportunities and venues.

10 The purpose of this Act is to promote smart growth and 11 sustainability in the State by requiring the office of planning 12 to develop and promote the use of smart growth principles in new 13 and existing communities.

SECTION 2. Chapter 225M, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

17 "<u>§225M-</u> <u>Smart growth coordination.</u> (a) The office of
18 planning shall coordinate efforts to incorporate the principles
19 of smart growth in new and existing communities in the State,
20 including:

<u>(1)</u> Gathering and disseminating information to the
 <u>counties and the public, including nonprofit</u>



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1		organizations and developers, on how to develop			
2		projects in a manner that is consistent with the			
3		principles of smart growth;			
4	(2)	Providing a single point of access for individuals or			
5		organizations that need assistance or guidance in			
6		navigating the processes and regulations of state			
7		agencies on projects that are consistent with the			
8		principles of smart growth; and			
9	(3)	Coordinating the efforts of the governor and executive			
10		branch to provide input to the legislature on			
11		legislation relating to smart growth and neighborhood			
12		conservation.			
13	(b)	The principles of smart growth are:			
14	(1)	Creating a range of housing opportunities and choices;			
15	(2)	Creating walkable neighborhoods;			
16	<u>(3)</u>	Encouraging community and stakeholder collaboration;			
17	(4)	Fostering distinctive, attractive communities with a			
18		strong sense of place;			
19	(5)	Making development decisions predictable, fair, and			
20		<pre>cost-effective;</pre>			
21	(6)	Mixing land uses;

12	SECTION 3. Section 225M-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is				
13	amended to	o read as follows:			
14	"§22	5M-1 Purpose. The purpose of this chapter is to			
15	establish an office of planning to assist the governor and the				
16	director of business, economic development, and tourism in				
17	maintaining an overall framework to guide the development of the				
18	State through a continuous process of comprehensive, long-range,				
19	and strategic planning to meet the physical, economic, and				
20	social needs of Hawaii's people, and provide for the wise use of				
	Hawaii's resources in a coordinated, efficient, and economical				
21	Hawaii's :	resources in a coordinated, efficient, and economical

4	The	establishment of an office of planning in the		
5	department of business, economic development, and tourism, for			
6	administrative purposes, is intended to:			
7	(1)	Fix responsibility and accountability to successfully		
-8		carry out statewide planning programs, policies, and		
9		priorities;		
10	(2)	Improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the		
11		operations of the executive branch;		
12	(3)	Ensure comprehensive planning and coordination to		
13		enhance the quality of life of the people of		
14		Hawaii[-]; and		
15	(4)	Develop and promote the use of smart growth principles		
16		in new and existing communities."		
17	SECTION 4. Section 225M-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is			
18	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:			
19	"(b)	The office of planning shall gather, analyze, and		
20	provide information to the governor to assist in the overall			
21	analysis and formulation of state policies and strategies to			
22	provide c	entral direction and cohesion in the allocation of		
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resources, [and effectuation of] implement state activities and
 programs, and effectively address current or emerging issues and
 opportunities. More specifically, the office shall engage in
 the following activities:

- 5 (1) State comprehensive planning and program
 6 coordination. Formulating and articulating
 7 comprehensive statewide goals, objectives, policies,
 8 and priorities, and coordinating their implementation
 9 through the statewide planning system established in
 10 part II of chapter 226;
- 11 (2) Strategic planning. Identifying and analyzing
 12 significant issues, problems, and opportunities
 13 confronting the State, and formulating strategies and
 14 alternative courses of action in response to
 15 identified problems and opportunities by:
- 16 (A) Providing in-depth policy research, analysis, and
 17 recommendations on existing or potential areas of
 18 critical state concern;
- 19 (B) Examining and evaluating the effectiveness of
 20 state programs in implementing state policies and
 21 priorities;

5		(D)	Developing, in collaboration with affected public

16			necessary, major plans, programs, projects, and

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	(C) Recognizing the presence of federal defense and
	security forces and agencies in the State as

(4)	Statewide planning and geographic information system.
	Collecting, integrating, analyzing, maintaining, and
	disseminating various forms of data and information,
	including geospatial data and information, to further
	effective state planning, policy analysis and
	development, and delivery of government services by:
	(A) Collecting, assembling, organizing, evaluating,
	and classifying existing geospatial and non-
	geospatial data and performing necessary basic
	research, conversions, and integration to provide
	a common database for governmental planning and
×	geospatial analyses by state agencies;
	(B) Planning, coordinating, and maintaining a
	comprehensive, shared statewide planning and
	geographic information system and associated
	geospatial database. The office shall be the
	lead agency responsible for coordinating the
	maintenance of the multi-agency, statewide
	planning and geographic information system and
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1 coordinating, collecting, integrating, and 2 disseminating geospatial data sets that are used 3 to support a variety of state agency applications 4 and other spatial data analyses to enhance 5 decision-making. The office shall promote and 6 encourage free and open data sharing among and 7 between all government agencies. To ensure the 8 maintenance of a comprehensive, accurate, up-to-9 date geospatial data resource that can be drawn 10 upon for decision making related to essential 11 public policy issues such as land use planning, 12 resource management, homeland security, and the 13 overall health, safety, and well-being of 14 Hawaii's citizens, and to avoid redundant data 15 development efforts, state agencies shall provide 16 to the shared system either their respective 17 geospatial databases or, at a minimum, especially 18 in cases of secure or confidential-data sets that 19 cannot be shared or must be restricted, metadata 20 describing existing geospatial data. In cases 21 where agencies provide restricted data, the



1		office of planning shall ensure the security of
2		that data; and
3		(C) Maintaining a centralized depository of state and
4		national planning references;
5	(5)	Land use planning. Developing and presenting the
6		position of the State in all boundary change petitions
7		and proceedings before the land use commission,
8		assisting state agencies in the development and
9		submittal of petitions for land use district boundary
10		amendments, and conducting periodic reviews of the
11		classification and districting of all lands in the
12		State, as specified in chapter 205;
13	(6)	Coastal and ocean policy management. Carrying out the
14		lead agency responsibilities for the Hawaii coastal
15		zone management program, as specified in chapter
16		205A. Also, developing and maintaining an ocean and
17		coastal resources information, planning, and
18		management system further developing and coordinating
19		implementation of the ocean resources management plan,
20		and formulating ocean policies with respect to the
21		exclusive economic zone, coral reefs, and national
22		marine sanctuaries;

15		The studies in subparagraphs (A) to (C) shall be		
16		conducted at appropriate intervals, but not less than

18	(8)	Smart growth. Developing, planning, and coordinating

20		inclu	ding infill development; and	
21	[-(8) -]	(9)	Regional, national, and international planning.	
22		Partic	cipating in and ensuring that state plans,	



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policies, and objectives are consistent, to the extent practicable, with regional, national, and international planning efforts." SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2011.
