A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SHIPPING CONTAINER INSPECTIONS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the state

2 departments of transportation and defense lack the statutory

3 authority to inspect incoming shipping containers. Most

4 containers are inspected by shipping companies who match the

5 cargo with the shipping manifest for billing purposes.

6 "The Adherence Group" is a third-party private inspection

service that is hired by shipping companies to inspect shipping

8 containers to ensure that the cargo matches the manifest. The

9 legislature believes that The Adherence Group could serve as a

model for state authorities in formulating procedures for

inspecting shipping containers.

12 The legislature further finds that the inspection of

shipping containers is a major element in the fight against

14 terrorism. Particularly in light of the State's geographical

15 isolation and the numerous containers arriving by ship, it is

16 imperative that the State broaden its inspection of incoming

17 shipping containers.
