# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE WEED AND SEED STRATEGY.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that "weed and seed" is a strategy sponsored by the United States Department of Justice 2 3 and is administered locally by the United States Attorney's 4 Office. Initiated in 1992, weed and seed is an innovative, 5 comprehensive, multi-agency approach to law enforcement, crime 6 prevention, and community revitalization. The strategy is currently implemented in one hundred fifteen sites across the 7 8 nation.

9 The weed and seed strategy is a collaborative effort among 10 law enforcement agencies at the federal, state, and county 11 levels, social service agencies, private businesses, nonprofit 12 organizations, and residents to reclaim, restore, and rebuild 13 communities. The four key elements of the weed and seed 14 strategy are:

- 15 (1) Law enforcement;
- 16 (2) Community policing;

17 (3) Prevention, intervention, and treatment programs; and
18 (4) Neighborhood restoration.

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1 The weed and seed strategy works with local law enforcement 2 to prevent, control, and reduce violent crime, drug abuse, and 3 gang activity in targeted neighborhoods by "weeding" out the 4 criminal element in the community. Community policing involves 5 having police officers work closely with community residents to 6 develop solutions to violent and drug-related crimes. "Seeding" 7 the community involves collaboration among various human 8 services organizations to implement prevention, intervention treatment, and neighborhood revitalization projects, programs, 9 10 and activities.

11 The legislature finds that the State has benefited greatly 12 from weed and seed programs based on the weed and seed strategy 13 at sites on Oahu that encompass Ala Moana, Chinatown, downtown 14 Honolulu, Kalihi, Waipahu, and Ewa Beach. Since the 15 implementation of the strategy, crime in those areas has 16 decreased significantly. The legislature further finds that the 17 strategy's success warrants the continued operation of the weed 18 and seed program in these communities, and envisions expanding 19 it to other communities in the future. 20 The purpose of this Act is to:



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1	(1)	Establish a permanent weed and seed program within the	
2		department of labor and industrial relations to	
3		continue the program's success; and	
4	(2)	Appropriate funds to maintain current operations of	
5		the weed and seed program and expand the program into	
6		other areas of the State.	
7	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 371, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
8	amended b	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated	
9	and to read as follows:		
10	" <u>§</u> 37	1- Weed and seed program; established. (a) There	
11	is establ	ished within the department of labor and industrial	
12	relations the weed and seed program to reduce crime and improve		
13	the quality of life for residents and neighborhoods in the		
14	State. The program shall be a collaborative effort among		
15	residents, law enforcement agencies, social service providers,		
16	educators, area businesses, and other resource agencies and		
17	support organizations to:		
18	(1)	Create, initiate, implement, and support responsible,	
19		community-based activities, projects, and services	
20		that help reduce crime and drug use in neighborhoods;	

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1	(2) Engage members of the community to encourage the		
2	development and maintenance of economic and social		
3	well-being; and		
4	(3) Teach and model collaborative efforts that focus on		
5	sustainable results.		
6	(b) No later than twenty days prior to the convening of		
7	each regular session of the legislature, the department of labor		
8	and industrial relations shall submit a report to the		
9	legislature and the governor on its activities, including		
10	projects completed or ongoing, funds expended, and other		
11	relevant data or information on the program."		
12	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general		
13	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so		
14	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2011-2012 and		
15	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal		
16	year 2012-2013 to maintain the weed and seed program in areas		
17	currently designated for the weed and seed strategy and to		
18	expand the weed and seed program into other areas of the State.		
19	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department		
20	of labor and industrial relations for the purposes of this Act.		
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2	SECTION 5.	This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2011.
