#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO RELIGIOUS FREEDOM.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
2	adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
3	as follows:
4	"CHAPTER
5	RELIGIOUS FREEDOM
6	<b>§ -1 Definitions.</b> As used in this chapter:
7	"Demonstrates" means to meet the burden of going forward
8	with the evidence and of persuasion.
9	"Exercise of religion" means an act or refusal to act that
10	is substantially motivated by a religious belief, whether or not
11	the religious exercise is compulsory or central to a larger
12	system of religious belief.
13	"Government" or "State" means any branch, department,
14	agency, instrumentality, official, or other person acting under
15	color of law of the State, a county, municipality, or any other
16	subdivision of the State.
17	<b>§ -2 Free exercise of religion protected.</b> (a) The
18	government shall not burden a person's exercise of religion,
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1 even if the burden results from a rule of general applicability; 2 provided that the government may burden a person's exercise of 3 religion if it demonstrates that the application of the burden 4 to the person:

5 (1) Is in furtherance of a compelling governmental6 interest; and

7 (2) Is the least restrictive means of furthering that8 compelling governmental interest.

9 (b) A person whose religious exercise has been burdened in
10 violation of this chapter may assert that violation as a claim
11 or defense in a judicial proceeding and obtain appropriate
12 relief.

13 § -3 Remedies. (a) Any person, other than a government
14 agency, who successfully asserts a claim or defense under this
15 chapter is entitled to recover:

16 (1) Declaratory relief;

17 (2) Injunctive relief to prevent the threatened violation18 or continued violation;

19 (3) Compensatory damages for pecuniary and nonpecuniary
 20 losses; and

21 (4) Reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, and other
 22 reasonable expenses incurred in bringing the action.



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1 Compensatory damages awarded under subsection (a) (3) (b) 2 shall not exceed \$10,000 for each entire, distinct controversy, 3 without regard to the number of members or other persons within 4 a religious group who claim injury as a result of the government agency's exercise of governmental authority. A claimant is not 5 6 entitled to recover exemplary damages under this chapter. 7 (c) An action under this section shall be brought in 8 circuit court. 9 (d) A person shall not bring an action for damages or 10 declaratory or injunctive relief against an individual, other than an action brought against an individual acting in the 11 12 individual's official capacity as an officer of a government 13 agency. -4 Waiver of sovereign immunity. Immunity from 14 S liability of the government agency and its employees shall be 15 16 waived for an action brought pursuant to this chapter. 17 -5 Applicability; construction. (a) This chapter S

18 applies to all state law, and the implementation of the law,
19 whether statutory or otherwise, and whether adopted before or
20 after the enactment of this chapter.

(b) State law adopted after the date of the enactment ofthis chapter is subject to this chapter unless such law



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explicitly excludes such application by reference to this
 chapter.

3 (c) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to4 authorize the government to burden any religious belief.

5 (d) Nothing in this chapter shall create any rights by an
6 employee against an employer if the employer is not a government
7 agency.

8 (e) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to affect,
9 interpret, or in any way address that portion of article I,
10 section 4 of the Hawaii State Constitution, or the First
11 Amendment to the United States Constitution, which prohibits
12 laws respecting the establishment of religion. This chapter
13 shall not be construed to permit any practice prohibited by such
14 provisions.

(f) The granting of government funding, benefits, or exemptions, to the extent permissible under the Hawaii State Constitution shall not constitute a violation of this chapter. As used in this subsection, "granting" does not include the denial of government funding, benefits, or exemptions. (g) The protection of the free exercise of religion

21 granted under this chapter is in addition to the protections



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granted by federal law, the United States Constitution, and the
 Hawaii State Constitution."

3 SECTION 2. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
