H.B. NO. 1553

A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR INVESTIGATION AND MITIGATION OF DAMAGE DONE BY THE COFFEE BERRY BORER.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the coffee berry 2 borer, Hypothenemus hampei, is a small beetle native to Africa. It is recognized to be the most harmful pest to coffee crops 3 worldwide, causing an estimated \$500,000,000 in losses annually. 4 5 The coffee industry has an economic value exceeding \$70,000,000,000 each year, with over twenty million coffee-6 7 farming families producing coffee in more than fifty countries. 8 The tiny, 1.5 millimeter coffee berry borer causes damage 9 by boring and depositing eggs into the berry. Larvae hatch and 10 feed on the seed or bean, destroying it. The beetle spends its 11 entire larval life inside the coffee berry, which encases the 12 seed, commonly known as the coffee bean. Males mate inside the berry with females, but never emerge. Only mated females emerge 13 14 to fly to a new berry and bore into it to lay eggs and start the 15 cycle anew. Only while outside the berry are the adult female 16 borers vulnerable to predators or chemical controls.

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1 The insect was native to Angola and spread to the rest of 2 Africa during the 1920s. In 1926, they were first reported in 3 the Americas in Brazil. The beetle spread to Guatemala and 4 Mexico in the 1970s, Colombia in the late 1980s, and the 5 Dominican Republic in the 1990s. In September, 2010, the beetle 6 was discovered in Kona on the island of Hawaii.

7 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funding from the 8 agricultural development and food security special fund for 9 investigation and mitigation of damage done by the coffee berry 10 borer.

11 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the agricultural . 12 development and food security special fund established under 13 section 141-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the sum of \$750,000 or 14 so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2011-2012 15 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for 16 fiscal year 2012-2013 for investigation and mitigation of damage 17 done by the coffee berry borer in the Kona region on the island 18 of Hawaii as follows:

19 (1) \$ to fund investigative research by the
20 college of tropical agriculture and human resources of
21 the University of Hawaii, in collaboration with the
22 United States Department of Agriculture's Pacific



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Basin Agriculture Research Center in Hilo, to develop practical techniques for use to combat the effects of the coffee berry borer in the Kona region on the island of Hawaii;

5 .(2) \$ to fund one position in the Kona office of 6 the cooperative extension service of the college of 7 tropical agriculture and human resources of the 8 University of Hawaii, whose specific responsibility 9 shall be to assist farmers to implement the coffee 10 berry borer mitigation program described in paragraph 11 (3);

12 (3)\$ to fund, for a minimum of three years, one 13 temporary department of agriculture position to be 14 filled by a professional entomologist with biological 15 control experience, whose responsibility shall be to 16 develop a coffee berry borer mitigation program 17 applicable for the Kona region on the island of 18 Hawaii;

19 (4) \$ to purchase and install equipment to
20 identify and track areas of coffee berry borer
21 infestation in the Kona region on the island of
22 Hawaii;



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1 (5) for the department of agriculture to obtain \$ 2 contract services from research agencies to develop 3 and test coffee berry borer control and eradication 4 processes; 5 (6) \$ to provide sanitation services to eliminate 6 coffee berry borer infestations on abandoned farms 7 that contain uncultivated coffee in the Kona region on 8 the island of Hawaii; 9 (7) \$ to locate and establish a coffee berry 10 borer quarantine site with equipment and services to 11 fumigate or provide heat treatment of green coffee 12 beans for shipment from the island of Hawaii; and 13 (8) Ş to fund travel and administrative expenses 14 necessary to support the operations of the coffee 15 berry borer task force. 16 The sums appropriated in paragraphs (1) and (2) shall be expended by the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this 17 18 Act. 19 The sums appropriated in paragraphs (3) through (8) shall 20 be expended by the department of agriculture for the purposes of 21 this Act.

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SECTION 3. The department of agriculture, in collaboration
 with the coffee berry borer task force, shall submit a report to
 the legislature no later than July 31, 2011. The report shall
 document the expenditure of funds and the progress of activities
 authorized by this Act.

SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2011.
