A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL LANDS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Between 1969 and 2006, the amount of land zoned 2 for agriculture declined by over twenty-five thousand acres 3 statewide, according to the Hawaii Data Book. On Oahu, land under cultivation went from one hundred twenty-five thousand 4 5 acres in 1982 to seventy thousand acres in 2005, according to the Statistics of Hawaii Agriculture compiled by the state 6 7 department of agriculture. Throughout the State, prime agriculture lands are being developed. On Oahu, there is 8 particular concern regarding housing projects projected to be 9 built on prime agriculture lands in Mokuleia, Kahuku, and the 10 11 Ewa plain.

The legislature further finds that the State's land use law 12 was enacted to "preserve and protect land best suited for . . . 13 agricultural purposes and to facilitate sound and economical 14 urban development . . . " (Senate Stand. Com. Rep. No. 580; 1961 15 16 Senate Journal). Since that time, lands classified by the land study bureau as class A and class B lands, the lands most suited 17 18 for intensive agricultural use, have declined from 359,690 acres 2011-0382 HB SMA.doc

(class A, 125,160 acres; class B, 234,530 acres) in 1960 to
172,094 acres (class A, 56,653 acres; class B, 115,441 acres) in
2007. These agricultural lands are a resource that cannot be
replaced once they are lost to development.

The inventory of lands that are suitable for agriculture is 5 essentially fixed. Agricultural lands cannot be manufactured 6 7 when the demand for these lands increases. In 1960, the land study bureau estimated that there were nearly 360,000 acres of 8 class A and B lands on the six major islands. These were the 9 lands upon which the State depended for profitable, competitive 10 agricultural production. By 2007, the inventory of class A and 11 B lands had declined to slightly more than 172,000 acres. Thus, 12 it is more important than ever to conserve Hawaii's most 13 productive agricultural lands, especially in counties with a 14 population of over five hundred thousand residents. 15

16 The purpose of this Act is to carry out the mandate of 17 article XI, section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution to 18 conserve and protect agricultural lands and ensure availability 19 of agriculturally suitable lands.

20 SECTION 2. Section 205-3.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 21 amended by amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows:



"(a) District boundary amendments involving lands in the 1 conservation district, land areas greater than fifteen acres, 2 3 agricultural lands with soil classified by the land study bureau's detailed land classification as overall (master) 4 5 productivity rating class A or B, or lands delineated as 6 important agricultural lands shall be processed by the land use 7 commission pursuant to section 205-4. Any department or agency of the State, and department 8 (b) or agency of the county in which the land is situated, or any 9 person with a property interest in the land sought to be 10 reclassified may petition the appropriate county land use 11 decision-making authority of the county in which the land is 12 situated for a change in the boundary of a district involving 13 lands less than fifteen acres presently in the rural and urban 14 15 districts and lands less than fifteen acres in the agricultural district that are not agricultural lands with soil classified by 16 the land study bureau's detailed land classification as overall 17 (master) productivity rating class A or B, and are not 18 19 designated as important agricultural lands." SECTION 3. Section 205-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 20 amended as follows: 21 By amending subsection (a) to read: 22 1.

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"(a) Any department or agency of the State, any department 1 or agency of the county in which the land is situated, or any 2 person with a property interest in the land sought to be 3 reclassified, may petition the land use commission for a change 4 in the boundary of a district. This section applies to all 5 petitions for changes in district boundaries of lands within 6 7 conservation districts, agricultural lands with soil classified by the land study bureau's detailed land classification as 8 overall (master) productivity rating class A or B, lands 9 designated or sought to be designated as important agricultural 10 lands, and lands greater than fifteen acres in the agricultural, 11 rural, and urban districts, except as provided in section 201H-12 The land use commission shall adopt rules pursuant to 13 38. chapter 91 to implement section 201H-38." 14 15 2. By amending subsection (h) to read: "(h) No amendment of a land use district boundary shall be 16 approved unless the commission finds upon the clear 17 preponderance of the evidence that the proposed boundary is 18 reasonable, not violative of section 205-2 and part III of this 19 chapter, and consistent with the policies and criteria 20 established pursuant to sections 205-16 and 205-17[-]; provided 21 that for a boundary amendment for agricultural lands with soil 22 2011-0382 HB SMA.doc
