A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT OF ATTORNEYS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 28-8.3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2 amended as follows:

3 1. By amending subsection (a) to read:

4 "(a) No department of the State other than the attorney
5 general may employ or retain any attorney, by contract or
6 otherwise, for the purpose of representing the State or the
7 department in any litigation, rendering legal counsel to the
8 department, or drafting legal documents for the department;
9 provided that the foregoing provision shall not apply to the
10 employment or retention of attorneys:

11 (1) By the public utilities commission, the labor and
12 industrial relations appeals board, and the Hawaii
13 labor relations board;

14 (2) By any court or judicial or legislative office of the
15 State; provided that if the attorney general is
16 requested to provide representation to a court or
17 judicial office by the chief justice or the chief
18 justice's designee, or to a legislative office by the
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1		speaker of the house of representatives and the
2		president of the senate jointly, and the attorney
3		general declines to provide such representation on the
4		grounds of conflict of interest, the attorney general
5		shall retain an attorney for the court, judicial, or
6		legislative office, subject to approval by the court,
7		judicial, or legislative office;
` 8	(3)	By the legislative reference bureau;
9	(4)	By any compilation commission that may be constituted
10		from time to time;
11	(5)	By the real estate commission for any action involving
12		the real estate recovery fund;
13	(6)	By the contractors license board for any action
14		involving the contractors recovery fund;
15	(7)	By the trustees for any action involving the travel
16		agency recovery fund;
17	(8)	By the office of Hawaiian affairs;
18	(9)	By the department of commerce and consumer affairs for
19		the enforcement of violations of chapters 480 and
20		485A;
21	(10)	As grand jury counsel;



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1	(11)	By the Hawaiian home lands trust individual claims
2		review panel;
3	(12)	By the Hawaii health systems corporation, or its
4		regional system boards, or any of their facilities;
5	(13)	By the auditor;
6	(14)	By the office of ombudsman;
7	(15)	By the insurance division;
8	(16)	By the University of Hawaii;
9	(17)	By the Kahoolawe island reserve commission;
10	(18)	By the division of consumer advocacy;
11	(19)	By the office of elections;
12	(20)	By the campaign spending commission;
13	(21)	By the Hawaii tourism authority, as provided in
14		section 201B-2.5;
15	(22)	By the division of financial institutions for any
16		action involving the mortgage loan recovery fund; [or]
17	(23)	By a department, in the event the attorney general,
18		for reasons deemed by the attorney general to be good
19		and sufficient, declines to employ or retain an
20		attorney for a department; provided that the governor
21		thereupon waives the provision of this section[\div]; or
22	(24)	By the state ethics commission."



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2. By amending subsection (c) to read:

2 "(c) Every attorney employed by any department on a fulltime basis, except an attorney employed by the public utilities 3 4 commission, the labor and industrial relations appeals board, 5 the Hawaii labor relations board, the office of Hawaiian 6 affairs, the Hawaii health systems corporation or its regional 7 system boards, the department of commerce and consumer affairs 8 in prosecution of consumer complaints, insurance division, the 9 division of consumer advocacy, the University of Hawaii, the 10 Hawaii tourism authority as provided in section 201B-2.5, the 11 Hawaiian home lands trust individual claims review panel, the 12 state ethics commission, or as grand jury counsel, shall be a 13 deputy attorney general."

14 SECTION 2. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 15 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

16 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
