A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MILITARY AFFAIRS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the presence of the 2 United States military in Hawaii contributes to maintaining the 3 peace and stability of the Asia-Pacific region. Further, 4 Hawaii's economy benefits from this presence in that the military expends approximately \$5,600,000,000 annually in Hawaii 5 and provides employment opportunities to approximately one 6 7 hundred twenty-five thousand residents. Next to tourism, military expenditures are currently the largest source of 8 9 revenues for Hawaii's economy.

10 The purpose of this Act is to establish a military affairs 11 liaison trust fund to support a nonprofit corporation in its 12 duties as liaison in matters relating to the military and to 13 provide oversight for the military's presence in Hawaii and the 14 impact that defense spending has on Hawaii's economy.

15 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by 16 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read 17 as follows:

2	MILITARY AFFAIRS LIAISON TRUST FUND
3	-1 Military affairs liaison trust fund; established.
4	(a) There is established the military affairs liaison trust
5	fund as a separate fund of a Hawaii nonprofit corporation
6	selected pursuant to subsection (g). Moneys received from the
7	state, county, or federal government, private contributions of
8	cash and other property, and the income and capital gains earned
9	by the fund shall constitute the trust fund assets.
10	(b) The nonprofit corporation shall be authorized to
11	expend moneys from the trust fund for the purposes of this
12	chapter.
13	(c) The purpose of the trust fund is to support the
14	nonprofit corporation in its duties as the state liaison in
15	matters relating to the military. Those duties shall include:
16	(1) Serving as an advocate for the military and small
17	businesses desiring to do business with the military
18	and other federal agencies;
19	(2) Promoting a strong and viable partnership between the
20	state and county governments and the military
21	commands;



1	(3)	Building rapport with installation commanders and
2		military communities;
3	(4)	Facilitating business development opportunities for
4		small businesses in defense and other federal
5	1	contracting;
6	(5)	Participating in discussions regarding the schooling
7		of military children in Hawaii's public schools;
8	(6)	Facilitating coordination with the state and county
9		governments and private owners in providing the lands
10		and resources needed by the military to fulfill its
11		missions in defending and securing the United States
12		against all enemies;
13	(7)	Supporting the military in complying with federal and
14		state laws on protecting and preserving Hawaii's
15		natural resources, cultural sites, and artifacts; and
16	(8)	Promoting programs and activities to enhance the
17		quality of life for military personnel and their
18		families.
19	(d)	The fund may receive contributions, grants, or gifts
20	in cash o	r otherwise from all sources. The public and private
21	sectors sl	hall work together as partners in securing

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the military affairs liaison trust fund by legislative
 appropriation; provided that any appropriations made by the
 legislature are not intended to supplant the funding of existing
 programs.

5 (e) There shall be an endowment component of the military6 affairs liaison trust fund.

7 The aggregate principal sum deposited in the military (f) affairs liaison trust fund and any income and capital gains 8 9 earned by the trust fund that are not expended for grantmaking or administration, shall be invested in accordance with the 10 provisions of the nonprofit corporation in a manner intended to 11 maximize the rate of return on investment of the trust fund 12 13 consistent with the objective of preserving the trust fund's principal. 14

(g) The department of defense shall serve as the lead agency for the public sector and, in conjunction with the nonprofit corporation, may provide staffing for the board and advisory committee. The governor shall select the nonprofit corporation that shall serve as the state liaison in matters relating to the military.

21 (h) The fund shall be audited annually by an independent22 auditor. The results of the annual audit of the nonprofit



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corporation shall be submitted to the department of defense and 1 legislature no later than thirty days from the date the 2 nonprofit corporation receives the audit results. In addition, 3 the nonprofit corporation shall retain for a period of three 4 5 years and permit the department of defense, the department of 6 accounting and general services, the legislature, and the auditor, or their duly authorized representatives, to inspect 7 and have access to all documents, papers, books, records, and 8 other material pertinent to the fund and audit. 9

10 (i) In the event of the termination of the trust fund or
11 the dissolution of the nonprofit corporation, the unspent
12 appropriations made by the State, if any, shall revert back to
13 the general fund. Any other amounts remaining in the military
14 affairs liaison trust fund shall be distributed at the
15 recommendation of the board.

16 § -2 Receipt of funds. The fund may accept
17 contributions, grants, or gifts from corporations or other
18 businesses, foundations, government, individuals, and other
19 interested parties.

20 § -3 Military affairs liaison trust fund advisory board.
21 (a) There shall be a military affairs liaison trust fund
22 advisory board, which shall make the final recommendations to



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1 the nonprofit corporation for the expenditure of funds for the 2 following activities: 3 (1) Grantmaking with private nonprofit organizations, 4 public agencies, or qualified individuals to foster beneficial relations between the military and the 5 6 State; 7 (2) Grantmaking to raise community awareness of the trust 8 fund; and 9 (3) Administration of the trust fund. The board shall consist of seven members to be 10 (b) 11 appointed as follows: 12 (1)The governor shall select one member who shall represent a nonprofit corporation to serve for a term 13 of three years; provided that the member may not serve 14 more than two consecutive terms; 15 The governor shall select three members, one of whom 16 (2) 17 shall be a union representative, from a list of names of seven persons submitted by the nonprofit 18 corporation; provided that the three members shall 19 20 serve for a term of three years; provided further that the terms of the initial board members shall be 21 22 staggered as follows:

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1		(A)	One member shall be appointed to a one-year term;

21	representatives, whose membership shall equal one more than the				
22	number of public sector representatives.				
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1	(d)	Each member of the advisory committee shall have one				
2	vote; pro	wided that the representative of the department of				
3	defense shall not vote on matters relating to advising the					
4	department of defense. The advisory committee shall also elect					
5	its officers from among its members.					
6	Ş	-5 Grants. Subject to the approval of the adjutant

There is appropriated out of the general 12 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 13 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2011-2012 and 14 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 15 year 2012-2013 for deposit into the military affairs liaison 16 trust fund. 17 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the military 18 affairs liaison trust fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2011-2012 and the 19 20 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 21 2012-2013 for the purposes of chapter , Hawaii Revised 22 Statutes, relating to the military affairs liaison trust fund. 2011-1893 HB277 SD1 SMA-1.doc 10

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The sums appropriated shall be expended by the nonprofit
 corporation selected pursuant to section -1(g), Hawaii
 Revised Statutes, for the purposes of this Act.
 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2030.
