A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that pursuant to Hawaii's
constitution, statutes, and case law, the State recognizes a
mandate to protect native Hawaiian and Hawaiian traditional and
customary rights.

5 Certain state councils, boards, and commissions administer 6 public trust resources and programs that directly impact native 7 Hawaiian and Hawaiian traditional and customary rights, natural resource protection and access rights, and the public trust. As 8 9 entities of the State, these councils, boards, and commissions 10 have a duty to protect and preserve these rights, and a 11 fiduciary duty to administer the public trust in the interest of 12 the beneficiaries, including native Hawaiians and Hawaiians. 13 The legislature finds that newly appointed members of these 14 state councils, boards, and commissions represent a broad range 15 of expertise and experience and therefore may not possess, upon 16 their appointment, knowledge of native Hawaiian and Hawaiian 17 rights and the public trust that would enable them to execute 18 their roles, fully informed of their responsibilities.

Chapter 10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, indicates that the 1 2 office of Hawaiians affairs is the principal public agency responsible for ensuring that other state agencies protect 3 native Hawaiian and Hawaiian rights. Section 10-1(b), Hawaii 4 5 Revised Statutes, specifies that: 6 It shall be the duty and responsibility of all state departments and instrumentalities of state government 7 providing services and programs which affect native 8 Hawaiians and Hawaiians to actively work toward the goals 9 10 of this chapter and to cooperate with and assist wherever 11 possible the office of Hawaiian affairs. Section 10-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, states that the 12 purposes of the office of Hawaiian affairs include: 13 14 Serving as the principal public agency in this State (3)15 responsible for the performance, development, and 16 coordination of programs and activities relating to 17 native Hawaiians and Hawaiians; except that the 18 Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, 1920, as amended, shall 19 be administered by the Hawaiian homes commission; 20 (4)Assessing the policies and practices of other agencies 21 impacting on native Hawaiians and Hawaiians, and

1 conducting advocacy efforts for native Hawaiians and 2 Hawaiians; 3 Therefore, the legislature finds that to prepare these 4 state appointees to fulfill their roles and responsibilities, 5 fully informed of their duties and obligations, these state 6 appointees should be provided with training. 7 The legislature further finds that the office of Hawaiian affairs is the appropriate agency to train and educate the 8 9 members of appropriate councils, boards, and commissions about 10 native Hawaiian and Hawaiian traditional and customary rights, 11 natural resource protection and access rights, and the public 12 trust. The purpose of this Act is to require members of 13 14 appropriate state councils, boards, and commissions to undergo training conducted by the office of Hawaiian affairs on native 15 Hawaiian and Hawaiian rights, the source of these rights, and 16 how infringement of these rights impacts the native Hawaiian and 17 18 Hawaiian people.

19 SECTION 2. Chapter 10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended 20 by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and to read 21 as follows:

Notify each council, board, and commission member 1 (3) enumerated in section 10-A that attendance in the 2 3 training course is required.

4 (e) The training course shall be conducted at least twice 5 in a calendar year.

The office of Hawaiian affairs may repeat the training 6 (f) course as necessary to accommodate all persons who are required 7 to attend. 8

9 (q) Each council, board, and commission chairperson shall provide to the office of Hawaiian affairs, within thirty 10 calendar days upon their official appointment dates, the names 11 12 of those persons required to take the training course." SECTION 3. In codifying the new sections added by section 13 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute 14

appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating 15 16 the new sections in this Act.

SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2012. 17
