### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that the Department of SECTION 1. 2 Education receives nearly a quarter of the State's entire 3 operating budget, the largest amount of any state agency, and that the department's appropriations, in fiscal years 2003 4 5 through 2008, increased nearly sixty-four per cent from \$1.5 6 billion to \$2.4 billion, while enrollment has stayed roughly the 7 same, but that Hawai`i's public schools' test scores repeatedly - 8 rank among the lowest in the nation despite the increased 9 funding.

10 The legislature also finds that according to the January 11 2007 Department of Budget and Finance report on the adequacy of 12 federal funding for the implementation of the No Child Left 13 Behind Act, although, in the school years, 2005 through 2006 14 approximately 85 percent of the public schools did not meet 15 various NCLB performance standards, the Department of Education 16 spent less than half the federal school improvement grant money 17 it received", and that the available federal grants allotted to 18 by the No Child Left Behind Act. 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FY 1999 through FY 2009, the Department of Education did not 1 2 obligate or expend all of its available appropriations, 3 resulting in substantial carryover balances of \$230 million. Also, in a 2005 independent audit of Department of Education 4 programs conducted by PriceWaterhouseCoopers LLP, the audit 5 concluded that "the lack of transparency made it difficult, and 6 in some cases, impossible, to determine whether many public-7 school programs were achieving their objectives and whether 8 taxpayer dollars were being spent wisely". The audit went on to 9 state that "roughly one-third of the department's 278 state-10 11 funded programs had inadequate systems in place to monitor their 12 effectiveness and at least one in five suffered from insufficient oversight of program spending and many programs 13 14 completely lacked either."

15 The legislature further finds that the last comprehensive audit of the entire organization, management processes, and 16 personnel administration of the Department of Education occurred 17 18 in 1973. Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to mandate periodic comprehensive audits of the Department of Education in 19 20 order to assist the Department, the Legislature, and the Executive Branch in making the needed changes to improve the 21 22 delivery of public education services.

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1 SECTION 2. Starting with 2011, the Office of the Auditor shall contract with an independent, certified audit firm to 2 conduct a comprehensive review of the Department of Education's 3 operations. This review shall be conducted every five years to 4 determine if, as now structured, it can effectively carry out 5 6 its responsibilities under the federal No Child Left Behind Act and the State's Reinventing Education Act (Act 51, Session Laws 7 of Hawaii 2004, as amended). The comprehensive review shall, at 8 a minimum, consist of a full management and financial audit of 9 10 the Department of Education, including an examination of the uses and outcomes of expenditure of state general funds, state 11 special funds, federal funds, capital improvement funds, 12 revolving funds, and all other accounts within the department or 13 within other state agencies that exist to fund operations of the 14 department, including those funds in the department of budget 15 and finance that relate to employee benefit costs and risk 16 17 management.

18 SECTION 3. The comprehensive review shall be compiled into 19 a report and shall be submitted to the Hawaii State Legislature 20 at least twenty days prior to the beginning of the 2012 21 legislative session. Subsequent reviews shall be compiled into 22 reports and shall be reported to the Hawaii State Legislature at HB HMIA 2011-10-2.doc 4

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least twenty days prior to the beginning of the regular session
in the year following a comprehensive review.

3 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
