A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FOOD SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Good agricultural practices are quidelines 1 2 designed by the United States Food and Drug Administration and Department of Agriculture to produce safe products and eliminate 3 4 potential for product contamination. Good agricultural practices, among other things, include guidance on human 5 6 hygiene, animals and their manures, water quality for irrigation 7 and produce rinse, and agricultural pesticides. These standards 8 are being adopted by the world's leading farmers, who understand 9 that they have a responsibility to provide the safest food 10 possible to consumers.

11 The Food Safety Modernization Act was recently signed into 12 law. The law authorizes the Food and Drug Administration and 13 the Secretary of Human Services to increase inspections of many 14 domestic food facilities and enhance detection of food borne 15 illnesses.

16 Safe production, distribution, and consumer handling of 17 food requires knowledge of food borne pathogens, chemical 18 toxins, food quality, and labeling. Our current system of 2011-1799 HB667 SD1 SMA.doc

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1 regulation is understaffed, and the remaining staff are 2 unprepared or untrained for the rapid changes that have occurred 3 in risk assessment, changes in production and distribution 4 methodologies, and new foods and emerging pathogens. Food safety programs are also not integrated among government 5 6 agencies, hampering communication and cooperation. In addition, many of Hawaii's growers are not implementing 7 8 good agricultural practices. This failure to follow 9 science-based, risk-adverse food production practices is worsened by the existence of the rat lungworm nematode in 10 11 Hawaii. When consumed, this nematode can cause serious illness, as has happened numerous times during the past couple years. 12 13 The purpose of this Act is to: Establish a food safety and security program within 14 (1)the department of agriculture; and 15 Make an appropriation to the department of agriculture 16 (2) for the food safety and security program. 17 SECTION 2. Chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 19 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and 20 to read as follows: . 3	(2)	Perform all inspections and certifications of
4		agricultural commodities in an efficient, effective,
5		and expeditious manner; and
6	(3)	Develop and implement programs to educate and develop
7		the agricultural industry to meet state and federal
8		laws, rules, and regulations.
9	For	purposes of this section, "agricultural commodities"
10	means any	grain, livestock, poultry, fruit, plant, timber, or
11	any other	item produced from agricultural activities and shall
12	include t	rees, shrubs, herbs, and other plants."
13	SECT	ION 3. Section 141-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended t	o read as follows:
15	"§14	1-2 Rules. Subject to chapter 91, the department of
16	agricultu	re shall adopt, amend, and repeal rules not
17	inconsist	ent with law, for and concerning:
18	(1)	The introduction, transportation, and propagation of
19		trees, shrubs, herbs, and other plants;
20	(2)	The quarantine, inspection, fumigation, disinfection,
21		destruction, or exclusion, either upon introduction
22		into the State, or at any time or place within the
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State, of any nursery-stock, tree, shrub, herb, vine, 1 2 cut-flower, cutting, graft, scion, bud, seed, leaf, 3 root, or rhizome; any nut, fruit, or vegetable; any 4 grain, cereal, or lequme in the natural or raw state; any moss, hay, straw, dry-grass, or other forage; any 5 6 unmanufactured log, limb, or timber; or any other 7 plant growth or plant product unprocessed or in the 8 raw state; any sand, soil, or earth; any live bird, 9 reptile, insect, or other animal, in any stage of development, that is in addition to the so-called 10 domestic animals, which are provided for in section 11 12 142-2; and any box, barrel, crate, or other containers 13 in which the articles, substances, or objects have been transported or contained, and any packing 14 15 material used in connection therewith, that is or may 16 be diseased or infested with insects or likely to 17 assist in the transmission or dissemination of any 18 insect or plant disease injurious, harmful, or 19 detrimental, or likely to become injurious, harmful, 20 or detrimental to the agricultural or horticultural 21 industries or the forests of the State, or that is or 22 may be in itself injurious, harmful, or detrimental to

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1 the same (included therein may be rules governing the 2 transportation of any of the articles, substances, or 3 objects enumerated above in this section between 4 different localities on any one of the islands within 5 the State); 6 (3) The prohibition of importation into the State, from 7 any or all foreign countries or from other parts of 8 the United States, or the shipment from one island 9 within the State to another island therein, or the transportation from one part or locality of any island 10 11 to another part or locality of the same island, of any 12 specific article, substance, or object or class of 13 articles, substances, or objects, among those enumerated above in this section, that is diseased or 14 infested with insects or likely to assist in the 15 16 transmission or dissemination of any insect or plant 17 disease injurious, harmful, or detrimental or likely to be injurious, harmful, or detrimental to the 18 19 agricultural or horticultural industries, or the 20 forests of the State, or that is or may be in itself 21 injurious, harmful, or detrimental to the same;

18	SECT	ION 4. There is appropriated out of the general	
19	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so		
20	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2011-2012 for		
21	the food safety and security program.		



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The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
agriculture for the purposes of this Act.
SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
