# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HUMAN TRAFFICKING.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. Chapter 707, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended b	y adding a new part to be appropriately designated and.
3	to read a	s follows:
4		"PART . HUMAN TRAFFICKING
5	§707	- Definitions. For the purposes of this part:
6	"Adv	ance" means knowingly causing or aiding a person to
7	commit hu	man trafficking or sexual human trafficking by:
8	(a)	Procuring or soliciting patrons for commercial sex
9		acts to be performed by victims of human trafficking
10		or sexual human trafficking;
11	(b)	Providing trafficked persons for the purpose of
12		performing commercial sex acts;
13	(c)	Permitting a premises, either owned by a person or
14		under that person's control to be regularly used for
15		commercial sex acts performed by victims of human
16		trafficking;
17	(d)	Managing, supervising, controlling or owning, either

alone or in association with others, a business or

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1	enterprise with the intent to profit from human			
2	trafficking or sexual human trafficking; or			
3	(e) Engaging in any other conduct designed to institute,			
4	aid, or facilitate an act or enterprise of human			
5	trafficking or sexual human trafficking.			
6	"Commercial sex act" means any sexual contact or sexual			
7	penetration, as defined by 707-700, on account of which anything			
8	of value is given to or received by any person.			
9	"Forced labor or services" means labor or services that are			
10	performed or provided by a person and are obtained or maintained			
11	through fraud or any of the means listed in subdivision 10			
12	below.			
13	"Fraud" means making material false statements,			
14	misstatements, or omissions to induce or maintain the person to			
15	engage or continue to engage in commercial sex acts.			
16	"Intent to profit" means the intent to obtain monetary			
17	gain.			
18	"Maintain' means to secure continued performance of the			
19	commercial sex acts or forced labor or services regardless of			
20	any initial agreement on the part of the trafficked person to			
21	perform such commercial sex acts or labor or services.			
22	"Minor" means any person less than eighteen years old.			



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1 "Transport" or "transportation" means to move any distance, 2 however slight, and shall not require proof of any specific 3 minimum distance.

4 §707- Human trafficking in the first degree. (1) A
5 person commits the offense of human trafficking in the first
6 degree if the person recruits, harbors, transports, provides or
7 obtains another person and deprives or violates the personal
8 liberty of that other person with the intent to obtain forced
9 labor or services.

10 (2) Except as provided in subsection (3), human trafficking11 in the first degree is a class B felony.

12 (3) A violation of this section in which the victim of13 human trafficking is a minor is a class A felony.

14 §707-Sexual human trafficking in the first degree. (1)15 A person commits the offense of sexual human trafficking in the 16 first degree if the person recruits, harbors, transports, 17 provides or obtains another person and deprives or violates the personal liberty of that other person for the purpose of a 18 19 commercial sex act in violation of section 712-1202, 707-1203, 20 707-1204, 707-730, 707-731, 707-732, or 707-733.

21 (2) A violation of this section is a class A felony.

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§707- Sexual human trafficking in the second degree. (1)
 A person commits sexual human trafficking in the second degree
 if the person knowingly advances or obtains monetary gain from
 sexual human trafficking.

5 (2) A violation of this section is a class B felony.
6 §707- Civil actions for damages to victims of human
7 trafficking. (1) A victim of human trafficking may bring a
8 civil action for actual damages, compensatory damages, punitive
9 damages, injunctive relief, or any combination thereof, or any
10 other appropriate relief.

11 (2) In addition to the remedies specified herein, in any 12 action under subsection (1), the plaintiff may be awarded up to 13 three times the person's actual damages, or \$10,000, whichever 14 is greater. In addition, punitive damages may also be awarded 15 upon proof of the defendant's malice, oppression, fraud, or 16 duress in committing the act of human trafficking.

17 (3) An action brought pursuant to this section shall be 18 commenced within five years of the date on which the trafficking 19 victim was freed from the trafficking situation, or if the 20 victim was a minor when the act of human trafficking against the 21 victim occurred, within eight years after the date the plaintiff 22 attains the age of majority.



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1	(4)	If a person entitled to bring an action under this
2	subsectio	n was under a disability at the time of the cause of
3	action, t	hen the period of disability shall not be included in
4	the time	within which the person should have commenced the
5	action un	der subsection (3). Disability will toll the running
6	of the st	atute of limitations for this action.
7	(a)	A disability includes being a minor, insanity,
8		imprisonment, or other incapacity or incompentence;
9	(b)	The statute of limitations shall not run against an
10		incompetent or minor plaintiff simply because a
11		guardian ad litem has been appointed. A guardian ad
12		litem's failure to bring a plaintiff's action within
13		the applicable limitation period will not prejudice
14		the plaintiff's right to do so after the person's
15		disability ceases;
16	(c)	A defendant may not assert a defense of the statute of
17		limitations when the expiration of the statute is due
18		to conduct by the defendant inducing the plaintiff to
19		delay the filing of the action, or due to threats made
20		by the defendant causing duress upon the plaintiff;
21	(d)	The suspension of the statute of limitations due to
22		disability, lack of knowledge, or estoppel applies to



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1 other related claims arising out of the trafficking 2 situation; 3 The running of the statute of limitations shall be (e) 4 postponed during the pendency of any criminal 5 proceedings against the victim; and 6 (f) The running of the statute of limitations may be 7 suspended where a person entitled to bring an action 8 under this section could not have reasonably 9 discovered the cause of action due to circumstances 10 resulting from the trafficked situation, such as 11 psychological trauma, cultural and linguistic isolation, and the inability to access services. 12 13 (5)A prevailing plaintiff may be awarded reasonable 14 attorney's fees and litigation costs, including expert witness 15 fees and expenses. 16 (6)Any civil action filed under this section shall be 17 stayed during the pendency of any criminal action arising out of 18 the same occurrence in which the claimant is the victim. 19 As used in this section, a "criminal action" includes 20 investigation and prosecution, and a criminal action is pending 21 until a final adjudication in the trial court, or dismissal."



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1 SECTION 2. Section 28-101, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 3 "(a) The attorney general shall establish a statewide 4 witness program through which the attorney general may fund or 5 provide for the security and protection of a government witness 6 or a potential government witness in an official proceeding or 7 investigation where the attorney general determines that an 8 offense such as those described in sections 710-1071 9 (intimidating a witness), 710-1072 (tampering with a witness), 10 or 710-1072.2 (retaliating against a witness) is likely to be 11 committed or which involves great public interest. The attorney 12 general may also fund or provide for the security and protection 13 of the immediate family of, or a person otherwise closely 14 associated with, such witness or potential witness if the family 15 or person may also be endangered. In determining whether such 16 security and protection or funds are to be provided, the 17 attorney general shall give greatest priority to official 18 proceedings or investigations involving pending or potential organized crime, racketeering activity, sexual human 19 20 trafficking, or career criminal prosecutions."



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1	SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
2	matured, penalties that were incurred or proceedings that were
3	begun before its effective date.
4	. SECTION 4. If any provision of this Act or the application
5	thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
6	invalidity does not affect other provisions or application, and
7	to this end the provisions of this Act are severable.
8	SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
9	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
