HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

ESTABLISHING A JOINT LEGISLATIVE INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE THE STATUS OF TWO EXECUTIVE AGREEMENTS ENTERED INTO IN 1893 BETWEEN UNITED STATES PRESIDENT GROVER CLEVELAND AND QUEEN LILI'UOKALANI OF THE HAWAIIAN KINGDOM, CALLED THE LILI'UOKALANI ASSIGNMENT AND THE AGREEMENT OF RESTORATION.

WHEREAS, on December 19, 1842, United States President John Tyler recognized the Hawaiian Kingdom as an independent and sovereign State, extended full and complete diplomatic recognition to the Hawaiian Government, and entered into treaties and conventions with the Hawaiian government in 1849, 1875, and 1887; and

8 WHEREAS, on January 14, 1893, John L. Stevens (hereinafter 9 referred to as the "United States minister"), the United States 10 minister plenipotentiary assigned to the Hawaiian Kingdom 11 government, conspired with a small group of insurgents of 12 diverse nationalities to overthrow the Hawaiian Kingdom 13 government; and

WHEREAS, in pursuance of the conspiracy, the United States Minister and naval representatives of the United States caused armed naval forces to invade the Hawaiian Kingdom on January 16, 1893, and to position themselves near government buildings and Iolani Palace in order to provide protection to the insurgents; and

WHEREAS, on the afternoon of January 17, 1893, this small
group of insurgents declared themselves to be a Provisional
Government; and

26 WHEREAS, the United States minister thereupon extended 27 diplomatic recognition to the insurgents in violation of

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1 treaties between the United States and the Hawaiian Kingdom and in violation of international law; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, because the police force was unable to apprehend 5 the insurgents for violating the law of treason without the risk 6 of bloodshed between the police and the United States troops, Queen Lili'uokalani issued the following protest temporarily, 7 8 conditionally yielding her executive power to the United States 9 government: 10 11 "I Liliuokalani, by the Grace of God and under the Constitution of the Hawaiian Kingdom, Queen, do 12 hereby solemnly protest against any and all acts done 13 14 against myself and the Constitutional Government of the Hawaiian Kingdom by certain persons claiming to 15 have established a Provisional Government of and for 16 this Kingdom. 17 18 That I yield to the superior force of the United 19 States of America whose Minister Plenipotentiary, His 20 Excellency John L. Stevens, has caused United States 21 troops to be landed at Honolulu and declared that he 22 would support the Provisional Government. 23 24 Now to avoid any collision of armed forces, and 25 perhaps the loss of life, I do this under protest and 26 27 impelled by said force yield my authority until such 28 time as the Government of the United States shall, upon facts being presented to it, undo the action of 29 30 its representatives and reinstate me in the authority which I claim as the Constitutional Sovereign of the 31 Hawaiian Islands. 32 33 Done at Honolulu this 17th day of January, A.D. 34 35 1893"; and 36 37 WHEREAS, under Article 31 of the Constitution of the Kingdom of Hawaii, as the constitutional monarch of the 38 Hawaiian islands, the Queen was vested with the executive 39 power to faithfully execute and administer Hawaiian law: 40 "To the King belongs the Executive power"; and 41 42 WHEREAS, on March 9, 1893, President Grover Cleveland 43 44 accepted the temporary and conditional assignment of executive HCR LRB 11-1793.doc



power from the Queen and investigated the circumstances of the 1 overthrow of the Hawaiian Kingdom government; and 2 3 WHEREAS, on October 18, 1893, the investigation concluded 4 5 that the United States violated international law and the 6 Hawaiian Kingdom government must be restored to its status 7 before the landing of United States troops; and 8 9 WHEREAS, negotiations for settlement and restoration took 10 place between Queen Lili'uokalani and United States minister 11 plenipotentiary, Albert Willis, between November 13, 1893, and 12 December 18, 1893, at the United States Embassy in Honolulu; and 13 WHEREAS, a settlement was reached on December 18, 1893, 14 whereby Queen Lili'uokalani signed the following declaration 15 16 that was dispatched to the United States State Department by the United States minister on December 20, 1893: 17 18 "I, Liliuokalani, in recognition of the high 19 sense of justice which has actuated the President of 20 the United States, and desiring to put aside all 21 feelings of personal hatred or revenge and to do what 22 is best for all the people of these Islands, both 23 24 native and foreign born, do hereby and herein solemnly declare and pledge myself that, if reinstated as the 25 constitutional sovereign of the Hawaiian Islands, that 26 I will immediately proclaim and declare, 27 unconditionally and without reservation, to every 28 person who directly or indirectly participated in the 29 revolution of January 17, 1893, a full pardon and 30 amnesty for their offenses, with restoration of all 31 32 rights, privileges, and immunities under the constitution and the laws which have been made in 33 pursuance thereof, and that I will forbid and prevent 34 the adoption of any measures of proscription or 35 punishment for what has been done in the past by those 36 setting up or supporting the Provisional Government. 37 38 I further solemnly agree to accept the 39 restoration under the constitution existing at the 40 time of said revolution and that I will abide by and 41 42 fully execute that constitution with all the 43 guaranties as to person and property therein 44 contained.

27 28 29 30	WHEREAS, for the past one hundred eighteen years the Office of President has retained the temporary and conditional assignment of Hawaiian executive power from the Queen; and					
31 32 33	WHEREAS, these agreements are called sole executive agreements under United States constitutional law and the basis of a federal lawsuit in Washington, D.C., filed by Dr. David

39	WHEREAS, on November 13, 2010, the Association of Hawaiian					
40	Civic Clubs at its 51st Convention at Keauhou, Island of Hawaii,

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1 WHEREAS, under the Supremacy Clause of the United States 2 3 Constitution, "all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of 4 the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, 5 any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the 6 7 contrary notwithstanding"; and 8 WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court declared in United 9 States v. Belmont, 301 U.S. 324 (1937), that executive 10 11 agreements arising out of the President's sole authority over foreign relations does not require ratification by the Senate or 12 the approval of Congress, and has the force and effect of a 13 14 treaty; and 15 WHEREAS, statutes enacted by the Legislature of the State 16 of Hawaii that conflict with valid executive agreements would be 17 considered void under the Supremacy Clause; and 18 19 WHEREAS, a joint legislative investigating committee would 20 settle the issue of whether certain statutes enacted by the 21 Hawaii State Legislature violate the United States Constitution; 22 23 and 24 WHEREAS, section 21-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, authorizes 25 the establishment of a legislative investigating committee by 26 resolution, and Rule 14 of the Rules of the House of 27 28 Representatives and Rule 14(3) of the Rules of the Senate allow for the establishment of special committees; now, therefore, 29 30 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 31 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 32 of 2011, the Senate concurring, that: 33 34 35 (1)The Legislature hereby establishes a joint legislative investigating committee to investigate the status of 36 two executive agreements entered into between 37 President Grover Cleveland of the United States and 38 Queen Lili'uokalani of the Hawaiian Kingdom in 1893. 39 called the Lili'uokalani Assignment and the Agreement 40 of Restoration; 41 42 43 (2) The purpose and duties of the joint investigating committee shall be to inquire into the status of the 44 HCR LRB 11-1793.doc 5
