HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A TASK FORCE TO DEVELOP A QUALITY IMPROVEMENT INITIATIVE TO REDUCE ELECTIVE CESAREAN SECTIONS AND INDUCTION OF LABOR.

WHEREAS, premature birth is one of the leading causes of 1 infant death, accounting for thirty-seven percent of infant 2 deaths in the first year of life; and 3 4 WHEREAS, more than twelve percent of babies in Hawaii are 5 born prematurely, at less than thirty-seven completed weeks of 6 7 qestation; and 8 WHEREAS, late preterm births, which occur between thirty-9 four and thirty-six weeks of gestation, account for more than 10 nine percent of babies born in Hawaii; and 11 12 WHEREAS, late preterm infants have a higher incidence of 13 morbidity and mortality when compared with term infants; and 14 15 WHEREAS, premature babies who survive may suffer lifelong 16 problems including cerebral palsy, intellectual disabilities, 17 breathing and respiratory problems, and vision and hearing loss; 18 19 and 20 21 WHEREAS, the rate of births by cesarean delivery in the United States has risen from more than twenty-one percent in 22 1996 to more than thirty-two percent in 2007; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the rate of labor induction in the United States 25 has more than doubled since 1990, with more than twenty-two 26 percent of pregnant woman inducing labor in 2006; and 27 28 WHEREAS, the American College of Obstetricians and 29 Gynecologists guidelines call for the confirmation of thirty-30 nine weeks of gestation for single births prior to the elective, 31



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1 or non-medically indicated, induction of labor under most circumstances; and 2 3 WHEREAS, the Healthy People 2010 objective proposed by the 4 United States Department of Health and Human Services is that no 5 6 more than 7.6 percent of babies will be born preterm; and 7 WHEREAS, the Legislature adopted House Concurrent 8 Resolution No. 215, S.D. 1, during the 2009 Regular Session to 9 request the Department of Health to review and assess the 10 policies and procedures implemented by hospitals to reduce 11 elective cesarean sections and inductions of labor; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, in response to this resolution, the Department of Health convened a workgroup that found some variation in the 15 quidelines used by hospitals in the State regarding elective 16 inductions and preterm cesarean deliveries, wide variation in 17 the awareness of hospitals to changes in the rates of elective 18 inductions and preterm cesarean deliveries performed among 19 hospitals in the State, and a general lack of training 20 opportunities relating to elective inductions and preterm 21 cesarean deliveries; and 22 23 WHEREAS, despite efforts to reduce preterm births, there 24 remains a need for standardized guidelines and procedures among 25 hospitals in Hawaii that are current with accepted best 26 practices and guidelines, better awareness of the risks of 27 elective inductions and preterm cesarean deliveries, and 28 increased training opportunities among hospital personnel 29 relating to elective inductions and preterm cesarean deliveries; 30 31 now, therefore, 32 33 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 34 of 2011, the Senate concurring, that the Department of Health, 35 in collaboration with the Department of Human Services, the John 36 A. Burns School of Medicine, and representatives from health 37 plan providers in the State, is requested to convene a Preterm 38 Birth Task Force that is to be administratively attached to the 39 Department of Health to develop best practices recommended by 40 either the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists 41 or the Institute for Healthcare Improvement for reducing 42 elective inductions and cesarean deliveries; and 43 44
