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HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

ESTABLISHING A HAWAII STATE FALL PREVENTION AND EARLY DETECTION TASK FORCE TO DEVELOP A STATEWIDE APPROACH TO REDUCING FALLS AMONG OLDER ADULTS.

1 2	WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that too many of our seniors suffer devastating and often fatal injuries due to falls; and		
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4 5	WHEREAS, one third of our kupuna fall each year; and		
6	WHEREAS, every five hours a senior is injured so severely		
7 8	by a fall that the senior must be hospitalized, often never returning home; and		
9	recuriting nome, and		
10	WHEREAS, among older adults in Hawaii, falls are the		
11 12	leading cause of fatal injuries, injury-related hospitalizations, injury-related emergency department visits,		
13	and injury-related emergency medical service calls; and		
14 15	WHEREAS, annually, among Hawaii seniors, falls result in 78		
16	deaths and nearly 1,800 hospitalizations; and

18 19	WHEREAS, monetary cost notwithstanding, the physical and emotional cost of senior falls to our families is incalculable;		
20	and		
21 22	WHEREAS, such falls are preventable and are not inevitable		
23	due to aging; and		
24 25	WHEREAS, balance screening, medication reviews, and vision		
25 26	examinations are just some of the programs that can help		
27	determine those seniors who are at risk of falling; and		
28 29	WHEREAS, a variety of evidence-based best practice programs		
30	can prevent falls, especially when incorporated with tai chi or		
31	other exercise programs; and		

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1 WHEREAS, in addition to the prevention of falls, early 2 detection of fall occurrences is critical to expediting 3 treatment, minimizing serious long-term consequences, mitigating suffering, reducing the extent of the injury, and in some 4 5 instances, avoiding death; now, therefore, 6 7 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 8 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 9 of 2011, the Senate concurring, that the Executive Office on Aging is requested to convene a Hawaii State Fall Prevention and 10 Early Detection Task Force (Task Force) to develop a statewide 11 12 approach to reducing falls among older adults by: 13 14 (1)Investigating and examining the immediate and long-15 term dangers of fall injuries on our senior population; 16 17 18 (2)Examining the fiscal impact of senior falls on our 19 medical system and health care costs; 20 21 (3) Recommending appropriate interventions and prevention programs to reduce falls and health care costs 22 associated with falls; 23 24 25 (4)Investigating the most effective means to enhance 26 public awareness that falls are preventable; 27 Reviewing the potential for increasing for the elderly 28 (5) 29 and their caregivers, on a statewide basis, the 30 availability and accessibility of fall prevention and early detection services and programs that effectively 31 use community resources; 32 33 (6) Recommending measures that will promote early 34 detection of falls, particularly for those who live 35 alone or in circumstances where the likelihood of not 36 37 being discovered soon after a fall is great; and 38 Investigating the best way to expand the role of 39 (7) 40 medical and health care professionals in screening, educating, and referring elderly persons to fall 41 42 prevention and early detection services and programs; 43 44 and 2



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1 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force consist of four members appointed by the Governor, four members appointed by the 2 President of the Senate, four members appointed by the Speaker 3 of the House of Representatives, and nine additional members who 4 are leaders in their industry or directors of their departments, 5 or their designees, and who shall collaborate with and support 6 7 the work of the Task Force as requested. These additional nine 8 members are to include: 9

- 10(1) The Medical Director or Corporate Executive Officer of11the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation;
- 13 (2) The Dean of Geriatric Medicine of the John A. Burns14 School of Medicine;
- 16 (3) A representative of the Hawai'i Fall Prevention17 Consortium;
 - (4) The Director of Health or the Director's designee;
 - (5) The Director of the Executive Office on Aging or the Director's designee;
 - (6) The County Executive on Aging and Chief of the Elderly Affairs Division of the City and County of Honolulu or the County Executive's designee;
 - (7) The County Executive of the Maui County Office on Aging, or the County Executive's designee;
 - (8) The County Executive of the Kauai Agency on Elderly Affairs, or the County Executive's designee; and
 - (9) The County Executive of the Hawaii County Office of Aging, or the County Executive's designee;

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Director of the Executive
Office on Aging is designated as the Chair of the Task Force;
and



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that members of the Task Force have 1 2 a background in elderly services, geriatric medicine, geriatric 3 pharmacology, business, insurance, health care, long-term care, hospital administration, risk management, or public policy 4 5 development, or be an advocate for or consumer of elderly care 6 services; and 7 8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that members of the Task Force be 9 appointed as soon as practicable, but by no later than July 1, 10 2011; and 11 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that: 13 14 (1)The Task Force is requested to convene before August 15, 2011, whether or not all membership 15 16 appointments have been made at that time, at a place chosen by the convener; 17 18 (2) The Department of Health and Executive Office on Aging 19 20 are requested to provide administrative support to the 21 Task Force; and 22 23 (3) The Legislative Reference Bureau is requested to draft 24 any legislation proposed by the Task Force; 25 26 anđ 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if the Task Force has any 28 vacancies in its membership on or after August 15, 2011, the 29 Task Force may appoint persons to fill those vacancies; and 30 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force is requested to 32 collaborate with interested stakeholders, including health care 33 facilities, community coalitions, government agencies, and 34 organizations concerned with protecting kupuna and preventing 35 and detecting falls; and 36 37 38 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force submit an 39 interim report to the Legislature no later than 20 days before the convening of the Regular Session of 2012, describing the 40 progress made by the Task Force, including its review of fall 41 prevention data and the impact of senior falls on the State's 42 43 medical system and health care costs; and



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force submit a final report, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than 20 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2013; and

6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force submit proposed 7 draft legislation to the Legislative Reference Bureau no later 8 than November 1, 2011 and 2012, respectively; and

10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Medical 11 Director of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, Dean of 12 Geriatric Medicine of the John A. Burns School of Medicine, the 13 Hawai'i Fall Prevention Consortium, Director of Health, Director 14 of the Executive Office on Aging, Director of the University of 15 Hawaii Center on Aging, County Executive on Aging and Chief of 16 the Elderly Affairs Division of the City and County of Honolulu, 17 County Executive of the Maui County Office on Aging, County 18 Executive of the Kauai Agency on Elderly Affairs, County 19 20 Executive of the Hawaii County Office of Aging, and Acting Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau. 21
