HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO ASSESS THE SOCIAL AND FINANCIAL IMPACTS OF REQUIRING HEALTH INSURERS TO OFFER COVERAGE FOR HEARING AIDS.

1 WHEREAS, according to the Mayo Clinic, an estimated 2 one-quarter of Americans between the ages of sixty-five and 3 seventy-five and around three-quarters of those older than 4 seventy-five have some degree of hearing loss; and 5

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WHEREAS, further according to the Mayo Clinic, hearing loss is not reversible; and

9 WHEREAS, according to the Hawaii Lions Club, the cost of a
10 custom low- to mid-level analog or digital hearing aid begins
11 around \$2,000 or less, and starts around \$3,000 and higher for a
12 high-end hearing aid; and

14 WHEREAS, Medicare and most insurance companies do not cover 15 the cost of hearing aids; and

WHEREAS, section 23-51, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires 17 that "[b]efore any legislative measure that mandates health . 18 insurance coverage for specific health services, specific 19 diseases, or certain providers of health care services as part 20 21 of individual or group health insurance policies, can be considered, there shall be concurrent resolutions passed 22 23 requesting the auditor to prepare and submit to the legislature a report that assesses both the social and financial effects of 24 25 the proposed mandated coverage"; and 26

WHEREAS, section 23-51, Hawaii Revised Statutes, further
provides that "[t]he concurrent resolutions shall designate a
specific legislative bill that:

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to 1 identify the number of residents in Hawaii in the target 2 3 population who are deaf, hard of hearing, and deaf-blind based on national prevalence rates, in order to determine who may be 4 5 impacted by the cost of hearing aids and cochlear implants; and 6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to 7 include in the impact assessment report a survey of other states 8 which have implemented a mandate for hearing aids or cochlear 9 10 implants to examine what the experience has been in these 11 states; and 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to research public and private entities that provide coverage for 14 hearing aids to determine what is currently being used as a 15 16 standard for frequency of replacement and what, if any, cost limitations are placed on the hearing aid and cochlear implant 17 coverage benefit. This research should examine whether 18 19 different standards are applied to adults compared to children 20 in need of these devices. Entities for this research should include, but not be limited to, Medicare, Medicaid, health plans 21 in Hawaii, and individuals who need, use, or otherwise 22 23 experience the need for such devices or procedures; and 24 25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to compare the cost and utilization of cochlear implants to hearing 26 27 aid devices; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to submit findings and recommendations to the Legislature, 30 including any necessary implementing legislation, no later than 31 twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 32 33 2011; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Auditor and to the 36 37 Insurance Commissioner, who in turn is requested to transmit 38





1 copies to each insurer in the State that issues health insurance 2 policies.
