## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO MAKE HUMAN PAPILLOMAVIRUS IMMUNIZATION AVAILABLE TO INDIGENT PATIENTS AND THROUGH THE TEEN VAX PROGRAM, AND URGING INSURERS TO OFFER COVERAGE FOR HUMAN PAPILLOMAVIRUS IMMUNIZATION TO FEMALE POLICYHOLDERS ELEVEN TO TWENTY-SIX YEARS OF AGE.

1 WHEREAS, infection with sexually transmitted human 2 papillomavirus is common in adult populations worldwide, and 3 research suggests that up to seventy-five per cent of women will 4 become infected with one or more of the sexually transmitted 5 human papillomavirus types at some point during adulthood; and 6

7 WHEREAS, although most genital human papillomavirus 8 infections come and go without causing any symptoms, lingering 9 infections with a small subset of high-risk human papillomavirus 10 types can lead to the development of cervical cancer; and 11

12 WHEREAS, the preventive human papillomavirus vaccines that 13 are currently available target the two human papillomavirus 14 types that are responsible for approximately seventy per cent of 15 all cervical cancer. These vaccines are designed to elicit 16 virus-neutralizing antibody responses that prevent initial 17 infection with the human papillomavirus types represented in the 18 vaccine; and

WHEREAS, vaccination has been shown to offer nearly one hundred per cent protection against the development of cervical pre-cancers and genital warts caused by the human papillomavirus types in the vaccine, with few or no side effects, and studies have indicated that the protective effects of these vaccines may last longer than five years; and

27 WHEREAS, the development of human papillomavirus vaccines28 offer a previously unavailable source of protection against



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cervical cancer, one of the most common and deadly types of 1 2 cancer; and 3 WHEREAS, by making human papillomavirus vaccinations more 4 5 widely available through public health programs and expanded insurance coverage, the overall health of Hawaii's population 6 would be improved and the incidence of cervical cancer would be 7 8 reduced; now, therefore, 9 10 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 11 of 2011, the Senate concurring, that the Department of Health is 12 13 requested to include human papillomavirus immunization among the 14 services available to indigents and to others through its Teen 15 Vax Program; and 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that insurers providing health 18 coverage in the State are urged to offer coverage to females ages eleven through twenty-six years of age, not as an employer 19 20 option or deductible, for immunization against human papillomavirus for the policyholder and individuals covered 21 under the policy, contract, plan, or agreement; and 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 24 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health 25 26 and to the Insurance Commissioner, who in turn is requested to 27 distribute copies to the chief executive officer of each insurer providing health coverage to policyholders or group members in 28 29 the State. 30 31 32 OFFERED BY: Alla a Lee HCR LRB 11-1601.doc FEB 2 5 2011
