REQUESTING A COMPREHENSIVE STUDY ON THE RESULTS AND IMPACT OF ACT 10, SESSION LAWS OF HAWAII 2008, AS WELL AS OTHER INFORMATION SECURITY PROPOSALS.

1 2 3	WHEREAS, identity theft affects millions of American each year and costs more than \$54 billion annually; and
4 5 6	WHEREAS, breaches in the security of personal information are a leading source of identity theft; and
7 8 9 10	WHEREAS, in December 2007, the Office of the Auditor issued a report entitled "Hawai'i Identity Theft Task Force Report" that, among other things, made certain recommendations regarding safeguards to protect personal information; and
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12 13	WHEREAS, the Legislature passed Act 10, Session Laws of Hawaii 2008, which established the Information Privacy and
14	Security Council to implement the recommendations of the Hawai'i
15	Identity Theft Task Force and to identify and recommend to the
16	Legislature best practices to assist government agencies in

20	WHEREAS, an analysis has not been conducted to determine
21	whether Act 10 and the recommendations made by the Information
22	Privacy and Security Council have been implemented or if they
23 24	have been effective; and
25	WHEREAS, current law primarily focuses on prevention of
26 27 28 29 30	security breaches and penalties for organizations that fail to provide timely and adequate notice to persons affected by the security breach, but it provides very little in the way of remedies for affected persons; now, therefore,

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BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 1 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 2 of 2011, the Senate concurring, that the Auditor is requested to 3 conduct a comprehensive study to determine whether the 4 recommendations of the Hawai'i Identity Theft Task Force Report 5 6 of 2007 have been implemented and on the results and impact of Act 10, Session Laws of Hawaii 2008, to determine whether the 7 recommendations by the Auditor and the Information Privacy and 8 Security Council reqarding the handling of private information 9 by government agencies have been implemented and the impact 10 thereof; and 11 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to 13 14 perform an analysis, similar to those performed pursuant to section 26H-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, of the following 15 proposals to provide remedial measures for persons affected by a 16 breach of their personal information: 17 18 19 (1)Require an organization that has permitted a security breach to conduct, at the organization's expense, an 20 independent audit, to be made available to the public 21 upon completion, to reassure the public and 22 Legislature that the organization has fulfilled any 23 promises to take remedial action and comply with 24 industry standards; 25 26 27 (2) Establish an agency or work with a national non-profit organization to track Hawaii identity theft and fraud 28 trends, to help determine the actual effect of 29 breaches, and to provide information regarding any 30 trends to the public; 31 32 (3) Establish a centralized trust account from which 33 affected persons of information breach or identity 34 35 fraud may draw, to be funded by a fee assessed on any organization that is liable for a security breach; and 36 37 (4) Establish a statutory private right of action as 38 proposed in Senate Bill 728 and House Bill 1220 39 (2011); and 40 . 41 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Information Privacy and 42 Security Council is requested to cooperate with and provide 43 information and assistance to the Auditor, upon request; and 44

1 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the Auditor is requested to submit 2 findings and recommendations to the Legislature, including any 3 proposed legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the 4 convening of the Regular Session of 2012; and 5 6
