HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING A STUDY TO IDENTIFY STATE OF HAWAI'I LAWS THAT MAY NEED AMENDMENT SOON AFTER THE ENACTMENT OF THE NATIVE HAWAIIAN GOVERNMENT REORGANIZATION ACT.

WHEREAS, the Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act 1 provides a process within the framework of federal law for the 2 Native Hawaiian people to exercise their inherent rights as a 3 4 distinct, indigenous, native community to reorganize a single. 5 unified Native Hawaiian governing entity for the purpose of giving expression to their rights as a native people to self-6 determination and self-governance; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, the Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act process will result in the reaffirmation of the special 10 political and legal relationship between the United States and 11 the Native Hawaiian people and recognition by the United States 12 of the Native Hawaiian governing entity as the representative 13 sovereign governing body of the Native Hawaiian people; and 14 15 16 WHEREAS, upon the reaffirmation of the special political and legal relationship between the United States and the Native 17 Hawaiian governing entity, the United States and the State of 18 19 Hawai'i are authorized to enter into negotiations with the Native Hawaiian governing entity designed to lead to agreements 20 21 on such matters as: 22 (1)The transfer of lands, natural resources, and other 23 assets, and the exercise of governmental authority 24 over these assets; 25 26 The exercise of civil and criminal jurisdiction; 27 (2) 28 (3) The authority to tax and other powers, and authorities 29 typically exercised by governments representing 30 indigenous, native people of the United States; 31 32 Residual responsibilities of the United States and the 33 (4)State of Hawai'i; and 34

1 2 (5) Grievances regarding assertions of historical wrongs 3 committed against Native Hawaiians by the United 4 States or by the State of Hawai'i; and 5 6 WHEREAS, these post-federal-recognition negotiations may result in recommendations by the parties for amendments to State 7 of Hawai'i and federal law; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, these post-federal-recognition negotiations and any resulting recommendations for amending state and federal law 11 will likely not occur until a considerable time passes, perhaps 12 years, after enactment of the Native Hawaiian Government 13 14 Reorganization Act; and 15 16 WHEREAS, a more immediate concern exists as to whether amendments to state and federal law may also be needed soon 17 18 after the enactment of the Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act to facilitate the process of establishing and 19 achieving federal recognition of a Native Hawaiian governing 20 entity that will later negotiate with the state and federal 21 qovernments; and 22 23 WHEREAS, with regard to state law, a study under the 24 auspices of the Hawai'i State Legislature would be most helpful 25 in identifying the state laws that may need amendment soon after 26 enactment of the Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act; 27 and 28 29 WHEREAS, the Legislative Reference Bureau, with its 30 31 extensive background, knowledge, and publications regarding state law, state policy, and the legislative process, is well-32 positioned and well-qualified to perform the study; now, 33 therefore; 34 35 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 36 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular 37 Session of 2011, that the Legislative Reference Bureau is 38 requested to conduct a study of State of Hawai'i laws that may 39 need amendment to facilitate the process under the Native 40 Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act of establishing a Native 41 42 Hawaiian governing entity that will later negotiate with the state and federal governments; and 43 44

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the scope of the study is 1 2 requested to include laws that may need to be amended to facilitate the timely and effective implementation of both: 3 4 5 (1)The steps in the Native Hawaiian Government Reorganization Act process leading up to federal 6 7 recognition; and 8 9 (2)Federal recognition itself; and 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference 11 Bureau in planning and conducting the study is requested to give 12 13 substantial attention to how best in the short term to lay the 14 statutory groundwork for other future amendments that may result 15 from negotiations involving the Native Hawaiian governing 16 entity, the State of Hawai'i, and the United States in the long term; and 17 18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference 19 Bureau is requested to include the following in the report of 20 its study: 21 22 23 (1) An identification of the laws that may need amendment; 24 (2) An explanation of why the laws may need amendment; and 25 26 27 (3) Proposed language for the amendments; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference Bureau is requested to consult closely with the Office of 30 31 Hawaiian Affairs when planning and conducting the study; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all government agencies are 34 requested to provide their full cooperation and all relevant data and other information to the Legislative Reference Bureau 35 during the planning and implementation of the study; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference 38 Bureau is requested to submit, not later than twenty days prior 39 to the convening of the Regular Session of 2012, its findings 40 and recommendations, including any proposed legislation; and 41 42 43 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the President of the 44 HR LRB 11-1117.doc
