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## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR TO SET ASIDE AND TRANSFER SIXTY ACRES OF LAND TO SUPPORT THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A WEST HAWAII MULTI-PURPOSE AND INTERGENERATIONAL VETERANS CENTER.

1 WHEREAS, there are more than sixteen thousand veterans on 2 the island of Hawaii, a significant number of whom live in West 3 Hawaii, and they are overwhelmingly requesting and supporting 4 the location of a veterans center in the central part of West 5 Hawaii, near the West Hawaii Veterans Cemetery; and

7 WHEREAS, veterans make up 12.5 per cent of the adult 8 population of Hawaii County, which is second only to the City 9 and County of Honolulu at 13.0 per cent, and according to the 10 2010 census data, the population of Hawaii County has increased 11 24.5 per cent since the last census, which is greater than any 12 other county in the State; and 13

14 WHEREAS, there is a severe lack of facilities to meet the needs of veteran groups in West Hawaii, including American 15 Legion Posts, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign 16 Wars, Korean War Veterans Association, Vietnam Era Veterans 17 Association, Camp Tawara Detachment #1255 of the Marine Corps 18 19 League, Big Island National Guard Retirees Association, Big Island Retired Military Association, 100th Infantry Battalion 20 21 Veterans (also known as Club 100), 442nd Veterans Association, Interpreters Club, Hawaii Island Women Veterans Association, 22 Hawaii Island Veterans Memorial, Inc., and Military Order of the 23 Purple Heart; and 24

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26 WHEREAS, the West Hawaii Veterans Cemetery does not have a 27 convenient place for large gatherings for funeral services and 28 celebrations; a veterans center would be convenient and 29 appropriate for these gatherings; and

31 WHEREAS, in Kona there is no permanent office for the 32 Office of Veterans Services of the state Department of Defense, 33 and, therefore, meetings are held at the federal Department of 34 Veterans Affairs Center in a leased retail space; and

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1 2 WHEREAS, the National Guard Armory in West Hawaii is old 3 and located south of Kona, which is a less than optimal location for the community; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, there is a shortage of public emergency shelter 7 space in West Hawaii and a new veterans facility could be 8 designed to accommodate this need; and 9 10 WHEREAS, there is a need for a gymnasium activity center to 11 provide a facility in West Hawaii where veterans of all ages would have access to suitable recreational activities; and 12 13 WHEREAS, veterans in West Hawaii have indicated a desire to 14 have a museum to share their personal achievements, medals, 15 plaques, group commendations, troop flags, and other 16 achievements, as well as personal photos and memorabilia from 17 newspapers, magazines, and letters; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, a museum with adequate acreage would be ideal for an outdoor museum for historical planes, such as the P-51 21 22 Mustang and F-4C Phantom; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the Kailua-Kona Community Based Outpatient Clinic is in a leased two-story building located on a hill, which 25 presents significant difficulties for parking, especially for 26 disabled veterans, because the parking lot is small and 27 navigating the turns to drop off a veteran in a wheelchair at 28 the door is very difficult; alternative parking at the bottom of 29 the hill does not meet the requirements of the Americans with 30 Disabilities Act because it would require walking up a steep 31 32 hill; and 33 WHEREAS, because the Kailua-Kona Community Based Outpatient 34 Clinic building lease period ends in approximately two years, 35 and having a larger, expanded facility that is co-located with 36 the federal Veterans Affairs Center would better meet the 37 existing and future needs of West Hawaii veterans, there is an 38 opportunity for moving the Community Based Outpatient Clinic to 39 a new West Hawaii Veterans Center and designing the facility to 40 best accommodate the needs of veterans; and 41 42



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WHEREAS, in Maui and Hilo, there are efforts to co-locate 1 2 military and veteran services to wisely expend federal dollars 3 and create efficiencies that would best serve our veterans; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that co-locating the West Hawaii federal Veterans Association Center and the Veterans 6 7 Association Community Based Outpatient Clinic within a multipurpose facility that includes a meeting place for veterans 8 9 would provide veterans access to meetings, information, assistance, activities, and all veterans affairs services within 10 a consolidated area, which would be in the veterans' best 11 12 interests; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that a multi-purpose and intergenerational veterans facility should be established and 15 operated by a nonprofit organization that could generate funds 16 for repair, maintenance, and operation of the facility; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, a multi-purpose and intergenerational veterans 20 facility could generate the necessary funds by providing facilities, programs, and services for the numerous federal and 21 state programs for veterans and the military, which is similar 22 23 to the existing Kauai and Oahu veterans centers; and 24 WHEREAS, the West Hawaii Veterans Cemetery Development and 25 Expansion Association's leadership is forming the West Hawaii 26 Veterans Council, a nonprofit organization that should manage 27 the proposed multi-purpose and intergenerational facility; and 28 29 WHEREAS, the West Hawaii Veterans Cemetery Development and 30 Expansion Association was established in 2005 and has proven 31 itself highly competent by spending countless hours of labor, 32 donating materials and equipment, renovating the cemetery, and 33 34 removing headstones (after GPS positioning) to install an 35 irrigation system, topsoil, and new grass sod as an unofficial caretaker in cooperation with the county Department of Parks and 36 37 Recreation; and 38 39 WHEREAS, the West Hawaii Veterans Cemetery Development and Expansion Association's leadership of the West Hawaii Veterans 40 Cemetery, touted as the Arlington of the Pacific, resulted in 41 the cemetery being granted shrine status by the United States 42 43 Department of Veterans Affairs, making the sixty-two acre 44 cemetery in Kailua-Kona one of three state-owned veterans HR LRB 11-2536.doc 

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one in Hawaii; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that the current and future 5 needs of veterans in West Hawaii require that immediate action be taken to establish a multi-purpose and intergenerational 6 veterans facility, to include a facility with area for a museum, 7 meetings, activities, and other veteran-related services; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that funding for the planning, assessment, design, and construction of the West 11 Hawaii multi-purpose and intergenerational Veterans Center 12 13 facility is needed and strongly supported; now, therefore, 14 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 15 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 16 of 2011, that the Governor, in coordination with the Department 17 18 of Land and Natural Resources and the Hawaii Department of 19 Defense, is requested to set aside and transfer by executive order sixty acres of land to support the establishment of a West 20 21 Hawaii multi-purpose and intergenerational Veterans Center facility, to the West Hawaii Veterans Council; and 22 23 24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the Chairperson of 25 the Board of Land and Natural Resources, the Adjutant General of 26 the State of Hawaii, the Director of the Office of Veterans 27 Services of the State of Hawaii, the Mayor of the County of 28 Hawaii, the President of the West Hawaii Veterans Council, and 29 the Director of the Honolulu Regional Office, Department of 30 Veterans Affairs. 31 32 33 34 OFFERED BY: HR LRB 11-2536.doc
