HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE HAWAI'I CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION TO SUPPORT THE TEACH FOR AMERICA PROGRAM.

1 WHEREAS, Teach For America, in partnership with the 2 Department of Education, seeks to help address the problem of 3 educational inequity by recruiting, selecting, training, and 4 supporting outstanding individuals who commit two years to 5 teaching in low-income schools and go on to become leaders in 6 their own right, in the movement to achieve educational equity; 7 and

9 WHEREAS, Teach For America relies on federal funding to
10 support its program annually, and has received \$21 million in
11 2010 through Congressional appropriations, and have requested
12 \$50 million for the 2011 Fiscal Year; and

14 WHEREAS, the requested funds for Fiscal Year 2011 will 15 enable Teach For America to place an additional 1,350 corps 16 members, reaching 86,000 students, in low-income communities; 17 and

19 WHEREAS, without future funding, Teach For America would 20 have to turn away well over a thousand applicants who otherwise 21 would have started working immediately to close the achievement 22 gap between students in low-income communities and their peers 23 in higher-income areas; and

25 WHEREAS, the requested \$50 million federal allocation in 26 Fiscal Year 2011 will help to solidify Teach For America's 27 mission to reach one million students in low-income communities 28 each day by 2015; and

WHEREAS, federal funding will help Teach For America-Hawai'i
to recruit high quality teachers and train them to be fully
prepared to enter Hawai'i classrooms, and will also help



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subsidize the Hawai'i regional office's operating costs, which 1 2 are used to further support teachers over their two-year commitment, and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, the Legislature has demonstrated its support for Teach For America-Hawai'i by appropriating \$165,000 in FY 2008, 6 7 and 8 9 WHEREAS, there are currently 122 teachers, 17 percent of 10 whom are kama'āina, teaching in 39 schools across O'ahu and the Big Island who are impacting over 10,000 students, as well as 11 12 over 100 Teach For America alumni living in Hawai'i, the majority of whom remain in education-related jobs; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, Teach For America-Hawai'i is committed to serving Hawai'i's most underserved children by placing teachers in high-16 17 need areas, which include the Leeward Coast on O'ahu and the Kau/Kea'au/Pāhoa districts on the Big Island; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, each year, the Teach For America-Hawai'i staff focuses heavily on efforts to increase the number of Native 21 Hawaiian applicants, and their eventual participation into its 22 23 teacher corps, and 24 25 WHEREAS, Teach For America-Hawai'i corps members and alumni teach with the conviction that all children can achieve, and 26 work to ensure that every student has the opportunity to succeed 27 28 academically and in life, regardless of their economic 29 background; and 30 WHEREAS, 100% of Hawai'i principals surveyed in 2009 stated 31 that Teach For America-Hawai'i teachers were above average or 32 33 average as compared to other teachers; and 34 WHEREAS, research over time has conclusively shown that 35 Teach For America corps members' impact on their students' 36 achievement is equal to or greater than that of other new 37 teachers, and exceeds that of experienced and certified teachers 38 39 in the same schools; and 40

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WHEREAS, the majority of Teach For America-Hawai'i corps 1 members become involved in their school communities outside of 2 the classroom by coaching extracurricular activities, tutoring, 3 and taking on leadership roles; and 4 5 6 WHEREAS, Teach For America-Hawai'i is building an essential 7 pipeline of leadership for our community by attracting future leaders to the field of education who, with the insight, 8 9 conviction, and passion gained during their two-year teaching 10 commitment, pursue leadership positions in education and other sectors and continue to pursue educational equity throughout 11 12 their lives; and 13 WHEREAS, ultimately, Teach For America-Hawai`i helps to 14 address a long-standing issue of teacher placement in lower-15 income communities; now, therefore, 16 17 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 18 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 19 of 2011, that Hawai`i's Congressional Delegation is requested to 20 continue to support the Teach For America Program; and 21 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 24 Resolution be transmitted to the offices of U.S. Senator Daniel 25 Inouye, U.S. Senator Daniel Akaka, U.S. Congresswoman Mazie Hirono and U.S. Congresswoman Colleen Hanabusa. 26 27 28 (m 1/2. 29 30 OFFERED BY:



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
