## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO CONVENE A DEVELOPMENTAL SCREENING TASK FORCE TO REVIEW EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENTAL SCREENING PILOT PROJECTS, AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF AN EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENTAL SCREENING SYSTEM IN HAWAII.

1 WHEREAS, neuroscience research demonstrates that a child's 2 early years are the most crucial in the child's cognitive, 3 social, emotional, and physical development; and 4

5 WHEREAS, early screening, identification, and intervention 6 for physical impairments, developmental delays, and psychosocial 7 problems can dramatically improve children's outcomes and have a 8 critical influence on school success and family functioning; and

10 WHEREAS, early screening, identification, and intervention 11 result in significant cost savings; and

WHEREAS, potential savings realized when a child does not require special education programs can be as much as \$14,000 per child per school year; and

WHEREAS, it is critical to provide each child with ongoing
access to quality primary health care that includes screening
for developmental delays, to ensure that the effects of these
delays are mitigated as soon as possible; and

22 WHEREAS, many of Hawaii's children do not have access to 23 quality primary health care and many parents are unaware of or 24 choose not to use available primary health care services; 25 therefore, many of Hawaii's children do not receive proper 26 screening, identification, evaluation, or referrals for 27 correction or treatment; and

29 WHEREAS, Aloha United Way has implemented two pilot 30 projects on Oahu that provide early childhood developmental 31 screening; and 32



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WHEREAS, preliminary findings from the projects show that 1 2 twenty-one percent of the children screened have a problem that requires follow-up services; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, the projects indicate a need for a comprehensive 6 outreach component to ensure families are aware of the need for 7 screening; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the projects also indicate that a case management component is important so that children who require follow-up 10 services can receive treatment; and 11 12 WHEREAS, early screening services are necessary to 13 14 identify, mitigate, and treat developmental disabilities as early as possible, and an integrated, universal developmental 15 screening system would clearly benefit the children of this 16 17 State; now, therefore, 18 19 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 20 of 2011, that the Department of Health is requested to convene a 21 22 Developmental Screening Task Force to review Aloha United Way's Early Childhood Developmental Screening pilot projects and the 23 24 University of Hawai'i at Manoa Center on Disability Studies' evaluation of those Early Childhood Developmental Screening 25 26 pilot projects; and 27 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health is 29 requested to report, based on the Task Force's review, its 30 findings and recommendations for the development of an integrated, universal early childhood developmental screening 31 32 system in Hawaii; and 33 34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health submit its report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to 35 36 the convening of the Regular Session of 2012; and 37 38



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1 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 2 Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Health, Chairperson 3 of the Center on Disability Studies at the University of Hawai'i 4 at Manoa, and President of Aloha United Way.
