HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII SYSTEM TO PROVIDE HIGHER EDUCATION TUITION WAIVERS FOR ALL ENROLLED NATIVE HAWAIIAN STUDENTS.

WHEREAS, the goal of the University of Hawaii System is to 1 provide higher education for all its students; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, some of those college students, specifically native Hawaiian students, may need financial assistance to 5 offset Hawaii's high cost of living, and other socio-economic 6 7 factors; and 8 9 WHEREAS, this academic and economic support for native Hawaiian students attending and graduating from the University 10 of Hawaii System can have far-reaching positive consequences for 11 12 the State as a whole; and 13 WHEREAS, native Hawaiian graduates of the University of 14 Hawaii System will be able to contribute more effectively to the 15 economic and social health of the State and of the native 16 17 Hawaiian peoples; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the challenge for native Hawaiian students begins 20 in the classroom, where they have the lowest college graduation rates of all ethnic groups in Hawaii, and of those who are able 21 to attend college, far fewer actually graduate with a college 22 degree than students from any other ethnic group in the State; 23 and 24 25 WHEREAS, according to the University of Hawaii's 26 institutional research office and 2000 United States census, 27 native Hawaiians: 28 29 Represent only 14 percent of the total University of (1) 30 Hawaii student population, a figure that includes all 31

native Hawaiians attending the System's three four-1 2 year and seven two-year campuses; 3 (2) Return for a second year of college at a lower 4 5 percentage compared to non-native-Hawaiian students. More than 80 percent of the University of Hawaii 6 System's non-native-Hawaiian students return for a 7 second year of college, but the percentage of native 8 9 Hawaiian students returning is nearly ten percent 10 lower; 11 (3) Earn a low percentage of college credits and degrees. 12 Even though 25 percent of all native Hawaiians have 13 earned some college credits, most have not completed 14 15 their undergraduate degrees, and only 15 percent of all native Hawaiians have earned at least a bachelor's 16 degree. Furthermore, only 3.2 percent of native 17 Hawaiians have earned a graduate degree of any kind, 18 compared with 8.4 percent of all Hawaii residents and 19 20 8.9 percent of the total United States population; 21 Represent only 3.6 percent of the current doctoral 22 (4) candidates at the University of Hawaii, and nearly 70 23 percent of native-Hawaiian candidates do not receive 24 any type of financial aid or tuition waivers; and 25 26 (5) Represent just four percent of all faculty positions 27 28 at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, and less than one percent of permanently tenured positions are held 29 30 by native Hawaiians; 31 and 32 33 WHEREAS, the academic stress of earning a college degree is dramatically increased for many native Hawaiian students by high 34 levels of economic stress; and 35 36 WHEREAS, statistically, Hawaiians attending the University 37 of Hawaii are, on average, far more affected by negative 38 economic indicators than students from other ethnic groups, for 39 example, native Hawaiian students who do complete their degrees 40 41 take, on the average, a full year longer to do so than students

of other ethnic groups and many native Hawaiian students must work full- or part-time jobs while attempting to complete their college degrees. This slower-than-average completion rate is due primarily to the consequences of native Hawaiians' poor access to available socio-economic resources, combined with their ongoing need to produce income for themselves and their families and Hawaii's high cost of living; and

9 WHEREAS, as more native Hawaiians are able to earn college
10 degrees, more native Hawaiians can pursue the highest levels of
11 academic and professional achievement; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2011, that the University of Hawaii System is urged to grant a waiver of all tuition to each and every student enrolled at any of the University of Hawaii System's ten campuses who is native Hawaiian or Hawaiian; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the student must possess a card issued by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs identifying the student as a person included in the Hawaiian registry under section 10-19, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which shall constitute conclusive proof that the student is native Hawaiian or Hawaiian; and

26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 27 Resolution be transmitted to University of Hawaii Board of 28 Regents; President of the University of Hawaii; and Chair of the 29 Board of Trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.
