HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE STATE OF HAWAII TO CREATE AND FUND A STATE GRANT PROGRAM FOR NATIVE HAWAIIAN STUDENTS AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII.

WHEREAS, the goal of the University of Hawaii System is to 1 2 provide higher education for all its students; and 3 4 WHEREAS, some of those college students, specifically 5 native Hawaiian students, may need financial assistance to offset Hawaii's high cost of living, and other socio-economic 6 7 factors; and 8 9 WHEREAS, this academic and economic support for native 10 Hawaiian students attending and graduating from the University of Hawaii System can have far-reaching positive consequences for 11 the State as a whole; and 12 13 WHEREAS, native Hawaiian graduates of the University of 14 Hawaii System will be able to contribute more effectively to the 15 economic and social health of the State and of the native 16 Hawaiian people; and 17 18 WHEREAS, the challenge for native Hawaiian students begins 19 in the classroom, where they have the lowest college graduation 20 rates of all ethnic groups in Hawaii, and of those who are able 21 to attend college, far fewer actually graduate with a college 22 23 degree than students from any other ethnic group in the State; 24 and 25 26 WHEREAS, according to the University of Hawaii's institutional research office and 2000 United States census, 27 native Hawaiians: 28 29 Represent 22.4 percent of the total University of 30 (1) Hawaii student population, a figure that includes all 31 native Hawaiians attending the System's three 32 baccalaureate campuses and seven community colleges; 33

1 (2) Return for a second year of college at a slightly lower percentage compared to non-native-Hawaiian 2 3 students. More than 76.7 percent of the University of Hawaii System's non-native-Hawaiian students return 4 for a second year of college, whereas the percentage 5 6 of native Hawaiian students returning is 76.1 percent; 7 8 (3) Earn a low percentage of college credits and degrees. 9 Even though 25 percent of all native Hawaiians have 10 earned some college credits, most have not completed their undergraduate degrees, and only 15 percent of 11 12 all native Hawaiians have earned at least a bachelor's degree. Furthermore, only 3.2 percent of native 13 Hawaiians have earned a graduate degree of any kind, 14 15 compared with 8.4 percent of all Hawaii residents and 8.9 percent of the total United States population; 16 17 (4)18 Represent only 9.5 percent of the current doctoral 19 candidates at the University of Hawaii, and nearly 38 percent of native Hawaiian candidates do not receive 20 any type of financial aid or tuition waivers; and 21 22 23 (5) Represent just five percent of all faculty positions at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, and 3.1 percent 24 of permanently tenured positions are held by native 25 Hawaiians: 26 27 28 and 29 30 WHEREAS, the academic stress of earning a college degree is 31 drastically increased for many native Hawaiian students by high 32 levels of economic stress; and 33 WHEREAS, statistically, native Hawaiians attending the 34 35 University of Hawaii are, on average, far more affected by 36 negative economic indicators than students from other ethnic groups, and for example, native Hawaiian students who do 37 complete their degrees take longer to do so than students of 38 other ethnic groups and many native Hawaiian students must work 39 40 full- or part-time jobs while attempting to complete their college degrees. This slower-than-average completion rate is 41

due primarily to the consequences of native Hawaiians' poor access to available socio-economic resources, combined with their ongoing need to produce income for themselves and their families and Hawaii's high cost of living; and

6 WHEREAS, as more native Hawaiians are able to earn college 7 degrees, more native Hawaiians can pursue the highest levels of 8 academic and professional achievement; now, therefore, 9

10 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 11 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 12 of 2011, that the State of Hawaii is urged to create and fund a 13 state grant program that would award aid to all native Hawaiian 14 and Hawaiian students with financial need, as determined by 15 federal financial aid guidelines, enrolled at any of the 16 University of Hawaii System's ten campuses; and 17

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that to qualify for such financial aid, the student must possess a card issued by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs identifying the student as a person included in the Hawaiian registry under section 10-19, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which will constitute conclusive proof that the student is native Hawaiian or Hawaiian; and
