HOUSE RESOLUTION

RECOGNIZING THE FOURTH TUESDAY IN APRIL AS EQUAL PAY DAY IN HAWAII, AND URGING CONGRESS TO SUPPORT LEGISLATION TO PROVIDE MORE EFFECTIVE REMEDIES FOR VICTIMS OF WAGE DISCRIMINATION BASED ON GENDER.

WHEREAS, more women in the United States are obtaining 1 college degrees and increasing their participation in the labor 2 3 force; and 4 WHEREAS, family-friendly legislation, including the Equal 5 Pay Act, Family and Medical Leave Act, and Pregnancy 6 Discrimination Act, and policies such as flex time and 7 telecommuting, have increased options to create a win-win 8 9 situation for women and their employers; and 10 WHEREAS, despite the progress, women continue to suffer the 11 consequences of inequitable pay differentials: in 2009, the 12 median earnings of a woman working full-time, year-round was 13 14 \$36,278 compared to \$47,127 for a man, and in 2009, women earned only 77 cents on the dollar to their male counterparts; and 15 16 WHEREAS, pay disparities affect women of all ages, races, 17 and education levels, but are more pronounced for women of 18 color; and 19 20 WHEREAS, to match men's earnings for 2009, women would have 21 22 had to work from January 2009 to mid-April 2010 -- an extra three-and-a-half months -- and the recognition of Equal Pay Day 23 24 on a Tuesday in April symbolizes the point in the next year to which a woman must work to achieve pay equity for the previous 25 year; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, women are more likely to enter poverty in old age for several reasons: 29

(1)A lifetime of lower wages means women have less income 1 2 to save for retirement, and less income that counts in their Social Security or pension benefit formula; 3 4 5 (2) The current life expectancy for women is approaching 86 years old, which means they are expected to outlive 6 7 men by an average of three years and will have to stretch their retirement savings which are less to 8 begin with, over a longer period of time; and 9 10 (3) The median income of older women is almost half of 11 12 what it is for older men; 13 14 and 15 WHEREAS, fair pay strengthens the security of families and 16 eases future retirement costs while enhancing the American 17 18 economy; now, therefore, 19 20 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 21 of 2011, that the fourth Tuesday in April of every year is 22 hereby recognized as Equal Pay Day in Hawaii to bring attention 23 to the struggle for pay equity, on which all state and county 24 25 employees and officials are urged to wear red to show their support for equal pay for all; and 26 27 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Congress is urged to support legislation to provide more effective remedies for victims of 29 wage discrimination based on gender, such as the legislation 30 contained in the Paycheck Fairness Act, H.R. 1338, introduced in 31 2007 to amend the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 to provide 32 33 more effective remedies for victims of wage discrimination based 34 on gender; and 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 36 37 Resolution be transmitted to the members of Hawaii's Congressional Delegation and the Governor. 38 39 40 SN.
